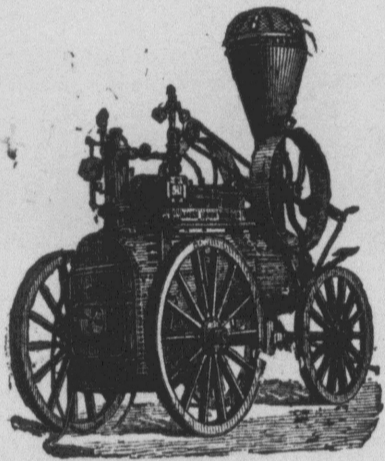

CAROLINA.

Hester's Annual Report

New Orleans, La., Sept 1.—The totals of Secretary Hester's annual report of the cotton crop of the United States were promulgated today. They show receipts at all United States ports for the year of 8,769,360 bales, against 6,829,100 last year; overland 1,237,813, against 910,482; Southern consumption taken direct from interior of the cotton belt 1,192,821, against 988,382; making the cotton of the United States for 1897,98 amount to 11,189,994, against 8,857,964 last year, and 9,901,251 in 1895.

Mr. Hester has made his usual investigation into the consumption of cotton by every mill in the South including woolen mills that have used cotton and the results show a total of 1,231,841 but of this 32,090 were taken from outputs included in port receipts. This total shows that the mills of the South have used up 189,170 bales more than during 1896-97, and that the South has nearly reached the one million and a quarter mark, against consumption by the Northern mills of 1,875,000. He makes the actual cotton crop of North Carolina 583,000 bales; South Carolina, 1,030,000; Georgia, 1,536,000 Alabama 1,159,000; Florida, 70,000; Mississippi, 1,627,000; Louisiana 740,000, and Texas 3,075,000 bales.

But in the meantime the Express Company communicated with the agent at Morehead and he said he was ten dollars short, whereupon a demand was made upon the bank for the amount, but it was not paid.

Inasmuch as the sender had not been communicated with, but having written in the next mail to know about it, the bank clings to the belief that the money belongs to him and not the Express agent. --Greensboro Record.

Oneida Cotton Mills:

About two and a half years ago my little boy about four years, and my little girl about two years, each had an enlargement of the glands about the ears. 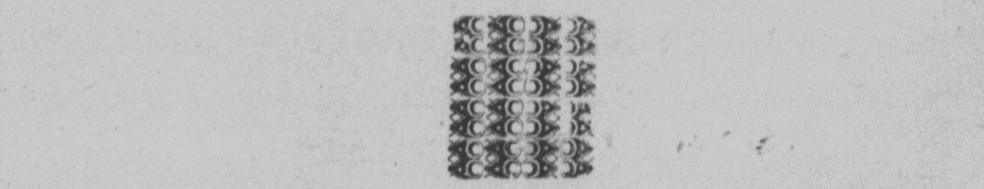

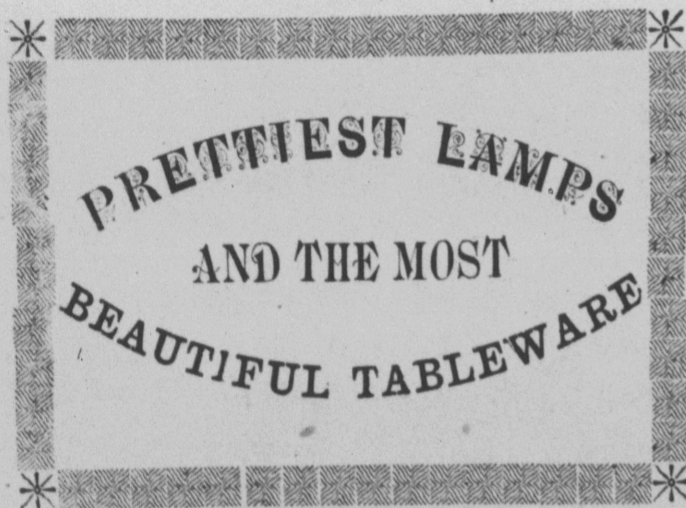
