More Prizes

The Very First

By Cable to Reflector. Washington, May 6.—Secretary Long received the first dispatch this morning about Manila. It was from Minister Wildman of Hong Kong. It says that the wealthiest families at Manila, such as Cortez, Rosario, Donzago and Basa, had tendered their allegiance to the United States and petitioned for citizenship.

Americans Hold Manila

By Cable to Reflector. New York May 6.—A New York Journal dispatch from Singapore, says the Americans now hold Manila and are exercising the power of government. The forts have been captured and the Spanish fleet destroyed. The leader of the insurgents have been supplied with arms for the rebels.

Cable Repaired

By Cable to Reflector. Washington, May 6.—The government has just been notified that the Manila cable has been repaired. News from Commander Dewey momentarily expected.

Bread Riot

By Cable to Reflector. Rome, May 6.—A serious bread riot occurred at Santo near Florence this morning. A volley was fired into the rioters killing four and wounding several.

A Big Catch

New York May 6.—A big French trans-Atlantic steamer, Lafayette, from Havre for Vera Cruz was captured while trying to run a blockade at Havana with contrabands stored in her and Spanish officers aboard. When hailed off Havana and told she must not enter, she made a bluff by running up the French flag, but it did no good. Naval officers think this a breach of the neutrality proclamation. The captain of the Lafayette protested and demanded the removal of the prize crews, but it was not complied with.

To take Porto Rico

The Cabinet official said this afternoon that they expected important news Sunday.

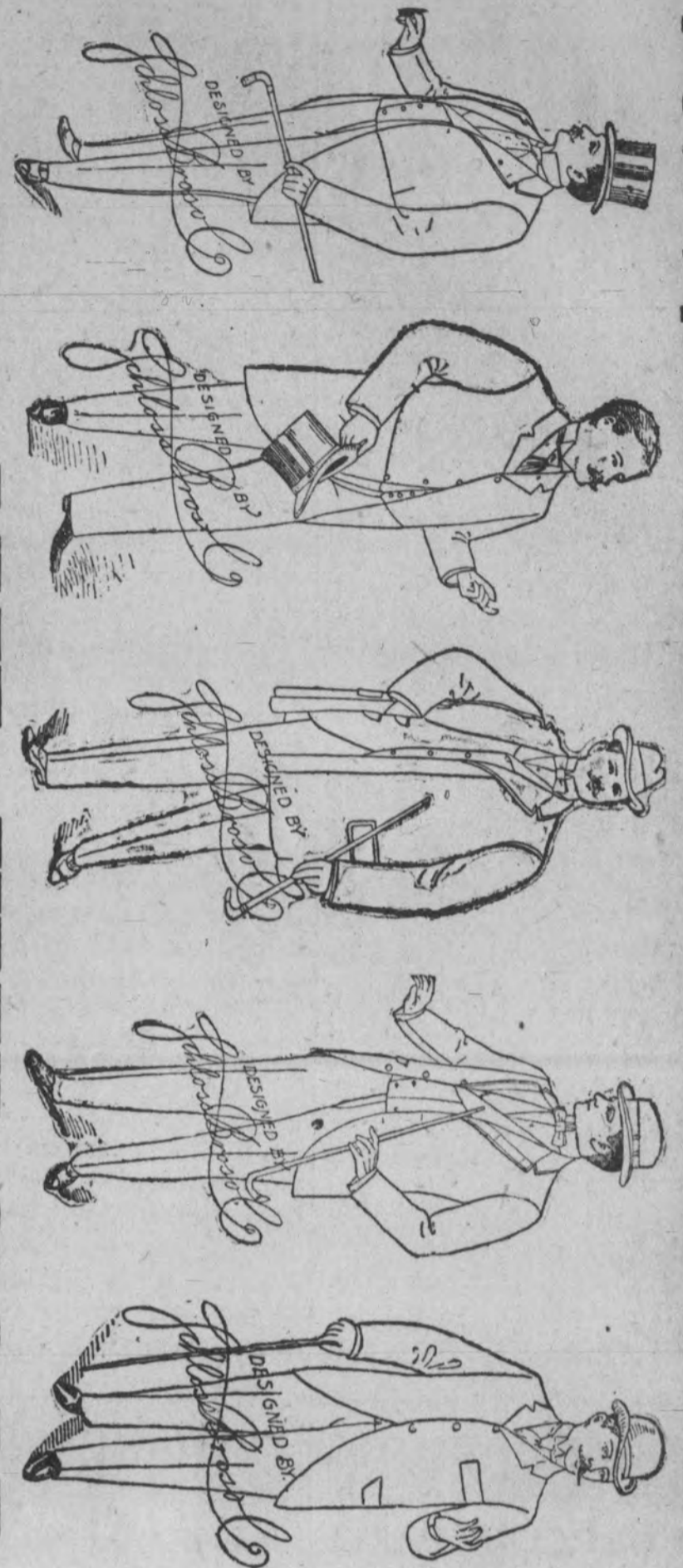

The beautiful flag presented by the women of Pitt county to Company B. was their pride and glory. It was burned in the great fire in 1896 and Company H. is now without colors. We hope the brave women of Pitt county will continue their aid and efforts to present to the Company before it leaves Greenville next week a beautiful flag commensurate with distinction conferred upon Pitt county by the naming of the encampment in honor of that gallant soldier and splendid citizen and gentleman Gen. Bryan Grimes, whose memory every patriot holds dear. We know there are willing hands and loving hearts who will respond to this most sacred pleasure. We trust it will begin before another issue of the Reflector that we may let the boys know through its columns that the good women of the county are with them, in sustaining their country's honor.

Dewey once Beaten by Spain.

New York, May 4.—A Washington special to the Herald says: Club chatter among intimates of Commodore Dewey revives the fact of a previous encounter with Spain, in which he did not come out first and causes the comment that he probably enjoyed settling a personal score along the line of duty to his country.

Love, not war, was the source of the original trouble. The devotion of Commodore Dewey to Miss Virginia Lowery, the handsome daughter of Archibald Lowery, one of the most prominent and wealthy of the "residential set" in Washington, is well known here. Miss Lowery was beautiful and a woman of definite views as what would make up her happiness. When very young she became engaged to a dashing, impetuous secretary of the Spanish legation, Count "Jack" Brunetti.

Her father refused to sanction the affair, but, declining all other offers, even that of the present hero of the hour, Miss Lowery kept during twenty years her plighted troth. Three seasons ago, with the consent of her father, she became the wife of the Duke D'Arcos her devoted and loyal admirer, who not only inherited a title and estate, but represented his country as minister to Mexico.

They say Dewey resented bitterly his defeat by a foreigner, and it is probably that he sent hot shots at Manila with added vim, recalling the horrid day when Cupid set Spain's flag above the stars and stripes on the trim of his heart's desire.

General Fitzhugh Lee—Event in His Life

Born, Claremont, Fairfax county, Va., November 19, 1835.

Entered West Point 1852.

Graduated and commissioned lieutenant in Second cavalry, 1856.

Severely wounded in a fight with Indians, and in May, 1860, ordered to West Point as instructor of cavalry.

In 1861 he resigned his commission and entered the Confederate service.

Was first adjutant general on Ewell's staff, and in September, 1861, was made lieutenant colonel of the First Virginia cavalry, and was later made its colonel.

Commissioned brigadier general July 25, 1862, and major general September 3, 1863.

Appointed by President Cleveland internal revenue collector for the western district of Virginia, 1895.

Appointed by President Cleveland consul general to Cuba in 1897.

Continued there by President McKinley, and remained until forced to return to this country.

Commissioned a major general in the United States army.

After all, daring and dogged determination to win are more valuable qualities in a commander than is book learning in the science of war.—Philadelphia Record.

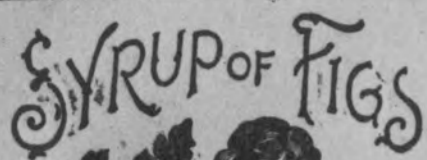
