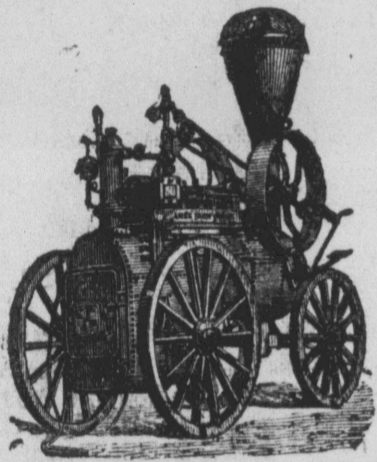

Near The Straining Point

London, August 20.—This has been a week of great but secret activity in the European political world. Great Britain has been making naval and other preparations in the far east, and holding conferences at home, which in ordinary times would receive a bellicose interpretation. Despite the disregard of Salisbury's bluster, it is certain that the limit of British concession has at last been reached, and any further aggression by Russia will bring war all along the line.

It may be said without qualification that no arrangement or understanding exists by which the United States would co-operate with Great Britain in the event of war. The most that Salisbury expects is that the United States maintain the same benevolent neutrality which Great Britain has taken through the Spanish war. While neither England nor Russia expects or desires war, there is serious danger that war will be precipitated by Russia's belief that Great Britain is not in earnest and that further aggression is possible without rupture. If, however, Russia knows the truth about English public opinion, she will stop short.

Neither Peace Nor War

Madrid, Aug 20.—Premier Sagasta states that the actual situation now existing between Spain and the United States is neither peace nor war, but that it is merely a suspension of hostilities. Spain desired a formal armistice, but the United States did not agree to it.

In resigning the sovereignty of Cuba and Porto Rico the Premier says Spain has not renounced all her belongings and the United States as an honorable nation, will not seek to annex that which cannot legitimately be considered as booty of war, according to the conditions under which hostilities were suspended.

Sagasta believes that the cessation of hostilities having been proclaimed, the taking of Manila does not count or affect the Philippine problem. One of the highest Spanish jurists says that among the ships captured by the Americans were many whose officers did not know of the declaration of war, and that their capture cannot be justified by international law.

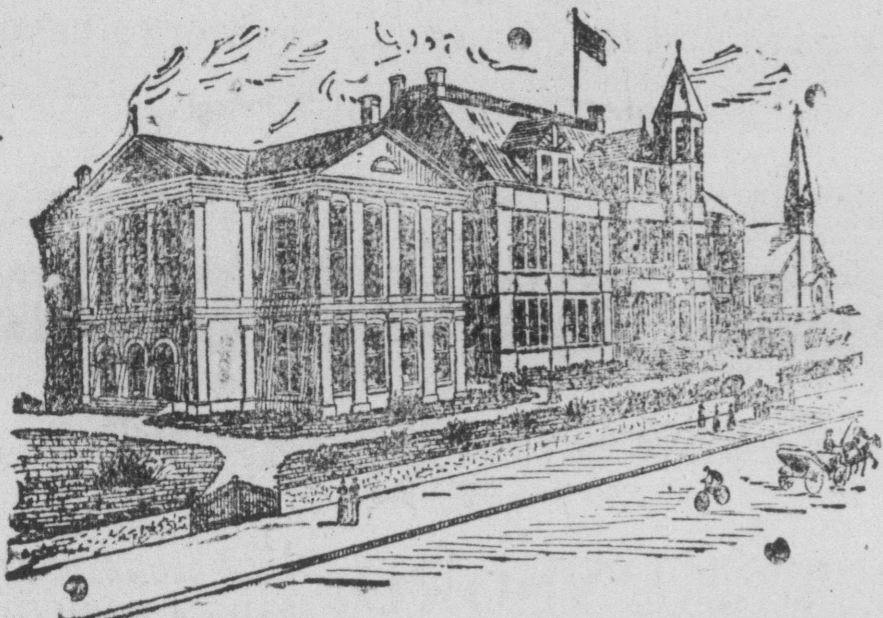

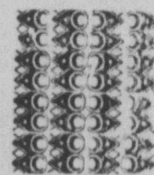

Dickinson Avenue and the Rail Road.

For some time Col. L. A. Sugg has been corresponding with the engineer of road way of the W. & W. R. R. Co., concerning the getting of heavy coarse gravel for the improvement of Dickinson Avenue and main street. The management have shown a generous disposition towards the town of Greenville and have written Col. Sugg that they would supply the necessary gravel from their gravel quarry at or near Rocky Mount, delivered at the depot at the price of 20 cents per thousand pounds by the car load. The gravel to be used for this particular purpose. This is a magnanimous offer on the part of the railroad management and shows an appreciative spirit upon their part for the interest of Greenville's progress and prosperity. It is only to be looked at for a moment that this is really a contribution by the railroad to make our streets what they should be for the towns best interest and comfort.

Twenty cents per thousand pounds will not pay for the meat and bread the hands will eat while bringing this gravel to Greenville from Rocky Mount. Clay can be obtained at or near the depot by simply digging to make the road bed and then gravel the clay and a better drive way can't be found outside of paved streets. We give the letter of Mr. H. M. Emerson relative to the matter which speaks for itself.
