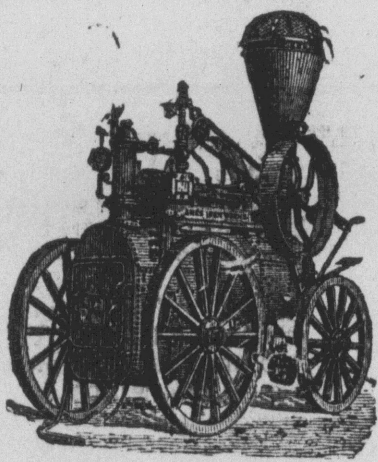

THAT BIG RALLY

On his way to the western part of the State, ex-Governor Jarvis stopped over a day in Raleigh and gave the Post the following account of the great Democratic rally at Johnson's Mills on Thursday of last week:

The meeting was a grand success and so much praise cannot be given the people of the township. It was distinctly their own affair. They got the speaking up of their own motion and without any aid from the county or the executive committee. All they asked of the county committee was to furnish the speakers. The arrangement was elegant. A large crowd was present, variously estimated at from 1,500 to 3,000. I think 2,000 a conservative estimate. There was an abundance of eatables well prepared for the whole crowd. There was not the least disorder during the entire day. Two speeches were delivered before dinner, to which the great crowd gave close attention. We then had an adjournment of one hour for dinner.

The great crowd gathered around the tables, which were 800 or 900 feet in extent, with as much good order and quiet as if it had been a great camp meeting. After the great crowd had been fed there was still a plenty left. The speeches before dinner were made by Hon. John H. Small, the Democratic candidate for Congress and the Hon. T. W. Mason. After dinner I spoke and I was followed by Mr. John Dail, who has been a Populist, but has returned to the Democratic party. His speech giving his reasons for becoming a Democrat was one that did his heart and head great credit. It will be published in full and I have no doubt will be read with interest and pleasure by thousands of Democrats and Populists all over the State. Mr. Dail was followed by A. A. Forbes, who was the Populist Senator from Pitt in the legislature of '95. The county candidates then announced their candidacy and the great crowd dispersed in the best of humor and good feeling.

All this occurred in a township where 2 or 4 years ago a crowd of 100 people could not have been assembled to hear a Democratic speech. The whole meeting was the creation of the neighborhood.

Wm. J. Bryan, as a token of their respect, love and esteem for him who, more than any man living, stands as the personification of the most vital issue affecting the welfare of all the people of our Nation and of the world."

Gen. Fritz Lee, who was ordered to Washington last week, has gone to West Point to visit his son, who is a cadet there, but will return to Washington in a few days. 
