THE LEGISLATURE.
Condensed Report of Proceedings.

THIRTY-SECOND DAY.

SENATE.

The following bills and resolutions were introduced:

Parker, of Randolph, to amend the charter of Southern Pines.

Clark, to incorporate the Bank of Enfield.

Yeager, authorizing the governor to furnish convicts to work certain roads and cut canals in Washington county.

Scales, relating to personal property; makes it a misdemeanor for persons to go to a store and get goods to look at and not return or pay for them.

The resolution to advance the cause of good roads that a committee be appointed to visit Charlotte and inspect the roads around said city and in the county of Mecklenburg was adopted.

HOUSE.

BILLS INTRODUCED.

Dixon, of Green, to allow county commissioners and magistrates in joint session, called after fifteen days' notice to by a majority vote adopt the alternative method of working the public roads.

Currie, to extend the time for organization of the Lumber River Railway Company.

Carter, to levy a special tax in the stock law territory in Nash county.

Currie, to extend the time for organization of the Bank of Lumberton.

Carter, to allow Nash county to levy a special tax to pay its debts.

Dixon, of Green, to allow Green county to levy a special tax.

Burgess, to increase the number of commissioners in Camden county to five.

Arrington, to provide for working the roads in Halifax county by taxation, (20 cents on \$100.)

Brower, to provide for redemption of land after sale under execution or mortgage, making it lawful to redeem land within two years after sale upon payment of the sum paid for the purchase, together with interest, provided both shall not exceed the principal and interest of the original debt, and at sales a certificate as to the sum paid shall be given by the officer making the sale.

The bill passed to incorporate the town of Boyette, Wilson county.

The "fellow servants" bill came up with a favorable report. It gives any employe of a railway the right to sue for damages and prevents any waiver of such right for damages.

By leave Smith introduced a bill to amend the charter of Selma.

Bills passed as follows:

To incorporate the Bertie County Confederate-Memorial Association.

To permit fish to be caught in any manner in Columbus county, (Lake Waccamaw excepted.)

By leave, Hancock introduced a bill to incorporate the Newbern Mutual Fire Insurance Company.

By leave, Petree introduced a bill to give authority to sheriffs and tax collectors by allowing collection of arrears of tax since 1891.

The bill appropriating \$5,000 to "North Carolina on Wheels" was ordered printed. It is favorably reported.

NIGHT SESSION.

The house met at 7:30 o'clock p. m., took up the calender and the following bills were passed:

To incorporate the Sovereign Camp of Woodmen of the World.

To incorporate the Supreme Ruling of Fraternal Mystic Circle.

To provide that the terms of justice of the peace elected last November shall end on the first Monday in November, 1898, their terms to begin as soon as they qualify.

To give White Oak township, Bladen county, the stock law.

To abolish Hertford criminal court.

To incorporate Bridgersville, Wilson county.

The senate resolution to investigate the charges of fraud in the matter of the last lease of the North Carolina railway was referred to the special committee on the lease.

By leave, Pinnix introduced a bill to place General Thomas L. Clingman, of Yadkin county, on the pension rolls as a first-class pensioner.

The bill to provide for a state exhibit at the Tennessee centennial was tabled.

A remarkable bill passed to require persons in Vance county, who rent lands to tenants to pay for one-fourth of fertilizers used by the tenant unless notice is given by the landlord when land is rented.

In Good Luck.

The readers of the REFLECTOR have often heard that if you found a horse shoe in the street and carried it home and nailed it up over the door you would have good luck. This morning at the depot we overheard a conversation between two colored men and it seemed as if one of them had found a horseshoe and went home to nail it up. After reaching his home he made preparations to nail the horseshoe on the wall over the door, in the presence of an interested group of spectators, consisting of his wife and three small children. No sooner had he struck the nail for the first time than the hammer slipped from his grasp and fell on the baby's head. At the second stroke he missed the nail, but landed on his thumb, and in the excitement of the moment pushed the stepladder over, mixing the rest of the family up on the floor. After gathering himself together, said several bad words, picked the horseshoe up and threw it out the window. Inside of two minutes the next door neighbor came in to complain that the iron missile had struck her pet dog on the back, and that as a consequence the animal was having a fit. He had to go out and shoot the dog, and now he vows that the next time he finds a horseshoe he will advertise for its owner in six newspapers.

WASHINGTON LETTER

(From Our Regular Correspondent)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12th, 1897.

The country is indebted to the democrats in Congress for their promptness in frightening the republicans from carrying out a scheme which might have upset the country and made no end of trouble had it once been started. This scheme was the contemplated objection to the counting of the vote of South Carolina, when Congress assembled in joint convention to count the electoral votes, by the negro member of the House from that State. Just as soon as the intention to make this objection was known, the democrats in Congress informed the republicans that if the objection was made and sustained by either branch of Congress they might as well abandon all idea of inaugurating McKinley, and that the count of the electoral votes would not be allowed to proceed. As soon as the republican leaders ascertained that the democrats were in dead earnest they repudiated the scheme, and put all the responsibility upon "that fool nigger," who was made to announce that he had changed his mind about objecting to the counting of the vote of South Carolina. Congress counted the votes all right and there was no trouble, but had not the democrats been prompt in showing their resentment the vote of South Carolina would have been protested and thrown out—not to help McKinley, but as the first step towards turning the state over to the negroes and others who thrived under the notorious Chamberlain-Moses regime.

Senators Hill and Turpie were the only Senators present who did not take part in the joint session to count the electoral vote. When the Senate, headed by Vice-President Stevenson, marched over to the House chamber those two gentlemen remained at their desks writing letters. They escaped a very dull three-quarters of an hour thereby.

The latest estimate is that the number of gold democratic postmasters, whose nominations will be left unacted upon by the Senate will exceed 200. Some of these were recess appointments and are now filling the offices to which they were nominated, but they will have to step out as soon as McKinley's nominees' successors and the Senate confirms them, and the silver Senators will do their part towards preventing delay in such cases.

The Governor of Arkansas evidently loses no opportunity to let the world know where that state stands on the financial question. The credentials of Senator Jones for his new term beginning March 4th, this week presented to the Senate, have the name of the State conspicuously printed across the top in silver letters and the great seal of the State is also silver. And Senator Jones is proud of his connection with a state which is so thoroughly devoted to silver, just as the State has shown its pride in keeping such a champion in the Senate.

An unexpected opposition to the

monetary conference bill has sprung up in the House, under the leadership of Representatives Hill, of Connecticut, and Brewster, of New York, who are uncompromising republicans, and supporters of the single gold standard idea, and both of whom have publicly stated their belief that the bill is the result of a scheme concocted by Senator Chandler and other anti-McKinley in trouble. Whether the opposition proves serious will depend altogether upon whether Speaker Reed wishes the bill to pass, and the indications are that he does.

Secretary Herbert's idea of fixing the limit of the price to be paid by the government for armor plate at \$400 a ton has been adopted by the Senate Naval Committee, and a clause to that effect will be added to the Naval Appropriation bill by the Senate. It is probable also—the committee has recommended it—that the Secretary of the Navy will be authorized to call any bluff that Carnegie and the Bethlehem Steel Co. may attempt to put up by refusing to make a contract to furnish the armor plate at the price named, by establishing a government plant for the making of armor plate.

President Cleveland ought to be getting used to having his vetoes overruled by Congress by this time. The bill making changes in the Eastern Judicial district of Texas, which had the support of the entire Texas delegation in Congress, is now a law notwithstanding a veto, and the House this week passed two private pension bills over vetoes. It is not surprising that Mr. Cleveland should have remarked that he had no influence with Congress.

Your interesting reference to the Crimean war brings to mind Tennyson's lines, which have immortalized the "Charge of the Light Brigade."

No one who was present in the ranks, as was the writer, can well forget the opening fire of Stonewall Jackson's 20,000 veterans, when he surprised Hooker's right after sunset at Chancellorville in 1863. This wing of the army rolled back upon itself with frightful loss and confusion by the advancing rush of the Confederates. For a time the worst fears were entertained by those who were in immediate command of the Union forces.

At this moment Major Keenan, with about 300 cavalry, was ordered to the charge "to hold the enemy back at all cost" until the guns, then "parked on the hill," were "placed" to save the army. The order was well understood by this brave officer, and immediately executed, 300 against "twice 10,000 gallant foes." Keenan's command was annihilated, "nor came back on his wounds to tell."

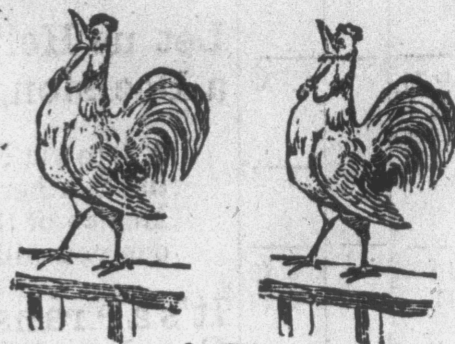
