### AT GRIMESLAND.

The County Candidates Met by a  
Large Crowd.

CONTINUATION OF MR LAUGHING-  
HOUSE'S SPEECH.

Mr. Laughinghouse said that he did not want to close his speech without telling his audience something of the two men they were asked to vote for for Congress in this district. He paid a high tribute to Col. W. H. Lucas, the Democratic nominee. "Against him is a man without conscience, character or credit, and a man who has broken up more homes than any other man in the county." He then exposed some of the record of Harry Skinner, the fusion candidate. He said he could point out many men who had paid Skinner 25 per cent. interest on money. He also told several instances, giving names of the parties, where Skinner collected money for northern firms out of our home dealers, pocketed the money and reported the man from whom it was collected as bad, thus robbing one man of his money and another of his character at the same time. One of the firms thus swindled turned down a second order from a merchant sent in by their salesman, furnishing the latter a letter from Skinner saying the merchant was no good. The salesman not believing the statements made in the letter investigated the matter. Satisfying himself that the bill had been paid by the merchant he took the letter to Skinner's office and demanded an explanation. Skinner seeing he was cornered tried to shift off the blame on his clerk. But the salesman, who was none other than the well known William Russ, now Mayor of Raleigh, would not accept any such statement and demanded the collected money or blood on the spot. He got the money.

Mr. Laughinghouse related other instances almost similar to this. He also gave the name of a widow whom Skinner swindled out of \$500 and caused her home to be advertised for sale to pay it.

There were some present who voted for Skinner two years ago, but after listening to this speech declared they could never vote for such a man again.

Mr. Laughinghouse made a good speech all through.

### DIED IN THE GUARD HOUSE.

Sad Ending of a Drunken Spree.

Ed. Butts, a white man, died in the guard house here Monday night sometime between midnight and sunrise. Butts was seen on the street in an intoxicated condition early in the night. He went to Proctor & Mobleys bar about 10:30 o'clock and while there drank more whiskey and got down dead drunk. He stayed in the bar room until they went to close up just before midnight when he was placed out on the sidewalk and the night policeman notified. J. F. Leggett, who was acting as night police, says when he found Butts a little later he was helpless and speechless. He carried him to the guard house and placed him on a mattress in one of the cells. This morning before going off duty Leggett went to notify day officer Cox that the man was in the guard house and when the two went there together they found Butts dead.

It was a sad picture and told its own tale, the man lying dead in the cell with a whiskey flask beside him. Butts was from the country and we understand had a family. A brother who lives at Ayden was telegraphed of his death.

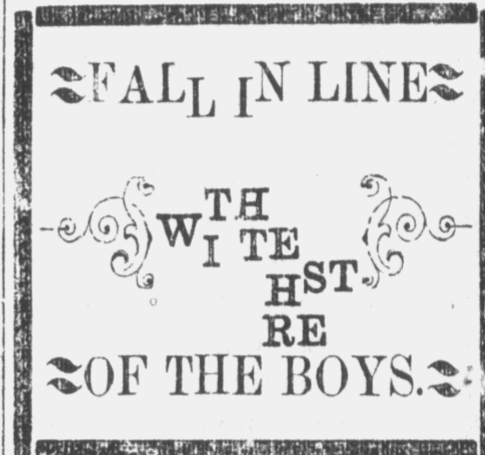

Electoral Fusion.

The Times' position on the money question before the Chicago convention was well known. We were opposed to free silver, and did everything we could to impress upon our readers our views regarding the matter. We have always been loyal to the voice of a Democratic convention and it did not take us a moment to make up our mind about our course when a free silver candidate was nominated at Chicago. In our first issue after the convention we announced unqualified support of Mr. Bryan and Mr. Sewall. Our support has not been merely nominal and perfunctory, but it has been genuine, honest, and hearty. We look upon Mr. Bryan as one of the biggest and brainiest men on the continent, and we know that he is honest and safe. The Democratic party could not have done better in its selection of a candidate to carry its banner to victory.

Likewise, our position on electoral or any other kind of fusion was well known. We believe that the Democratic party can and should fight its own battles without fusing with any party. However, the Democratic State Executive Committee, by a unanimous vote save one, decided to offer the Populists a division of electors on the ticket, and this arrangement has been perfected. Although we were earnestly opposed to it, the thing is now done and to oppose it now would not only be useless, but would be to work to turn the State over to McKinley, a thing for which we could never forgive ourselves. We will stand by the action of the committee and do all we can for the success of the composite ticket.

We are confident that the State committee acted for what it considered to be the very best interests of the Democratic party. The members of it are honest and loyal Democrats, and could have nothing in view but the good of the Democracy. They realized the fact fully that this action was absolutely necessary in order to save the State to Bryan. One alternative was to have electoral fusion, and the other was to give the State to the Republican nominee.

The fusion has been arranged, and to our mind it is the duty of every Democrat to support it. Every man who wants Bryan elected and McKinley defeated should cease opposition to the action of the committee and go to work to see that and accomplished. It is well to state here that the electoral fusion as arranged meets with the approval of Mr. Bryan and the National Executive Committee. No Democrat can fail to support it without putting himself in opposition to his party.

We have heard some Democrats say that they would vote for the five Democratic electors on the ticket and scratch off the five Populist electors. We do not think they should do this. In the first place they would by this action be casting only half a vote for Bryan as the Populists on the ticket are as much Bryan electors as the Democrats. When you scratch the Populist names from the ticket you take half a vote from Bryan. Think about that. In the second place, it will be acting in bad faith with the Populists, and will give them an excuse to scratch the Democratic electors. If Democrats refuse to vote for the Populist electors it is but natural for them to retaliate by declining to vote for ours. Our course is to support our own ticket.

The arrangement has been made. Let both Democrats and

Populists act in good faith and vote the entire electoral ticket. Concord Times.

Bryan's Strength With the Voters.

How free stands W. J. Bryan of all corrupt influences! He is opposed by every trust, syndicate, big corporation or wealthy institution in the country. This is why the people love and revere him. He is opposed to using the government for private gain at the expense of the people.—Columbus, Ohio, Press.

The State elections held so far are very decidedly favorable for the Democrats, and indicate more than the McKinley managers are willing to admit. Vermont and Maine went Republican as was to have been expected. Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Tennessee and Oregon have voted, and they keep their places in the Democratic column, some by smaller majorities, owing to factional fights, but all by good majorities, which there is no possibility of reducing at the November election. Factional fights will not then be in the way, and there will be instead Democratic unanimity for Bryan. If there is anything in indications the frosty air about Republican headquarters just now is not to be wondered at.—Charlotte Observer.

Some of the Republican organs comment on the fact that Bryan has had his hair cut. They will not feel like making any comment when Bryan smashes McKinley baldheaded early next month.—Hickory Times.
