THE LEGISLATURE.

Condensed Report of Proceedings.

THIRTY-SEVENTH DAY.

SENATE.

The senate met at 11 o'clock. The following bills and resolutions were introduced:

Person, to prevent co-habitation between the white and the negro race.

McNeill for relief of street railway employes; also to regulate loss on buildings by fire.

Hardison, to prohibit the sale of liquor in two miles of Cole, in Craven county, and in four miles of Stumptown in Onslow county.

Alexander, to incorporate Elizabeth college; also to give Charlotte further power in collection of taxes, where a person is believed not to have made an honest return; also to give Charlotte the right of acquiring real estate for better regulation of its water system.

Shaw, to abolish the circuit criminal court of Robeson county.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At the afternoon session the following bills were disposed of:

To incorporate the Bank of Pitt County.

To provide a dispensary for Louisburg.

To incorporate the Tar River and Carolina railroad.

To incorporate the James Baker Lumber Company.

To authorize Charlotte to issue bonds for water supply.

To incorporate the grand lodge of Knights of Pythias of the domain of North Carolina.

By leave Moye introduced a bill to establish graded schools at Greenville.

HOUSE.

The house met at 10 o'clock. Bills and resolutions were introduced as follows:

Craven, to create a board to control the convicts and roads of Mecklenburg.

Ornby, to require sheriffs in sale of mortgaged land for taxes to give notice of such sale to mortgages.

Alexander, to allow Tyrell townships to levy a school tax of 15 cents on the \$100.

Sutton, of Cumberland, to incorporate "Order of Unity," secret fraternal benevolent society.

Dixon, of Greene, to incorporate the Snow Hill railway.

Parker, of Perquimans, to divorce the Agricultural and Mechanical college from the agricultural department and put it under control of fourteen directors.

Person, of Wilson, to provide cotton and peanut weighers for Wilson.

Clanton, to incorporate the Independent Order of Farmers and Mechanics.

Dixon, of Cleveland, to protect freight shippers by requiring railways to pay cost price of goods if there is great delay.

Dancy, to incorporate the auxiliary board of health of Edgecombe county.

Meares, to allow Bladen county to pay election officers; also to entitle widows of all confederate soldiers to fourth class pensions.

Bryan, of Chatham, to give the governor the appointment of the clerk of the railway commission; also to repeal the act making \$10,000 appropriation for the geological survey; also to repeal the act of 1891 making \$15,000 appropriation to the university; to also protect coal miners.

Lusk, to allow judges of supreme and criminal courts to appoint stenographers and regulate their pay.

Ferguson, to repeal the act of 1895, requiring railways to redeem unused tickets.

TALKED AFTER DEATH.

Mr. J. T. Harvey, a young farmer in Nottoway county, Va., was pronounced dead by his physician a few days ago, but in a short time he began talking, keeping it up for five hours without displaying another sign of life, with the single exception of a slight movement of the throat and opening his eyes. He died then, surrounded by his distressed relatives.

The story, as it reaches Richmond through a reliable source, is that the young man had been suffering from the grip. The seriousness of his case was not realized, and his condition had become critical before a physician was summoned. To all appearances he passed away at about 5 o'clock in the morning.

For some reason the attending physician remained after the body had been laid out. While in the room alone his attention was attracted by a whistling noise, which he discovered was caused by air or gas exhaled by Harvey. He placed his hand on Harvey's head, and the latter began talking, but not in an intelligent manner, all that he said being confined to sentences of two or three words repeated in succession for many minutes at a time, such as, "Die young," "Die young," "Die young." He finally stopped suddenly five hours later, with a remark indicating that he recognized that dissolution was near at hand.

The physician made a careful examination for some other indications of life while Harvey was talking, but only detected a very slight movement at the rear of the jawbone. Not the slightest movement of the heart, pulse or tongue was apparent, and the throb of the jugular vein was totally absent. The body was perfectly rigid and cold.

Partial decomposition had set in several days before Harvey's death.

The case is said to be as much a mystery to the physician as to every one else.

Mr. Harvey was about twenty-two years of age, and lived with his parents near Nottoway Courthouse.—Richmond Times.

Special Bible for Mr. McKinley.

A special from Washington says the plan of some of the colored bishops of the Methodist church to have prepared and presented to President-elect McKinley a special Bible upon which he will take the oath of the office on March 4, will, if carried out, violate precedents. The Bible upon which Presidents have heretofore taken the oath of office has, with one exception, been provided by the clerk of the Supreme court. There is however, been no rule governing the matter. At Mr. Cleveland's first inauguration he requested that a Bible given him by his mother should be used.

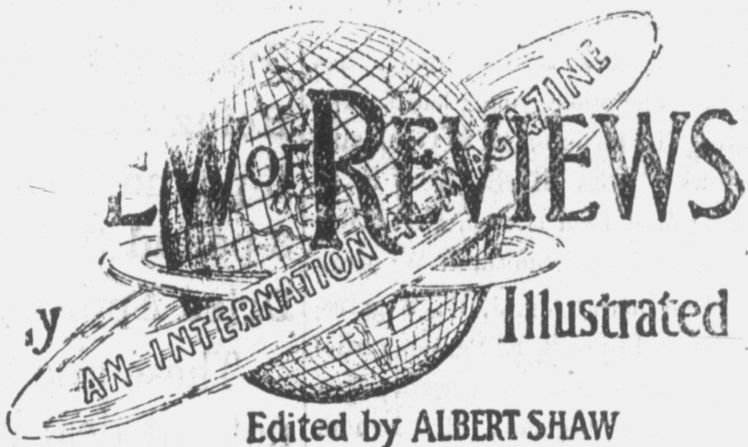

THE COUNTY FAIR.

Entertainment Given by the Students of the State Normal School Complimentary to the Educational Committee from the Legislature.

GREENSBORO, N. C. Feb. 17th, 1897

Ricklen; Miss Lela Brown, P. H. Gorman; Miss Mary Smith, J. W. Morgan; Miss Luara Cox, J. W. Wiggins; Miss Bettie Tripp, B. E. Parham; Miss Susie Saunders, G. J. Woodward; Miss Ludie Haddock, tagman; Miss Beulah Keel, a little negro boy.

The auctioneer and proprietor made things hustle. The buyers bid briskly and were not afraid of giving good prices, the break closing with a sale to J. W. Morgan for \$100 per hundred pounds.

Moore county deserves special mention. After the agricultural products were exhibited two young ladies came forward and unveiled the picture of the noblest, most wonderful son, not only of Moore, but of the State of North Carolina, Dr. Chas. D. McIver.

The most important feature of the evening was the Legislature, in which about fifty or seventy-five girls took part, each performing her part with much grace and dignity.

The purpose of the Legislature was to pass a bill increasing the appropriation to the State Normal School to \$100,000.

The exercises closed with a tableau, the Seal of North Carolina, in which one representative from each county took part.
