W. B. QUINERLY ACQUITTED.

Solicitor Withdraws Prosecution, the Court Orders a Verdict of Not Guilty.

W. B. Quinerly, who in February last stabbed and killed Levi Langley, colored, was called before the Superior Court this morning on the charge of manslaughter.

The jury was empanelled and after the examination of three witnesses the State rested the case. The defense put eight witnesses on the stand, one of them being the defendant himself, and also rested the case.

At this stage Solicitor Bernard arose and stated to the Court that he had presented the case as strongly as he could, and in the face of the testimony that had been introduced it would be an injustice to a citizen and to the State to undertake to press the matter further and withdrew the prosecution. Judge Timberlake at once ordered the clerk to enter a verdict of not guilty. The entire testimony showed conclusively that Mr. Quinerly acted purely in self defense, Langley having pursued him for some distance and being in the act of assaulting him at the time he struck the fatal stab.

The defendant was represented by Messrs. Bond & Fleming and T. G. James.

Married people live longer than the unmarried, the temperate and industrious longer than the gluttonous and idle, and civilized nations longer than the uncivilized. Tall persons enjoy a greater longevity than short ones.

There is a hospital for colored people at Savannah, which is wholly supported by colored people. Connected with it is a training school for colored nurses, and a number of well trained sick bed attendants have been taught there.

The smallest of all the States, Rhode Island, has the largest population per square mile, or 218,44 persons. The figures of the last census show that if the whole Union were as densely populated it would contain 945,766,800 inhabitants.

The official commissions of some European nations are carrying on experiments with the pith of cornstalks, which is now to be put to unique use as a packing between the inner and outer shells of war vessels. When pierced with a projectile it will absorb water and swell so rapidly as to close the opening before the vessel has leaked to a dangerous extent. The outer rim of the cornstalk, ground up, is said to make a fine and palatable food for cattle and horses, comparing favorably with the corn blades, timothy hay and wheat bran, and it can be mixed with any ground grain.

The State board of tax equalization has completed the summary of the returns of property values, as follows: Number of acres of land 27,763,853, value \$110,463,977; town lots 82,998, value \$44,888,685; horses 172,708, value \$5,547,920; mules 125,052, value \$4,786,976; cattle 594,332, value \$4,175,656; hogs 1,280,140, value \$1,582,876; sheep 334,283, value \$317,496; bicycles 5,822, value \$128,561; unenumerated property \$58,715,100; bank stock \$2,739,846; foreign building and loan stock \$146,201; state building and loan stock \$134,808; dogs \$4,184; total \$234,142,594. There turns out to be no increase in the total over last year. The falling off is in bank stock, \$480,000. Mecklenburg county failed to report any, while last year it reported \$468,000.

A prominent grape grower from Eastern North Carolina told a News reporter today that the sale of grapes this season was far less than of late years. This gentleman attributes the decreased consumption of this fruit to the fear of appendicitis. "Do you know," said the gentleman, "the market North has been glutted all this season? Not because there was overproduction, but simply from the fact the people are not eating the fruit like they once did, and I attribute this to the average man's fear of contracting appendicitis.—Charlotte News.

THE CIGARETTE EVIL.

People of all nations have bad habits, which are acquired by a certain percentage of the population and which are by many carried to a point where they become obnoxious and dangerous evils. In many countries there are about as many of these bad habits as there are classes of people. The beginning of them with the individual is more often through the force of experiment. The Chinaman loves his opium pipe; the Russian peasant drinks his vodka, a cheap alcoholic stimulant, almost as he would water; the Frenchman is fond of his absinthe, a deeply insidious draught; the Englishman is ready to acquire almost any kind of a bad habit with a little novelty about it; the Indian loves to pour down any sort of cheap liquor until he cannot swallow another drop; the negro delights in craps and policy, and cannot get enough of either until he plays one too many times and gets the contents of another negro's gun, and the American boy, sad to relate, and too often the American adult, goes down from the effects of the cigarette. All the circumstances considered, there are few of these evils which are more insidious or more far reaching in results than the cigarette habit. It is to the cigarette that much of the modern degeneracy may be attributed. If there has been a decrease in the mental force and powers of the American people, in any degree, and such a charge has been made by several sociologists, there is no doubt that it can be attributed in part to the cigarette. While none believe that there has been a general deterioration of intellect, or a deterioration among any considerable portion of the people, there have doubtless been many minds stunted in their youth and had their full growth cut off by the noxious cigarette.

In the State of Georgia it is unlawful to sell a cigarette to a minor. In Tennessee not only the sale but the giving away of cigarettes to anyone, no matter how old, is prohibited under a penalty of fine and imprisonment, and the result is cigarette smoking in that State is confined almost entirely to visitors who bring their supply with them. Georgia unfortunately permits the sale of cigarettes to any one except minors; but as the law stands, it should be enforced, and any person or persons found selling cigarettes to parties under twenty one years should be made to suffer the penalty. In spite of charges made by judges and grand juries, in spite of grand jury presentments, in spite of indictments and convictions, the negro policy player will play policy; nevertheless the courts, it would appear, give him much attention, to the neglect of other classes of violators of the law. Unless the policy business is going to be broken up, which has not yet been the case it might be well to give the policy negro a breathing spell and pay some little attention to the cigarette law.—Savannah News.

The New York Sun says: The population of Yonkers at the last Federal census was 32,033. There are five States which at that time had but one city in excess of 32,000 population. That city was Charleston, which has now a population of 55,000. The five States are North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, Alabama and Mississippi.

The largest city of North Carolina is Wilmington, which has the same population as Schenectady, Raleigh, the capital of North Carolina, has as much population as Saratoga Springs, no more, and less than West Troy and Mount Vernon, N. Y. Asheville, Charlotte, Newbern and Durham are small places in North Carolina—villages they would be called in the north. Outside of Charleston there is no city of even the third class in the Palmetto State.

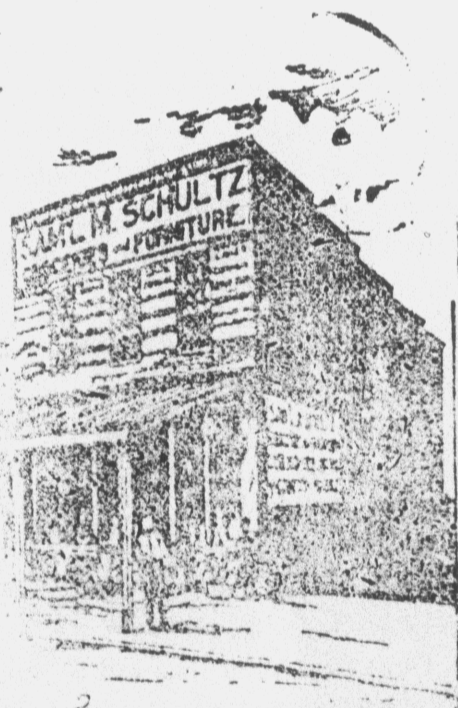

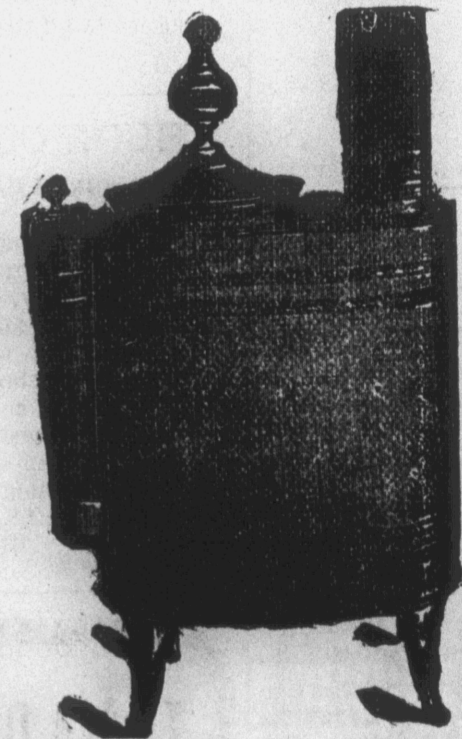
