WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From our Regular Correspondent) Washington March 11, 1898.

At last the administration and Congress have caught up with the people on the Spanish question. Congress has been all right all the time; it has only been waiting for Mr. McKinley to indicate what he wanted. This week he broke silence, and the result was that in 48 hours a bill appropriating \$50,000,000, to be expended at his discretion, had been unanimously passed by the House and Senate and carried to him for his signature. It does not matter whether it was the request of Spain for Fitz Lee's recall, which was so promptly refused by Mr. McKinley, or the certainty that the Court of Inquiry will report that the Maine was blown up from the outside, that has aroused the administration to the necessity of preparing to lick Spain. It is enough to know that it has been aroused, and that it is now pushing war preparations in dead earnest. Having given him all the money that will be needed before the actual fighting begins and left him entirely unhampered as to how it shall be spent, Congress is proceeding with its routine business, and holding itself ready for any further action that may be considered necessary. The only thing to be regretted is that Mr. McKinley had not asked for this appropriation a month or two ago. A month ago fighting ships might have been purchased in Europe that cannot now be had, owing to European war clouds and other reasons. We have got navy enough, however, even if the naval officer sent to Europe doesn't buy a single vessel, to lick anything and everything that flies the Spanish

flag, as will be proven in short order after the shooting starts.

The National Association of Democratic Clubs, which has made arrangements to celebrate the 155th birthday anniversary of Thomas Jefferson, by a subscription dinner, on Wednesday, April 13, at which Hon. William J. Bryan and Senator Jones, of Arkansas, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, will be guests of honor, has issued a circular letter urging all Democratic clubs to celebrate in some way by joining with the National Association "in a common homage to the memory of the great apostle of American liberty, the author of the Declaration of Independence, and the founder of the Democratic party, and in a fresh expression of our unalterable determination to preserve the heritage of freedom as it came to us from our forefathers, and to resist by every lawful means in our power the encroachments of organized wealth and monopoly upon the constitutional rights of the people.

Senator Ailen offered a resolution this week, which the Senate adopted calling on the Attorney General to inform the Senate how many writs of injunction were granted during 1897-'98 by the U. S. Courts, against labor leaders and labor organizations, and to furnish it with certified copies of such writs, the affidavits upon which application for them were made and of other papers connected with them.

Unless Mr. McKinley takes a notion to veto the bill appropriating \$288,000 to reimburse the publishing house of the Southern Methodist Church for war damage to its property, which was this week passed by the Senate, the Methodist brethren will soon get the money.

There may have been worse violations of the canons of good taste than that of the Providence, (R. I.) Board of Trade, in sending a circular letter to each Senator and Representative, in which the attempt is made to use the destruction of the Maine and the probability of war with Spain as an argument for the gold legislation asked for by the Indianapolis bankers' convention, but none such is recalled just now. Representative Freeman Knowles, of South Dakota, who is serving his first term in the House, is so far as known the only man in Congress who has answered this extraordinary circular letter, but the answer of Mr. Knowles was a very warm document, as may be judged from the following quotations therefrom: "I can find no language to express my abhorrence of men who will seek to take advantage of the patriotism of the people to force a financial system upon them which means their enslavement." "You are the same class as those who

took advantage of the people's patriotism in 1861-'65, to fasten upon the toiling masses a system of bondage by which you have absorbed to entire product of labor since the war." "This class would not hesitate to sell our country for gold, and would welcome to our shores foreign armies and navies, rather than lose the interest on their bonds. This is the same class which is now trying to fasten upon the struggling patriots of Cuba the \$400,000,000 of bonds which the European Shylocks have taken from Spain in return for the money they loaned that nation with which to butcher the Cubans." "You talk about going to war upon a gold basis. At the very first scent of danger gold always hunts its cowardly hole." "Men who would take advantage of the present delicate and strained foreign relations of their country to foist a robber financial system upon the people are, in my judgment, greater traitors to humanity than was Judas Iscariot or Benedict Arnold."

What the Fifty Millions Mean

Although Spain has disclaimed her objections to General Lee, and although the question of sending supplies to Matanzas and Saguala Grand has been settled by the employment of the dispatch-boat Fern for that duty, the administration still asks Congress for an emergency fund of \$50,000,000, and Congress will give it.

This means that the President has called upon the people to put at his discretion a sum sufficient to defend the country and the flag, come what may, and that the people, without distinction of party have responded.

Whatever the report on the Maine disaster may disclose, the \$50,000,000 will make us ready for any course that the cause of Cuba may lead to. With this fund options and offers for warships, contracts for guns, projectiles, and coal, night work at the forts, foundries, and ship yards, and whatever else may be required will be at his command.

The \$50,000,000 is a great peace measure. It diminishes the likelihood of war and increases the assurance that, if war comes, peace will soon follow on its heels.

The Country Editor

During the debate in Congress last week on the Loud bill relating to second class mail matter, Champ Clark, Democrat, Missouri, delivered the following eulogy on the country editor:

The Loud bill might not unjustly be entitled 'An act to diminish the supply of anti-Republican campaign literature.'

"Republicans, having nine-tenths of the great metropolitan papers, may find some excuse for supporting a measure which will squelch the country weeklies but certainly Democrats, Populists and free silver Republicans can not afford to do so unless they are meditating political suicide
