"THE MILLERS DAUGHTER"

Charming Play—Delighted Audi-
ence.

Greenville people are once more indebted to Miss Sallie Lipscomb and the young people assisting her for evening of rare enjoyment. Those who remembered the presentation of "The Deacon" under her management a little more than two years ago, were delighted when it was announced that the amateurs under her management would christen the new opera house with "The Miller's Daughter." They looked for the splendid success to crown this occasion that had been present with the former, and in this expectation none were disappointed.

Miss Lipscomb used much care in selecting the characters for the play, and that she chose most wisely was attested by the genuine pleasure the very large audience derived from the play and the hearty encores the superb acting received. Had every character been a professional the acting could scarcely have been improved upon at any point.

The evening scene was a room in the home of "John Derwent." "Lord Harrington," an aristocratic son of "Countess Harrington," passing under the name of "Basil Lawrence," had been secretly married to "Elsie," the daughter of Derwent, and they kept their secret well. "Squire Thornton" held a mortgage on the Derwent home, and in satisfaction of this he had demanded that "Elsie" be given as his wife. The Squire visited the family to press his demand and when "Elsie" was asked to give her consent she firmly refused. This so enraged the stern hearted father that he disowned his daughter with a curse, and notwithstanding her plea and the earnest entreaty of her mother, she was cruelly driven from home.

The second scene was a mountain forest in which was the home of "Mountain Meg" a witch. The Squire appeared here and had an interview with the witch and bargained with her for the capture of "Elsie" who was to pass through the forest on the way to find her husband. The witch had under her control two ruffians,

"Humped Tom" and "Black Joe," who captured "Elsie" when she appeared. The Squire arrived and "Elsie" was about to be murdered for refusing to go with him when "Beauty Lynn" a maid in the Derwent home and a firm friend of "Elsie" came to the rescue and fatally shot the Squire. In one part of this scene "Lord Harrington" and his mother appeared, and she telling of a marriage planned for him caused him to confess his secret marriage. Not being of age his mother asserted her authority over him and prevented him returning to his wife.

The third scene represented "Countess Harrington" in her home with whom "Elsie" sought an audience to plead for the restoration of her husband. The Countess, a worldly, unwomanly woman, repulsed every entreaty of the young bride and brought the interview to a close by summoning a servant to show her to the door.

The fourth scene was in the midst of London social circles in which the Harrington and Hyde families took high rank, the Countess all the while trying to bring about the marriage of her son and "Lady Hyde." Her son in the meantime had been in a railroad accident and was so injured mentally that all his past seemed a dream and he went about as one bewildered. "Elsie," by the aid of her constant friends, "Beauty" and "Dickey Brown" was enabled to gain a place of prominence in the social circle under the disguise of "Mlle Cerani." She met her husband and knew him, and though some magic charm drew him to her he failed to recognize her. Finally when singing an old familiar song for him, his memory returned and he recognized in the beautiful woman his wife. This disclosure brought consternation to social circles, and when the Countess put her son to the test of choosing between mother or wife he proved his fidelity to his wife and took her away.

The last scene is back at the Derwent cottage. "Mrs. Derwent" had grieved herself to death over the loss of her daughter to death over the loss of left alone is well nigh desolate. "Beauty" tells him the story of "Elsie's" life since being driven from home, and that during all her trials she had never spoken unkindly of her father. The old man repents, "Elsie" returns and is forgiven, and later there is reconciliation with "Basil" also and all is well. In this scene "Beauty" and "Dickey" also get to an understanding of each other and wind up happy. All through the play they had been just under each other's thumb, awfully in love, but somehow a long time finding it out.

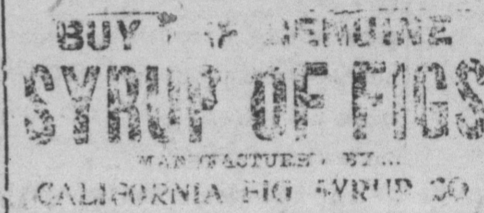

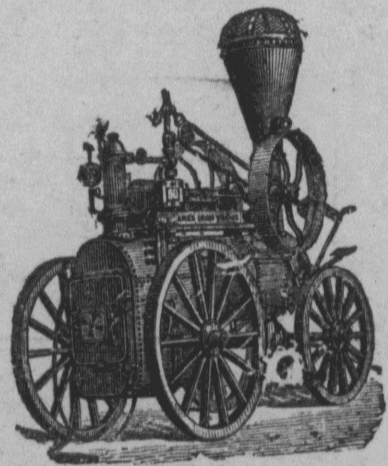
