Flagship New York Demolishes Cabanas Forts.

"FIGHTING BOB EVANS" IOWA DRIVES BACK TWO SPANISH GUNBOATS.

Troops Ready to Move on Cuba—Paris Safe in Port—Austria Declares for Neutrality.

Two Delayed Telegrams By Telegraph to Reflector.

Washington, April 29—All amendments offered by the silverites to the bond proposition were defeated.

Washington, April 29—The Dingley war revenue bill providing for additional revenue of \$125,000,000 the first year of the war, and authorizing the issuing of \$500,000,000 bonds, has passed.

Another Victory

By Telegraph to Reflector.

Key West, April 30.—Commander Sampson's flagship New York has another splendid victory to her credit. She shelled the fortifications at Port Cabanas, thirty-five miles west of Havana, and in fifteen minutes they were a mass of ruins. Every shot from the gallant flagship was effective and carried destruction in its wake. The port had first fired on the Ericson and Porter, but did them no harm.

The bombardment occurred about 6 o'clock Friday evening. The New York found it necessary to use only her small guns to silence the land batteries.

Blanco had established signal posts along the coast.

Paris Safe

New York, April 30—The steamer Paris, about which there has been so much anxiety the past week, arrived safe in port here this morning.

Spanish Gunboats Repulsed

Key West, April 30—Two Spanish gunboats last night tried to run the blockade of the American fleet and gain an entrance into Havana harbor. They were promptly met by the Iowa who repulsed them both single handed. The Iowa is "Fighting Bob Evans'" craft, and he says these two gunboats were not a mouthful for him.

Troops Ready for Cuba

By Telegraph to Reflector.

Washington, April 30—Wednesday, May 4, has been selected as the date to move to Cuba the 6,000 United States troops that are now being hurried to Tampa. Gen. Shafter, who has been ordered to take command of the first detachment of the invading army, will transfer his headquarters to Cuban soil.

Arrangements for the transportation of 6,000 to 10,000 troops to Cuba are practically completed. The landing place decided upon is believed to

be either Matanzas, Cardenas or Sagua. On Monday the President will send nominations to the Senate for Major, Generals and Brigadier Generals to command the volunteers.

A Cabinet official this afternoon gave out the information that a contract had been entered into by the government for the construction of one hundred torpedo boats.

The administration will refuse to consider the protest of the Powers regarding the bombardment of Cuba.

Orders have been issued that the force of guards be doubled at all arsenals and powder mills against Spanish spies.

Austria Neutral

Vienna, April 30—The report that Emperor Francis Joseph had subscribed largely to the Spanish naval fund is utterly false. Austria will observe absolute neutrality.

COMPANY H. DID NOT VOLUNTEER

For the past week the Pitt County Rifles, Company H, have received much credit throughout the State to which they are not entitled. It got in some of the papers, notably Raleigh and Charlotte, that the company was the only one in Eastern North Carolina that had volunteered to go to Cuba.

Friday's Raleigh papers give still further credit by saying that the name Camp Grimes had been selected for the camp at Raleigh in honor of Company H, it being the first company to volunteer to go to Cuba and being from the county in which the late Gen. Bryan Grimes lived.

The company goes to Raleigh in obedience to the orders of the Adjutant General, but not with the slightest idea of going to Cuba.

Possibly when the boys get to Raleigh and catch the inspiration of the camp they may be ready to go to Cuba or anywhere else needed.

The Governor has appointed Col. J. F. Armfield, of Statesville, to be Colonel of the first regiment of volunteers. His salary will be \$3,500 per year while the war lasts.

Washington, April 29th '98. Complaints of tardiness on the part of the administration in pushing the war against Spain are growing louder each day, as indications increase that the administration is expecting a very long war, instead of a very short one.

Careless or impolite editors are not tolerated in China. The Peking Gazette announces that an editor of that city, who in referring to certain dead Chinese rulers had omitted to give their full titles, has just had his punishment commuted from being slowly sliced to pieces to simple decapitation.

The owner of the Holland submarine boat offers to sell his craft to the Government for \$175,000. As an inducement for the consideration of his offer he proposes to go to Key West, join Admiral Sampson's squadron, and with his own crew enter the harbor of Havana by night and throw a dynamite bomb into Morro Castle.

It's an ill wind that blows nobody any good. Government necessities have already called for purchases of 450,000 yards of woolen goods, and a big order for 1,400,000 yards of kerseys and flannels and for 76,000 all-wool gray blankets of five pounds each is announced for the competition of bidders.
