### PROFITABLE PUBLICITY.

Now For Business.

No matter what you are or where politically.

You are a citizen now.

From a business point of view you have forgotten that there is a Republican party, a Democratic party, a Popocratic, a Socialistic, or any other kind.

McKinley will be President whether you voted for him or not, and Gold Bags and Silverites will use the same money.

Business has been bad, and business simply has got to be good.

Reaction must produce results, and in this case cannot bring failure.

The country is ready for good times, the people demand good times, good times are expected, good times will come, and good times really have come.

The financial interests of the country are settling themselves, and members of every political party are campaigning no longer.

They are attending to business.

It is obvious that people want to buy goods largely because they need goods, that the man who has the goods for sale is likely to be the man who will sell the goods if people know he has them, and so long as advertising appears to be the only economical, sensible, and practical method of connecting the seller with the buyer, advertising will increase as the good times increase and the man who doesn't advertise, or the man who advertises sparingly, may find that the incoming tide of goods will rush over him and drown him, if he doesn't buoy himself up with good publicity.

Of all the non-sensical laws ever placed upon the Statute books of North Carolina or of any other State, the law which provides that successful candidates shall return to the Secretary of State and to Clerks of the Court statements of their campaign expenses surpasses them all. If these statements afforded any information that bore the semblance of accuracy they would be worthless, but no intelligent man will suppose for an instant that any candidate is going to render any account which would bear the test of any sort of conscientious scrutiny. The statements are supposed to be for the information of the public but the public knows about as much about it when the statements are made as the gamins in Hogans Alley and McFadden's row know about astrology. The sooner the legislature can take that asinine legal dispensation off the statute book, so soon will it relieve itself, the candidates and the public generally from the laughing stock of the earth.—Raleigh Press-Visitor.

Don't Get Scared Yet Mr. Pritchard.

A Washington dispatch of the 11th says that Senator Butler, of North Carolina, in an interview in that city that day, expresses the opinion that it was not possible for a gold Senator to be elected in his State to succeed Senator Pritchard. The Populists in the Legislature hold the balance of power and they will declare in their caucus, says the Senator, for some man who is not only a straight silver man, but who is also for an income tax, and who is opposed to the national banking system." This is, of course, only another way of saying that Senator Pritchard cannot be elected to succeed himself; and he may not be; but the above declaration the source from which it proceeds being considered, argues nothing against the probability of his re-election. Butler and his crowd declared for months pending the recent campaign, over and over again, that the Populists would support no gold standard man for anything this year; and yet we saw them last week electing gold standard Congressmen, who would have helped to tie Bryan's hands if he had been elected, and gold standard legislators who will vote for a gold bug for the Senate. Pritchard may or may not be re-elected by Populist votes, but you will know beloved what the Butler-Ayer-Wilson gang is going to do about anything only after they have done it. The crowd that betrayed Guthrie and elected Russell Governor is capable of anything.—Charlotte Observer.

Capt. W. H. Ramsuer, of Charlotte, has placed a contract with the carbuilding firm of Jackson & Sharpe of Wilmington, Del., for a car to be used for the purpose of advertising the resources, products, manufactures and enterprises of North Carolina. It will be patterned after the fashion of the Florida car, and like which, it will travel over the United States. The contract price of the car is \$10,000, and it is to be finished in North Carolina woods, which are as pretty as any produced in the world. This is the enterprise of the North Carolina Advertising Company, of which Capt. Ramsuer is manager. The materials for stocking the car are being collected and will be ready to be placed by the time the car is ready. There will be a fish and bird display of all kinds from the east; bears, deer and various kinds of game from all parts of the State; woods of all varieties; the different products of the soil, gold, silver, iron and the various minerals, and in fact, it will be an exposition on wheels. It will visit the people of all the cities and towns in the North, East and West.

It depends entirely upon what sort of a trade they can then make.

The most sensational, as well as the most disgraceful, feature of this senatorial election, is the candidacy of Chief Gideon Oltho Wilson. Yes, this self-confessed criminal has seriously and publicly announced himself a candidate for the high position so worthily filled by Zebulon B. Vance! Doesn't it really seem like scutage? And yet, alas, some men in North Carolina seem so lost to all sense of shame that they would rejoice in the perpetration of so gross an outrage on decency!—Pittsboro Record.

Now that confidence has been restored, that careful and prudent business man, Crover Cleveland, will be able to retire with a handsome fortune. There are other members of the present administration who are said to be in similar circumstances. ### Flooding Out Disease.

Water, much as men may dislike it, is good for men to drink. It is possible to prevent many diseases and cure others by drinking large quantities of water. An eminent French physician says that typhoid fever can be washed out of the system by water. He gives his patients what would amount to eight or ten ounces an hour of sterilized water. Experiments have been made with disease caused by bacteria which demonstrate the curative value of water. In cases of cholera, where the system secretes a large amount of fluid, enormous quantities of hot water are of great benefit and will cure many cases without other medicines. One doctor says that perfectly sweet cider, taken in large quantities, has been known to cure cases of bowel complaint. The acid kills the bacteria, which are speedily thrown out of the system. Hot water in fevers is of great use, and an ordinary tumblerful of water as hot as can be taken once an hour is one of the very best remedies. The important thing is to get into the system and out of it a sufficient amount of water to prevent accumulations of ptomaines and toxins within the body.

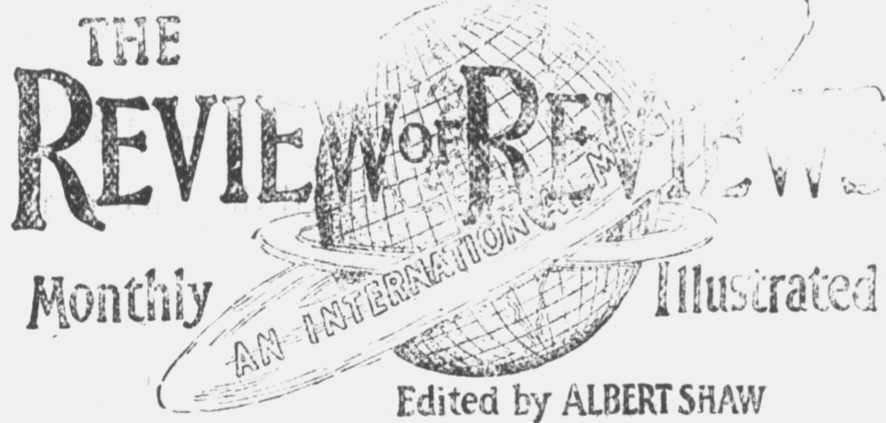
