THE LEGISLATURE.

Condensed Report of Proceedings.

SENATE.

TWENTY-EIGHTH DAY.

SENATE.

The senate met at 10 o'clock.

A petition was presented by various Christian temperance unions for the establishment of a reformatory. The petition was signed by about 1,000 prominent women in all sections of the state.

Bills and resolutions were introduced as follows:

Sharpe, to put Nash county in the Eastern criminal circuit; also the Edgecombe county road law. The latter provides that no persons living in town shall pay road tax, but be taxed for the improvement of streets in the corporate limits.

Moye opposed the bill, saying he had been informed by a citizen of Edgecombe that only one person in the county wanted the bill, to wit: Lee Person, senator from the county and promoter of the bill.

Alexander opposed the passage of the bill, saying his county (Mecklenburg) had the best roads of any county in the state, and they were improved by taxation; that he would vote against any measure opposing good roads.

Parker said the bill was so manifestly unjust that he would have to oppose its passage.

The bill failed to pass—ayes, 1; noes, 32.

The bill passed to authorize Edgecombe county to levy a special tax.

The bill was taken up to add Cumberland county to the Eastern criminal circuit.

Moye did not favor the bill because it gave the governor the right to appoint the judge. He thought the people should have a voice in the matter, but as he was informed it was a fight between two lawyers, he would therefore, favor the republican party.

On motion of Scales the bill was referred.

The bill to prevent fishing with anchors, drift or gill nets in Albemarle sound and rivers emptying therein also passed, as did the bill to incorporate the Wellington and Powellville railroad.

By consent, Person was allowed to introduce a bill to incorporate Pigford sanitarium for treatment of negro consumptives.

HOUSE.

Among the bills and resolutions introduced in the house were the following:

Murphy, to amend the Code so that materials furnished a corporation to keep it going shall not have priority over a previously recorded mortgage, although they do not add to the plant nor enhance its value.

Hancock, a resolution to abolish the office of enrolling clerk.

Ormsby, to give county commissioners more time for meetings.

Murphy, to make bastardy a misdemeanor.

Lawton, to allow Moore county to issue \$10,000 more of bonds.

Person, of Wilson, to incorporate Bridgersville Agricultural, Live Stock and Poultry Association.

Chapin, to incorporate the Harnett Central Railway Company from Spout Springs to a point on the Fayetteville and Wilson Short Cut.

Howe, to incorporate the state grand lodge of Grand United Order of Odd Fellows.

Person, of Wilson, to incorporate Hannibal Lodge G. U. of Odd Fellows.

Sutton, of Cumberland, to amend the charter of Fayetteville by creating a police board, of E. P. Powers, A. E. Dixon, W. P. Wemyss, G. A. P. Wilkerson and W. F. Rayford, to take office the first Monday in May and serve two years all officials to be elected by this board.

Parker, of Person, to make it a misdemeanor to practice law before passing examination and receiving license.

Holmes, a resolution, to pay Josiah Turner the balance due him for public printing and interest due.

Bryan, of Chatham, to submit to the qualified voters of that county the question of working the public roads by taxation.

By leave, Johnson introduced the following:

To require all bankers or officers and directors of railways and state banks or other corporations created or chartered by the legislature to take an official oath, the state treasurer to prepare the form of oath and send the blank form to each officer on or before January 1st of each year.

Young introduced a bill providing that the superintendent of public instruction shall ascertain the entire amount of money now appropriated in aid of the colored state normal schools and shall divide this sum equally among them, and the state treasurer shall pay this proportionate amount.

By leave, Hancock introduced a bill to aid "North Carolina's rolling exposition" by appropriating to it \$2,500.

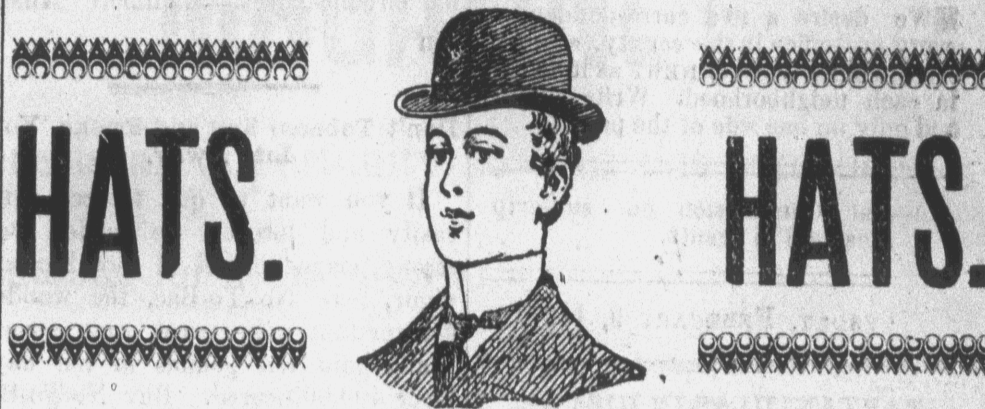
The Laeby Glass Makers

TARTANTULAS IN HIS CAR.

Terrible Experience of a Man on a Train.

In a Pullman car on the southbound Missouri Pacific limited Sunday night were two passengers, who attracted sympathetic attention. The woman was strikingly beautiful, while her companion might have been either 30 or 60 years old. Sharp lines disfigured his otherwise attractive features, and there was a quick, nervous movement of the head and hands that suggested palsy.

The man's name is James Payne, and he is a resident of Parkersburg, W. Va., where his family is well-to-do. Two months ago he started for the Pacific coast. On the train between Green river and Pocatello his pockets were picked. He was even unable to telegraph home for money, and determined to make his way through by the box car route.

On the second night of his stay in Pocatello a westbound special pulled in, in which were several fruit cars. He climbed into one and prepared to make himself as comfortable as possible. He had scarcely concealed himself before the door was closed and sealed. The car proved to have been loaded with bananas.

He composed himself to sleep. When he awoke it was to find himself in darkness with the train flying along with terrific speed. He had been aroused by something soft and velvety creeping across his face. He struck a match to see what had disturbed him. To his horror he saw several large tarantulas.

Payne did not dare to strike another match, and he knew he was in imminent peril of his life. To leap from the door of the car, even if he could have forced it open, meant certain death. While these thoughts darted through his mind, a cold, hairy substance dashed itself in his face, and he fainted. How long he lay unconscious he does not know, but when he again came to life it was broad daylight, and the train was still speeding like the wind. He tried the door, to find it fastened, and that he was doomed to suffer hours longer, the prospect of an attack at any instant from the hideous creatures whose character he knew so well.

The straggling rays that penetrated the cracks of the door enabled him to see dimly the objects about him, and he recognized his visitors of the night before and saw that their numbers had been trebled. He looked about for a loose board, and found a small one, but he knew if he was attacked the tarantulas would leap at him, and he could not ward them off.

His apprehension was increased when he saw that they had engaged in a fierce and deadly combat among themselves. For hours he sat there facing these dreadful creatures, which neither advanced nor retreated. The night came on, and again he became unconscious.

When he knew what was going on about him he was on a cot in a hospital in Portland. He had been there a month and had gone through a well-nigh fatal

attack of brain fever. Meantime, the authorities having discovered his identity from his delirious talk, had telegraphed to his people, and the young woman he was to marry had hastened to his bedside.

He had not been found until the car was opened at its destination, when he was unconscious and raving like a maniac. A mark on his forehead indicated that he had probably been bitten by a tarantula. At any rate, antidotes for the poison were administered.

As soon as he was able to travel he started for home by easy stages, first having married the devoted woman, who had joined him under such peculiar circumstances.—Baltimore American

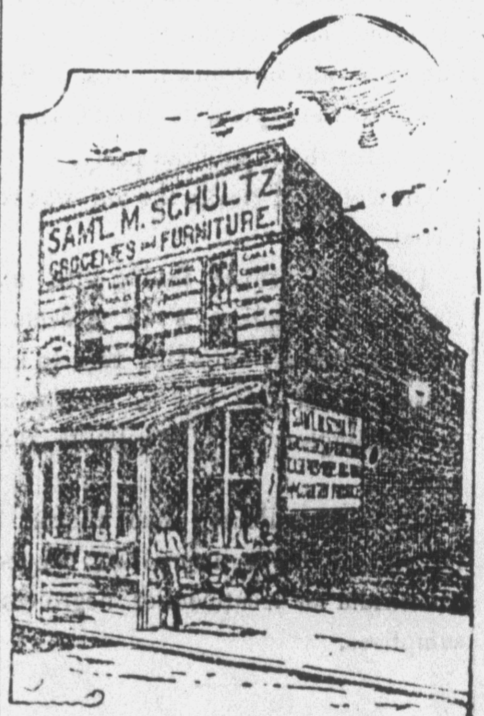

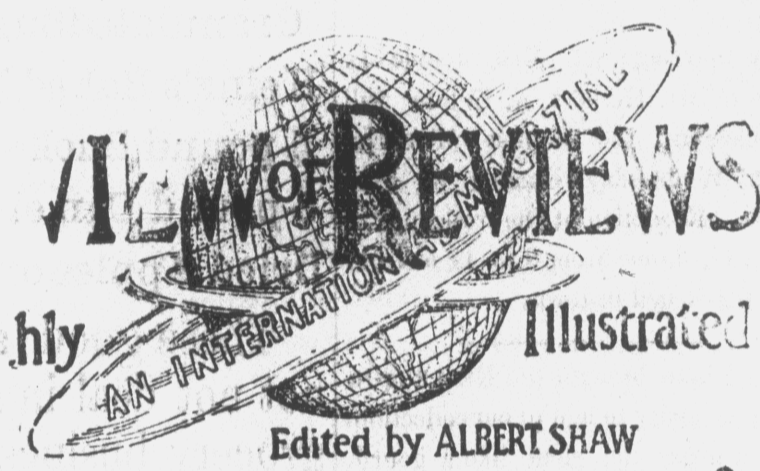
BETHEL ITEMS.
