TELEGRAPH NEWS.

Fire destroyed Bell Haven Female College at Jackson, Miss., loss \$40,000.

THE LEGISLATURE.

THURSDAY.

Both houses in session only about an hour, adjournment being taken to attend the laying of the corner stone to the L. L. Polk monument.

The only bill of general interest passed in the Senate were to amend the code of Civil Procedure so that title to office may be tried without consent of the Attorney General, and to reduce salary of Railroad Commissioners from \$2,000 to \$1,500.

In the House a few bills of minor importance were introduced and the remainder of the time taken up in discussing the public printing bill, which finally passed third reading with an amendment that party to whom the printing is awarded must give a \$5,000 bond.

STATE NEWS.

Mr. Wink Taylor, proprietor of the Grand Central Hotel at Columbia, S. C., has leased the Atlantic Hotel at Morehead City and will run it the coming season.

The Journal reports the destruction by fire of the handsome residence of Judge H. R. Bryan at Newbern. Loss \$5,000, about half covered by insurance.

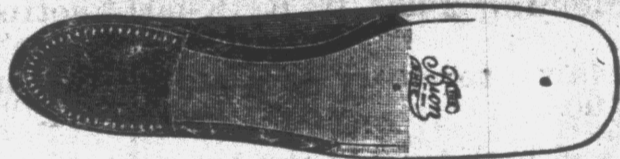
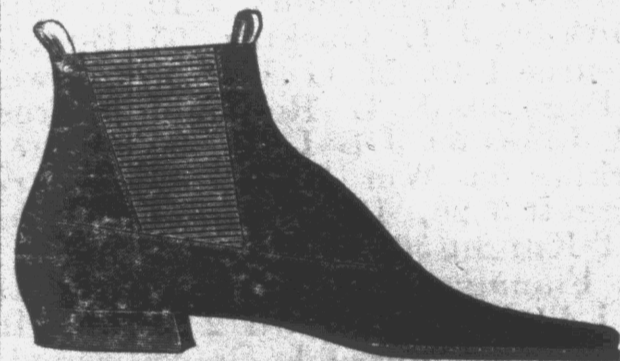

Ordered that application of Mrs. Sue Albritton for refund of taxes alleged to be improperly

Sheriff B W King was instructed to build a substantial coal bin near the Court House.

Ordered that Clerk of Board notify Board of Supervisors of Public roads to take charge of road laid off Oct. 26, 1893, in Greenville township, beginning near residence of Noah Forbes and ending at a point on the Plank road.

John Flanagan having been elected by the Board at December meeting as Treasurer of the county for two years, and failing to appear and tender his bonds, the Board held an election to fill the vacancy. J L Little received unanimous vote and was allowed until March meeting to present bond.

H J Hoyle having been elected at January meeting as Standard Keeper for two years, and failing to appear and tender bond, the Board elected H A Blow and allowed him until March meeting to present bond.

The Sheriff made his report and report of the jury showing that he had duly laid off a public road in Contentnea township from the Newbern road to White's road in accordance with an order issued by the Board at October meeting.

Home and Religious Life of the Greatest of Britain's Premiers.

"Some time ago," says Rev. Newman Hall, D. D., "I was preaching in the north of England and happened to stay at the house of a solicitor who had paid a recent visit to Hawarden merely as a tourist. On his return he entered a carriage in which there was seated a woman with a beautiful bouquet of flowers, which my friend admired. 'Mr. Gladstone gave them to me,' said the woman. 'Oh,' replied my friend, 'how was that?' He was then told that every servant who left the castle with a good character was invited to return and spend a week during the summer. 'I used to be a servant there,' continued the woman, 'but left because I was going to be married. I have, however, just

been staying there a week and as I was leaving I met Mr. Gladstone in the garden. He asked me if I liked flowers, and when I said I did he gave me this bunch, which he had in his hand, saying: 'Pray accept them.'"

"Another incident," Dr. Hall went on, "which I had in my mind happened when Mr. Gladstone was chancellor of the exchequer and was told me by Sir Francis Crossley. Sir Francis was one day dining with the vicar of St. Martins-in-the-Fields, to which church Mr. Gladstone used to go when living in Carlton House terrace; it was then that he heard the story from the vicar. The vicar had recently been to see a crossing sweeper in his parish who was ill. Asking him if anyone had been to see him the sweeper replied: 'Yes, Mr. Gladstone.' 'Which Mr. Gladstone?' asked the vicar. 'Mr. Gladstone,' repeated the poor invalid. 'But how came he to see you?' inquired the vicar. 'Well,' answered the crossing sweeper, 'he always had a nice word for me when he passed my crossing, and when I was not there he missed me. He asked my mate, who had taken my place, where I was, and when he heard I was ill he asked for me and when he was told he put it down on paper. So he called to see me.' 'And what did he do?' asked the vicar. 'Why, he read some Bible to me and prayed,' was the reply."—Detroit Free Press.
