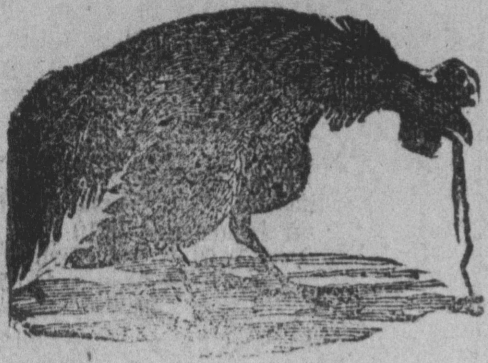

WHAT HAS OCCURRED.

Synopsis of the War News.

There are no material changes in the war situation for the last few days. Troops are gathering in the vicinity of Santiago, but the attack on the town is deferred until reinforcements arrive.

Commander Watson has sailed on the Newark for Santiago and will find his squadron ready off the Cuban coast. With his squadron he will first seize a base of supplies at the Canary Islands and then proceed to the coast of Spain and bombard the principal cities where shipyards are located. If Camara is recalled from Port Said Watson's squadron will probably meet him in the open sea and there will be a great naval engagement.

The Egyptian government has informed Camara that it would be a violation of the neutrality laws to permit him to take the hundred and fifty stokers engaged at port Said for the Spanish fleet and they will not be allowed to go aboard the ships.

Capt. Sigsbee has reported an attack on his boat St. Paul, by an unprotected Spanish cruiser and torpedo boat destroyer Terror, off San Juan Wednesday afternoon. The Terror made a dash for the St. Paul but was met by hot fire from the American, three shots taking effect, killing one officer and two men and wounding three others. The Terror retreated under cover of the fortifications and was towed into the harbor in a sinking condition.

Nicholas Fish, the father of Hamilton Fish Jr., who was killed in the charge of the Rough Riders last Friday, has made a request of the Secretary of Navy that the side arms and body of his son be sent to New York.

The President has decided that Gen Miles is not the proper officer to send in charge of the troops to Santiago, but that Gen. Shafter is entitled to such honors as may result from the campaign there. Substantial promotion will no doubt be given the officer highest in command and Miles covets this honor.

Oh, For More Trains.

One has to go away from home now and then to realize how far Greenville seems out of the world with only one train each way a day. We were made to feel very much this way on our recent trip to the western part of the State. Of course the time arrived when we wanted to come home—at least had to come or fail to heed the warning of a diminishing pocket book. Measured by hours necessary to make the trip, Greenville is twice as far from Asheville as some of our neighboring towns. For instance the trip from Asheville to Kinston is made in 12 hours, while it requires 15 hours more (27 hours in all) to reach Greenville, only 28 miles further. Coming the other way Tarboro can be reached in 14 hours, with an extra 13 hours to get from there to Greenville, 25 miles further. This town certainly ought to have more trains.

Courtesy of manner and courtesy of speech are the gifts a young man should cultivate.
