### THE LEGISLATURE.

Condensed Report of Proceedings.

—  
FORTY-SIXTH DAY.

#### SENATE.

Bills and resolutions were introduced as follows:

Person, to incorporate the normal and industrial school at Kittrell.

Grant, to authorize an election in Duplin county on the removal of the court house.

Yeager, to extend the corporate limits of Benson, in Johnson county.

Mitchell, to regulate the pay of mechanics, laborers and other hired help.

Scales, to change the name of the Normal and Industrial school to the Normal and Industrial college.

Alexander, to establish a normal school for the colored race near Charlotte.

Barker, to prohibit persons from building dams to injure others by back water.

The bill passed to allow Chowan Baptist college to confer degrees.

The bill to amend the charter of Edenton was tabled.

The following bills were disposed of: to extend the time to organize the Columbus Drainage Company.

To change the name of the Normal and Industrial school to "college."

to create a board of finance for New Hanover county.

To make a fence four feet high a lawful fence in Columbus county.

to incorporate the Lumber River Railroad Company.

To allow graduate of Asheville normal collegiate institute to teach in schools of the state without standing examination.

To regulate the sale of liquor in Cumberland and to establish a dispensary.

to hold elections in Craven, to submit to vote the building of bridges over Neuse and Trent rivers.

To allow Perquimans to issue bonds and levy special tax.

To give Lumberton the right to issue bonds.

to enable Cumberland county to pay its debt by issuing bonds.

to allow Onslow county to use its special tax for general county purposes.

#### HOUSE.

The House met at 10 a. m. The following bills and resolutions were introduced:

Crumpler, a resolution to adjourn sine die March 6th.

Carter, to allow the stock law district in Nash to have tax levy.

Cunningham, to regulate fire insurance companies by allowing the secretary of state to investigate rates and prevent discrimination.

Lusk, to make the salary of the attorney general's clerk \$300.

Ward, to amend the charter of Warsaw.

Person, to allow Wilson county to issue bonds.

to incorporate Wake County Live Stock and Poultry Association, giving it the right to have cock fights at any place in Wake county, this being done

by a provision in the bill which suspends the provisions of the chapter of the Code which forbids cruelty to animals. This bill was drawn by a Raleigh magistrate.

Chilcut, to repeal the special tax on practicing physicians.

Chilcut, to allow the state medical board to grant licenses to physicians who have practiced ten years.

The calendar was taken up and bills passed as follows.

to require all bankers and officers and directors of railways and state banks or other corporations created or chartered by the legislature to take an official oath.

#### A FINER RUN.

Fastest Time Ever Made on the Norfolk & Carolina.

On Sunday afternoon the editor of the REFLECTOR was a passenger on train No. 48 from Wilson to Tarboro. No. 48 is the through Norfolk & Carolina train between Wilmington and Norfolk. At South Rocky Mount, where this train connects with No. 78 going north, the latter was reported about two hours late. Having to wait for this train, it was 4:15 o'clock when No. 48 was given orders to pull out. It soon became noticeable that the train was flying along at a rapid rate, and in just 14 minutes had reached Tarboro, a distance of 16 miles, making a speed of about 70 miles an hour.

Knowing that the Norfolk & Carolina is usually a very fast train and anticipating that this run through to Pinner's Point would be a fine one because of the late start, we asked a passenger going through to keep time of the run and give us the result.

Pinner's Point was reached at 6:49, the entire run from South Rocky Mount having been made in 2 hours and 34 minutes, distance 118 miles. The train made 22 stops consuming an average of about 2 minutes each. This reduced the actual running time to a fraction less than a mile a minute. Some of the miles were made in 51 seconds and none took over 60 seconds. Capt. Edgar L. Hart was conductor on this flying train, with Engineer F. T. Beasley at the throttle. The train was pulled by N. & C. engine No. 412.

## NORTH CAROLINA.

Two colored men and a white woman confined in Nash county jail escaped on Wednesday night by cutting out a sewer.—Dixie Optic.

There are more than fifty students in the law department of Wake Forest college and others will soon enter. There are 258 students enrolled, representing more than seventy counties in the State.

Mr. T. S. Lutterloh this morning purchased from W. T. Horner, a Moore county man, the following hides: 1,460 rabbit, 33 coon, 16 fox, 38 mink, 2 otters, 81 opossums, 10 muskrats and 10 sheep. The amount paid for them was \$81.75. The otter skins brought \$6 and \$4.—Fayetteville Observer.

Miss Eva Mitchell, of Gates county, a pupil of the C. B. F. Institute, died there Sunday morning after a short illness, aged about 17 years. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jos. John Mitchell, arrived a few hours before her death. Her remains were taken to Gates county for interment.—Mufreesboro Index.

Among the universities and colleges which will meet the Tar Heels on the diamond this year are Yale, Princeton, University of Pennsylvania, LaFayette University, University of Virginia, Wake Forest college, Lehigh University, Oak Ridge Institute, University of Georgia and others of equal prominence.—Raleigh News and Observer.

The barn and its contents of Mr. Rueben Cress, who lives near the China Grove road about seven miles from town, were burned yesterday afternoon. Mr. Cress managed to get his stock from the stable before the fire had gained any headway and thus saved his horses and cows. In the barn which was burned there was 100 bushels of corn, a quantity of wheat, hay and other feed for his stock. Mr. Cress thinks the fire originated from a match in the loft.—Salisbury World.

Sunday the Mormons were to have preaching at Mr. John Patterson's. Mrs. Webb, a widow of the late John Webb, was one of the number present, but she didn't stay for preaching. Mr. Joseph Webber soon arrived and he and the sprightly widow of 65 short old summers left immediately for the state line and were made one. The young people present followed and witnessed the ceremony and the Mormons had no preaching. The groom is only about 80 years old.—Cleveland Star.

## Comfortable Shoes.

The heel is hollowed out, and in this hollow is a receptacle for a glowing substance similar to that used in Japan.

The heating substance in the heel keeps the water warm, and it circulates while the wearer is walking, thus imparting a pleasant warmth to the foot. A small safety-valve is provided, so that the bag cannot burst.

The warmth given by the sole never rises above seventy degrees Fahrenheit, and will last about eight hours. Popular Science News says that the sole is not unreasonably thick, being only slightly thicker than that of the wet weather shoe.

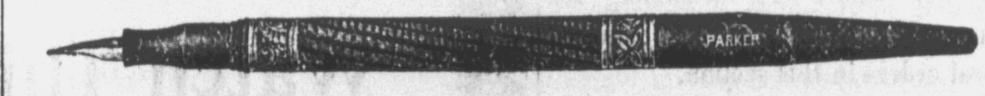

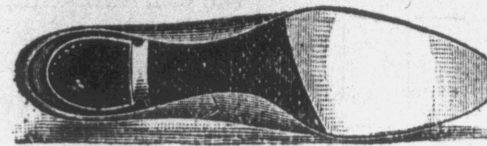
