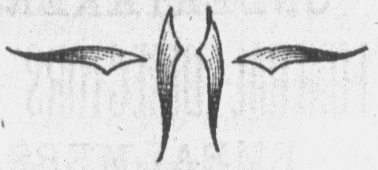

War in Cuba.

Washington, June 5--Captain W.D. Smith, of the Cuban Army, spent considerable time again today with the senate committee on foreign relations. In a brief interview with a representative of the Associated Press he said:

"The Cuban army is now in better condition to resist the Spaniards and to maintain the fight for independence than it has been since the beginning of the war. General Gomez has a well disciplined army of about 40,000 men who are determined to hold out until their efforts shall be crowned with victory. Our soldiers are rapidly procuring arms and every day serves to put them on a better footing in this respect. Our troops enjoy a vast advantage over the Spaniards in that they are not injuriously affected by the climate. I may say that I have not seen a case of yellow fever or smallpox among the Cuban soldiers since I have been on the island and that I have not been sick a day myself. Furthermore we have no difficulty in feeding our troops. In the portion of the county in which the Cuban troops are in control the provisions are protected and we draw our supplies from this source. Our commissary is therefore regularly renewed and our supplies are received in quantities quite sufficient to meet all our wants."

Commissioner's Meet.

The County Commissioner's were in session Monday and today. In addition to the regular routine business they elected the following as the Board of Education for this county, Fernando Ward, Albert Ward and Allen Johnson. Dr. Bert Moye was elected Superintendent of Health. They also called an election on Tuesday after the second Monday in August in each of the townships to vote upon the question of local taxation for the public schools.

PRACTICAL INFORMATION.

That the Seaboard Proposes to Furnish to People Along the Line of Its Road.

We will be glad to have you contribute to our exhibit. Whatever you want to exhibit we will carry over our line free of charge and if it is necessary for you to send someone to explain your exhibit we will furnish them with free transportation. We want to start about the 10th to 15th of June and we would like to have submissions made at once to address of Seaboard Air Line, Pinebluff, N. C., so that they can be provided for and arranged in our exhibit car.

Tell the Cook.

To rub tough meat with a cut lemon.

To use tender boiled asparagus tips for a nice omelette.

That lemon and orange peels are fine for flavoring sauces.

To squeeze the juice of an orange and grate a little nutmeg in the lemonade just before pouring it into the glasses.

To add a few drops of vinegar to the water for poaching eggs, to make them set properly and keep the white from spreading.

That stewed tomatoes, grated cheese and a couple of finely chopped boiled sausages is a fine sauce to serve with fried eggs.

That fried sweet apples are excellent for serving with liver or kidneys.

That fresh eggs taken from the shell and boiled in half a pint of sweet cream, and seasoned with pepper and salt, form a delicious breakfast dish. They should only cook two minutes in the boiling cream.

To use bacon fat for frying chicken or game.

That stale cake may be served with brandy sauce for dessert.

To steam stale rolls or a stale loaf of bread until fresh and warm through before serving.

To try dipping sliced onions in milk before trying.

That a squeeze of lemon improves scrambled eggs, and it should be added while they are cooking.

That the appetizing mint sauce is best made, from three table spoonfuls of finely chopped mint two tablespoonfuls of granulated sugar and a teaspoonful of vinegar. Wash the mint and free it from grit, chop it finely and put in a tureen with the vinegar and sugar cover closely for an hour.

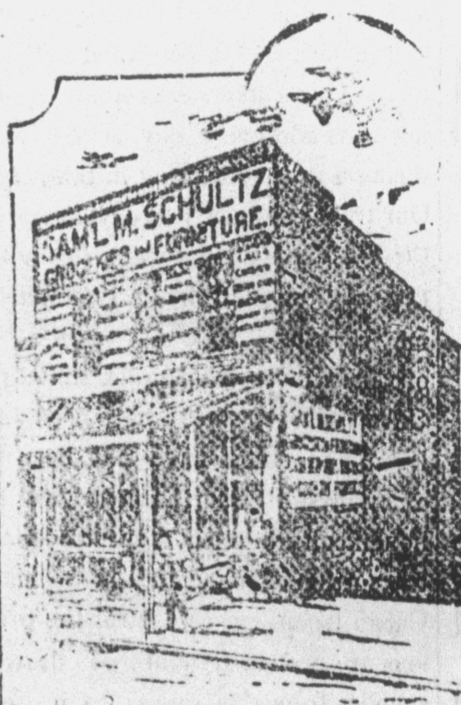

Diving For a Wife.

In many of the Greek islands diving for sponges forms a considerable part of the occupation of the inhabitants. A visitor to this unfrequented region describes the following rather startling custom. He says: "Himnia, which is a little island directly opposite Rhodes, is worthy of notice on account of the singular method by which the Greek inhabitants of the island get their living. On the bottom of the sea in this locality the common sponge is found in greater abundance than in any other part of the Mediterranean.

"The natives make it a trade to gather these, and their income from this source is far from contemptible. Their goods are always in demand among the Turks, who use an incredible number of sponges in the ablutions prescribed by the Mohammedan ritual. A girl in this island is not permitted to marry until she has brought up a certain number of sponges and given a proof of her skill by taking them from a certain depth. But in certain of the islands this custom is reversed. The father of a marriageable daughter bestows her on the best diver among her suitors. He who can stay longest in the water and bring up the biggest cargo of sponges marries the maid."

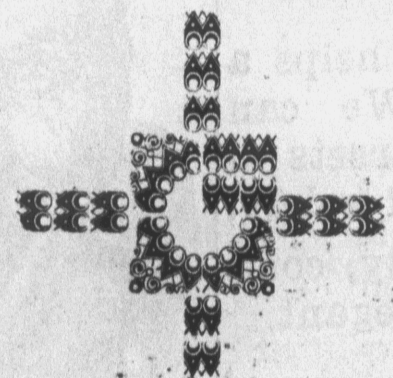

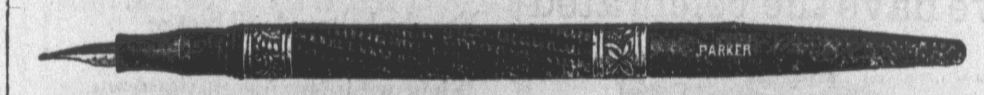

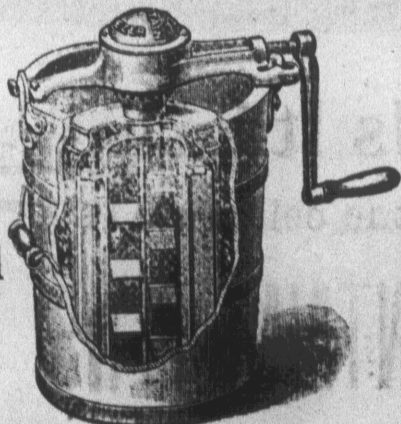
