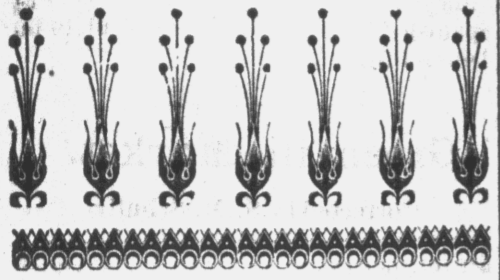

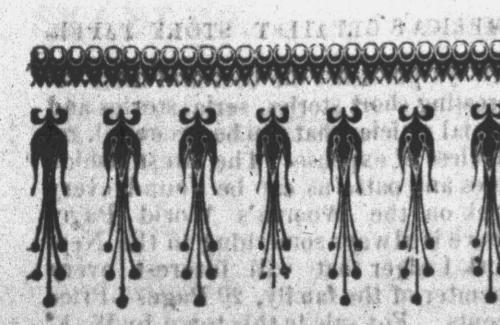

**A CITIZEN GIVES HIS VIEWS.**

EDITOR REFLECTOR:—The call of Mayor Forbes upon the citizens of the town to meet at the Court House to-night is of much importance, and it is to be hoped and expected that the citizenship of the town will give to this opportunity such gravity as it is entitled to. That something is to be done is too evident to be discussed, or longer delayed. The rates of insurance in excess of what would be was the town provided with a safe guarantee from fire, will do much and go a long way towards fitting the town for an emergency. "He, who delays is lost, and he who doubts is dammed," is a trite saying.

Above all things, the town should be guarded against fire. Regardless of political advantage, every one is interested. Lay aside the slightest idea of politics and all co-operate for the same good cause. Let the Councilmen feel they have the support and endorsement of the people and let a committee of the very best and most progressive citizens be appointed to formulate a plan and report to a adjourned meeting to be held in the Court House at the very earliest period practically and then endorse the action of the committee or divine some better plan, and let the Mayor and Councilmen feel and know they have the hearty support and approval of the people. Let this committee be composed of the very best citizens regardless of politics or other considerations. The fire fiend is no respecter of persons.

Let the work be done at once. The town can be practically safe at no great cost, insignificant at least to the severe losses by the late fire. Those who witnessed the recent fire cannot fail to feel the importance, and when the plan is adopted let there be no croaking, for that is what has kept us from having a better outfit in the past.

The common interest of any person demands action, not so many words. Such men as R. J. Cobb, E. A. Moyer, O. L. Joyner, S. T. White, W. H. Long, John Flanagan, J. G. Moyer, Oscar Hooker, S. M. Schultz and Sheriff King would constitute a committee to act without fear of croaking criticisms and would inspire confidence and approval.

An Associated Press reporter had a talk with Fitzsimmons about the Corbett challenge on the way from the battleground last week and this is what he had to say about it:

"I shall completely ignore that fellow Corbett. It was a thousand dollars of American money to one cent, Mexican coin, that 'Pomp Jim' would get in his ear just as he has. I shall use about the same argument once employed by Charlie Mitchell—tell him to go get reputation. Let him go and whip Peter Maher and Joe Choyinski before he opens his head to me. Both men wanted to fight him and I think either one of them can lick him. This much I shall insist upon. He must first win from Maher and Choyinski before he gets into a ring with me.

"I whipped with ease the man Corbett presented the championship belt to in order to escape a match with him. To show Corbett how little weight his championship presented carried, I now formally, through the Associated Press, renounce all claim to the belt and refuse to accept it. I am going to Madison Square Garden with a half dozen contracts I made conditionally on winning from Maher, and then, with Julian, Stenzler, Roeber and my family, I sail for Eng'land."

**Voting Precincts.**

In accordance with Section 5, Chapter 159, Laws of 1893, the voting precincts and polling places in Pitt county are established as follows:

**BEAVER DAM TOWNSHIP.**

One voting precinct, polling place May's Chapel.

**BELVOIR TOWNSHIP.**

One voting precinct, polling place, Parker's School House.

**BETHEL TOWNSHIP.**

One voting precinct, polling place, Bethel

**CAROLINA TOWNSHIP.**

One voting precinct, polling place, Public School House near Turner Briley's.

**CHICOD TOWNSHIP.**

Two voting precincts, as follows: All that part of the township lying south of the following line, to wit: Beginning at the township line where it crosses the road leading from the Home for the Aged and Infirm to Black Jack, thence with Black Jack road to Boyd's Ferry road, thence with Boyd's Ferry road to Grimes Mill road, thence with Grimes Mill road to Grimes Mill, thence with the mill pond to the Beaufort county line, shall constitute one voting precinct to be known as Precinct No. 1 of Chicod township, polling place, Public School House at cross Roads at Sallie Cox's.

All that part of said township lying north of said line shall constitute one voting precinct to be known as Precinct No. 2 of Chicod township, polling place, Public School House called Philippi, near Philippi Church.

**CONTENTNEA TOWNSHIP.**

Two voting precincts as follows: All that part of the township lying south of the following line, to wit: beginning at the township line on the road leading from Frog Level to the Kinston road and running with said road to Kinston road at the Ellis place, then with Kinston road toward Greenville to Swift Creek, thence down said creek to the township line, shall constitute one voting precinct to be known as Precinct No. 1 of Contentnea township, polling place, Ayden.

All that part of said township lying north of said line shall constitute one voting precinct to be known as Precinct No. 2 of Contentnea township, polling place Winterville.

**FALKLAND TOWNSHIP.**

One voting precinct, polling place, Falkland.

**FARMVILLE TOWNSHIP.**

Two voting precincts as follows: All that part of the township lying on the south side of Little Contentnea creek shall constitute one voting precinct to be known as Precinct No. 1 of Farmville township, polling place, Farmville.

All that part of the township lying on the north side of Little Contentnea Creek shall constitute one voting precinct to be known as Precinct No. 2 of Farmville township, polling place, Rock of the road known as Bynum's store.

**GREENVILLE TOWNSHIP.**

Four voting precincts, as follows: The first ward of the town of Greenville and all that portion of the township lying outside the corporate limits of the town of Greenville east of the Wilmington & Weldon railroad, on south side Tar River, shall constitute one voting precinct to be known as Precinct No. 1 of Greenville township, polling place, Court House.

The second, third and fourth wards of the town of Greenville shall constitute one voting precinct to be known as Precinct No. 2 of Greenville township, polling place, Foundry and Machine Shops of James Brown on Dickinson avenue.

All that part of the township lying outside of the corporate limits of the town of Greenville, west of the Wilmington & Weldon railroad, on the south side of Tar River, shall constitute one voting precinct to be known as Precinct No. 3 of Greenville township, polling place, Moye's School House.

All that part of the township lying north of Tar River shall constitute one voting precinct to be known as Precinct No. 4 of Greenville township, polling place, Parker's Cross Roads.

**PACTOLUS TOWNSHIP.**

One voting precinct, polling place, Pactolus.

**SWIFT CREEK TOWNSHIP.**

Two voting precincts, as follows: All that part of the township lying south of Swift Creek shall constitute one voting precinct to be known as Precinct No. 1 of Swift Creek township, polling place, Centerville.

All that part of the township lying north of Swift Creek shall constitute one voting precinct to be known as Precinct No. 2 of Swift Creek township, polling place, Public School House near L. B. Stokes.

It was agreed in both the Democratic and Republican caucuses that the Populists should be permitted to have one messenger, and as Mr. Lloyd was endorsed by the six Populists he received the appointment by the Sergeant-at-Arms.

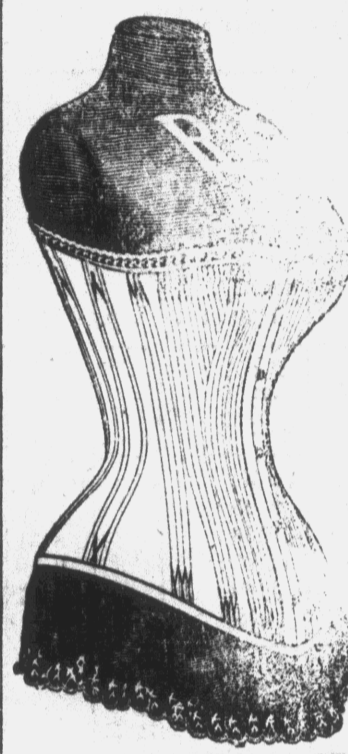
