MR. SHORT'S FUNERAL.

Immense Throng Follows his Remains to Their last Resting Place.

(Special to Reflector.)

WASHINGTON, N. C., Dec 12.—One of the largest funeral processions ever witnessed in Washington was that of Mr. E. Murray Short yesterday afternoon. The funeral exercises were conducted at the Presbyterian church, of which he was a consistent member, by Rev. Dr. C. M. Payne. The church was crowded to its utmost capacity by sorrowing relatives and friends.

The floral tributes were many and of remarkable beauty and appropriateness.

Mr. Short's oldest daughter, Miss Addie Lee Short, who was attending school at Raleigh, reached home on a special train about one o'clock, accompanied by Prof. James Dinwiddie, President of Peace Institute.

The Baptist State Convention which met in Charlotte last week adjourned Monday. It is said to have been one of the best sessions the Convention has had since its organization at Greenville 64 years ago. In spite of the hard times no debt was reported to the body and something over ten thousand dollars was contributed by the delegates during the present session. The Convention reports showed that the denomination was growing and prospering in the State. The preaching on Sunday was exceptionally fine. The Convention was handsomely entertained by that flourishing city. The next session will be held at Greensboro.

The members of Congress from the North do not seem to favor Secretary Carlisle's financial plan. They say it expands the currency. Southern members generally favor it and their reason for liking it is that it does in some degree increase the volume of money. Thus it ever is—what we want the North opposes; what they want is not acceptable to us. We need not expect any financial legislation from the present session of Congress. Mr. Woodard says the repeal of the ten per cent tax on banks will not pass either. We don't look for much favorable legislation from the incoming Congress, so the people had about as well make up their minds not to fret but to do the best they can under existing circumstances. The interests of the United States are so varied that there always will be more or less friction in legislation.

Urgent Deficiency Bill.

Washington, D. C., December 11.—The House Appropriations Committee to-day agreed upon the urgent deficiency appropriation bill. The amount carried is \$2,139,105, and is to supply deficiencies in appropriations for the year ending June 30, 1895. The principal items are as follows: Public printing and binding, \$100,000; re-coinage of silver, \$100,000; expenses of collecting the income tax, \$245,095; expenses of special examiners, pension office, \$250,000; eleventh census, \$300,000; expenses of United States marshals, \$140,000; fees of jurors, United States courts, \$130,000; fees of witnesses, \$500,000; support of United States prisoners, \$340,000; transportation of silver coin, \$20,000; re-coinage of minor coins, \$3,500, and House of Representatives, \$900.

Loula Paris, a girl 18 years of age, who was sentenced March last to fifteen years in the State Penitentiary for manslaughter, has been pardoned by Governor Elias Carr.

Mr John Funderburke, of Enochville, reports the largest hog so far slaughtered in Rowan county this season. He killed a 11 months old pig that pulled the beam at 420 pounds.—Salisbury Herald.

CONFEDERATE MONUMENT.

The following letter received by Lieut. B. F. Sugg, and handed the REFLECTOR for publication, explains itself.

GOLDSBORO, N. C., Dec. 11, 1894.

To the Officers and Members of the N. C. State Guard:

COMRADES—The Goldsboro Rifles, Co., D., First Regiment N. C. S. G., are working to erect a monument on the battlefield of Bentonsville, N. C., to the memory of the Confederate dead who nobly laid down their lives in that battle for a cause that was right. We need the assistance of all those who feel interested in the cause.

Mr. J. W. Pepper, of Philadelphia, Pa., has kindly donated a Drum Major's Baton to us to be disposed of for the Monument fund. At a meeting of the Monument Committee it was decided to send the Baton out to the several companies in the Guard and have them solicit from the citizens in their respective towns votes at 10 cents each to any regimental band they may see fit to vote for—the regimental Band that receives the highest number of votes to be given the Baton. Each company commander will send number of votes to his regimental commander together with amount, less express charges. The commander of Regiments will send in number of votes of their respective Regiment to Gen. F. H. Cameron who will make the award and instruct Baton to be turned over to band entitled to same.

A list of all companies, with number of votes, will be published after award is made.

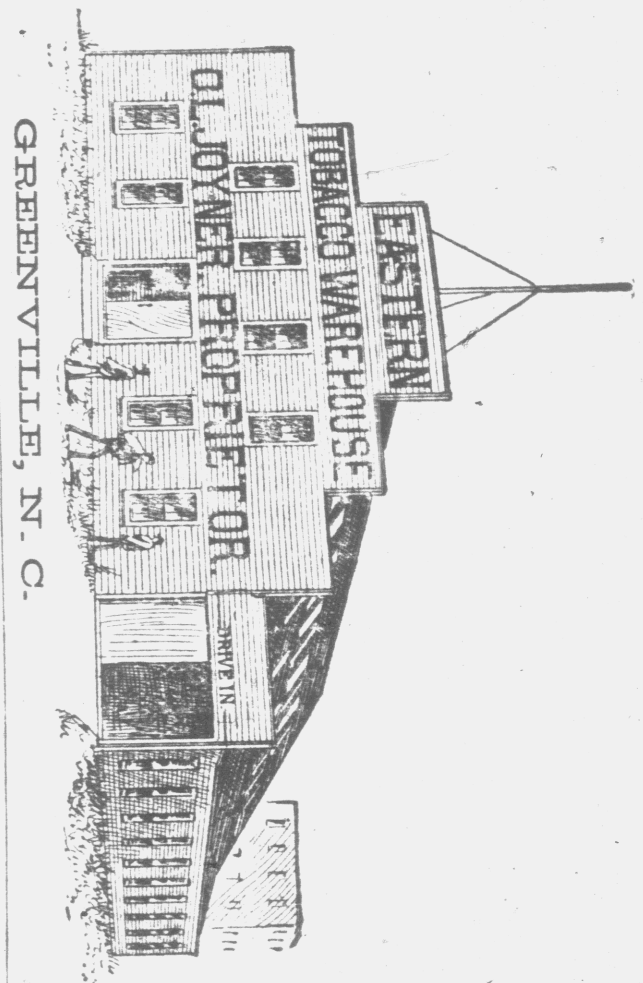
