## MIGHTY DULL NEWS

NOTHING OF INTEREST TO BE HAD FROM THE WAR

The Government Laying Plans for Tribute from the Islands We Captured!

#### Free Mail for Soldiers.

Washington, May 27.—The Post-office department has issued orders for the forwarding of newspapers and packages for soldiers from one place to another free of charge. This privilege is confined to first class mail alone.

#### Spanish Vessel Spying.

Key West, May 27.—The gunboat Wilmington sighted a Spanish scouting three masted steamer yesterday off San Key. The Spanish vessel was a good sized one but ran away when the Wilmington pursued.

A similar vessel has been seen in that vicinity for the last three nights, but is invisible during the day.

#### No News from Schley.

Washington, May 27.—Secretary Long asserts positively that he has no information from Schley concerning the Spanish fleet. He believes however, under the circumstances, that the fleet is at Santiago.

Gen. Miles strongly urges the immediate move on Porto Rico with twenty-five thousand men. Cuba requires many more which are not equipped.

Gen. Miles proposes to take regulars to Porto Rico.

#### Army Appointments

Washington, May 27.—The President nominated a large number of Brigadier Generals today, including Fred Grant, son of Gen. Grant, and William N. Gordon, of Georgia, but mostly they were promotions from the regular army of colonels and lieutenant colonels.

#### Beer Trust.

Cleveland, Ohio, May 27.—The consolidation of Cleveland breweries, with a capitalization of \$12,000,000, was completed yesterday. No foreign capital invested.

#### Looking to the Islands

Washington, May 27.—Senator Morgan offered amendments to the war revenue bill providing for the extension of the present customs of internal revenue and currency laws to the islands owned or occupied in the Pacific or Atlantic ocean. The regulations made by the President shall remain in force until altered, amended or repealed by Congress. The President is also authorized to appoint civil or military governors for such islands.

#### Crazed by Grief.

Goslen, Ind., May 27.—The wife of Rabbi Weinstein became crazy at the death of her child. She saturated her clothing with kerosene oil and then ignited it. She was burned to death in a few moments.

#### Miners Drowned

Pottsville, Pa., May 26.—At Kaska William's colliery yesterday the miners broke into an old shaft full of water. Six men were drowned by the rushing in of the water which filled the tunnels. Four of the men lost were Hungarians, the other two were William Derr and William Morgan. The bodies were not recovered until the water was pumped out.

#### Second Manila Expedition.

Washington, May 27.—The War department has chartered five steamers for the second Manila expedition with carrying capacity of six or seven thousand men. They are expected to sail Thursday next.

#### Strange Ships

## FUSION.

There seems to be a striking resemblance existing between the Democratic party at the present time, and the children of Israel after the death of Moses and Joshua, and the elders of Israel who outlived them.

The contrast is equally as striking which existed between the children of Israel and the mixed multitude of their enemies, among whom they had to live and fight, and by whom they were frequently overcome; and the same contrast seems to exist between the Democratic party and the mixed multitude of its enemies among whom it has to live and contend, and by whom it has been overcome in the two last campaigns.

The children of Israel were expressly forbidden to fuse with their enemies. They were told that if they did, by intermarrying with them, or by worshipping their idol gods, that their enemies would prove to be scourges in their sides and thorns in their eyes.

And while most of them were true to their laws, and obedient to their leaders, yet enough did frequently go off and fuse with their enemies to bring serious trouble among their tribes. So fusion with their enemies meant to the children of Israel, confusion of principle and sentiment, and invariably brought disaster and defeat to their cause.

All Bible readers know this is true.

Now lets see if fusion has not

brought the same results to us. A few years ago quite a number of our former friends, claiming to be Democrat, went off and fused with our common enemy—the Republican party. The result was confusion of sentiment among us, which brought disaster and defeat to Democracy, by destroying the best system of state and county government we have had since the civil war.

And now, in the face of all this we hear of some advocating fusion of Democrats with those who left us a short while ago, and defeated us fusing with our enemies.

Will true Democrats do this? We hope not—we think not. The only promise of safety to the children of Israel in dwelling alone, and we think the only safe thing for the Democrat to do is, to dwell alone, and make a straight clean fight on the principles of the old party, for as the immortal Vance said "Democracy is immortal, it will never die." It may be eye come and trampled in the dust by its enemies in the future as it has been in the past, but it will surely rise again if it proves true to its time honored principles; and we do hope the party will give us a ticket this year that will not make lovers of true Democracy feel bad after they have voted it, by having it mixed with fusion. While we would be glad to see those of our former friends who left us—for causes which they no doubt thought to be just return, and make common cause with us against our common enemy we are not willing to sacrifice our principles to get them back.

### Morro Castle.

There is a Morro castle at Havana and one at San Juan, Porto Rico. Many persons are curious to know why the Spaniards have these two castles of the same name.

The word Morro in Spanish means promontory, says the Atlanta Journal, and these castles are so named because they are perched upon commanding elevations in the two cities.

The word has frequently been spelled Moro and is supposed rather generally to mean "the Moor," but the spelling and the interpretation are incorrect. There is a rocky plateau in Mexico which is also called Morro, and on its vertical sides are inscriptions which were cut by the early Spanish invaders of that country. Morro castle, Havana, was once considered one of the most powerful fortresses in the world, but it is out of date now, and when the 13-inch guns of our warships are turned loose on it it will fall in short order. There are several fortifications in the vicinity of Havana much more formidable than the famous old castle with its infamous history.

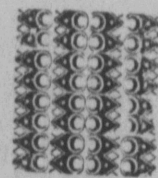
