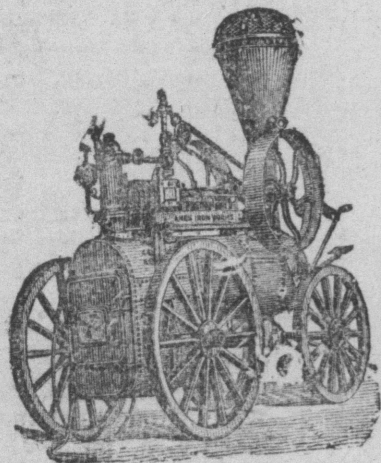

**Mere Negro Insolence**

KINSTON, N. C., Oct. 15.

To the Editor; We the under-igned wish to state through your columns what we observed this evening in passing from Greenville to Kinston. At the depot at Greenville there were about forty negroes and eight or ten white people. One young buck negro stepped upon an old farmer from Virginia, who happened to be sitting on one end of the depot steps. The white man complained and the negro cursed him insolently and threatened to knock him across the railroad track if he did not keep quiet and out of the way. The farmer's failure to get a pistol is all that saved the negro. In the depot the negro wantonly kicked over the valise of Mr. E. Dalrymple, of Philadelphia. On the cars sat a young half-blood, and while he paraded to the front of the cars it stopped at one of the stations Mr. D. R. Graves, of Selma, accidentally sat on the end of the seat next to the aisle. The negro returned and without a word crowded in by Mr. Graves and took his seat next to the window. As he went down Mr. Graves arose and took one of the three unoccupied seats in front. All of these were elderly white gentlemen, and all this happened in an hour.

**They Make a Poor Show.**

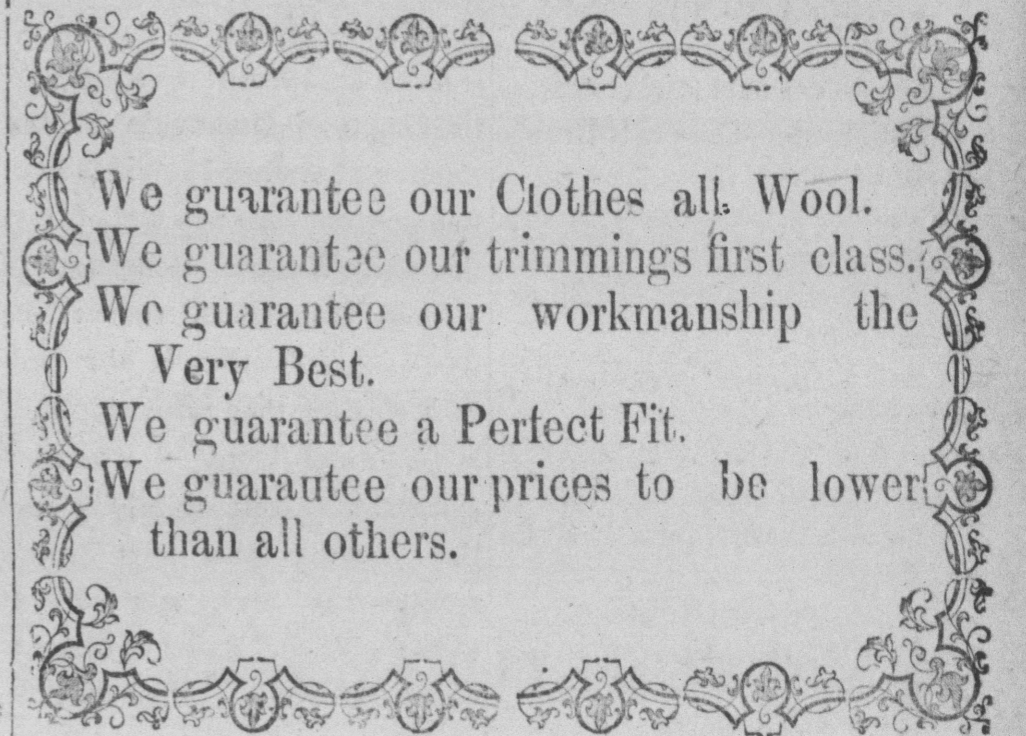

The Fusionists have been heralding it all over the State and county that a Democratic Board of Commissioners for the town of Greenville had as far back as 1878 appointed one William Henryhan colored as a policeman of the town, and in the "Great Speech" of Cy Thompson, which they have broadcasted over the community, this statement is made as a reason why no one should vote the Democratic ticket at this election. Many of the statements contained in Thompson's speech have been proven to be utterly false and he has been pilloried in public estimation as a falsifier.

This statement concerning William Henryhan is as equally false as some others contained in said speech. An examination of the minutes of the Board of Commissioners on page 75, show that at a meeting of the Commissioners on the 9th day of August, 1878, the following members were present, viz: E. E. Nelson, Mayor, Commissioners J. D. Cobb, T. R. Cherry, J. T. Williams, W. A. Quinerly and Redmond Caesar, col., and that the following entry was made upon the minutes of that meeting:

"The Board proceeded to go into an election of town officers which resulted in the election of Arthur Dennis as Chief of Police and W. H. Henryhan as Assistant Police, and further that Arthur Dennis shall receive for such ser-

vice rendered the sum of fifteen dollars per month and fees, and William Henryhan shall receive twelve dollars and fifty cents per month and fees."

Now every one in this community knows that the Mayor and every Commissioner on the above mentioned Board were at that time Republicans of the straightest sect—and were then, or had been Republican officials in the county. The Republicanism of these men no one dares to question. But now that they are all dead the Fusionist gang begin to lie upon them by calling them Democrats. Such statements are calculated to make a horse laugh and the people of this community who know the facts are horrified at such bold face lying.

As an evidence of the disgust of the people of Greenville at the election of Arthur Dennis (a penitentiary convict) as Chief of Police and William Henryhan (a colored, Republican runner) as Assistant Policeman, at the very next election they refused to elect a Mayor and Board of Commissioners, the result of which was that during the next twelve months the town was without either a Mayor, Board of Commissioners, Police or other officials, and it is said by those who are conversant with affairs at that time that it was one of the best and happiest periods in the town's history.

Upon the first publication, by a paper of another State, of the statement that South Carolina, Virginia and Georgia negroes are preparing to colonize in North Carolina, on account of their greater privileges and the better chance for them to get offices here, The Observer paid slight attention to it and did not copy it; but events are going to show that it was not a baseless allegation and the conviction that it is true grows upon us. Upon reflection one can see reason for it. There are at this time nearly one thousand negroes holding office in this State and they absolutely dominate some of our cities, towns and counties. In no other Southern State do any of them hold office, except possibly over people of their own color, and nowhere else are they a ruling power. There is reason, as we have said, why North Carolina should be an inviting field for the negroes of neighboring States.—Charlotte Observer.

The Fusionists are giving it out that Mr. E. A. Moye, of Pitt, was present at the meeting of the Populist committee when fusion was arranged with the gold and negro party. They knew that Mr. Moye takes no stock in their betrayal of the Populist party just as all the people know that their fusion with the Republicans was effected in defiance of the resolutions adopted by their State Convention.—Raleigh News and Observer.

The Church Bell in the Midst of the Organ.

The bell which for nearly half a century hung in the belfry of the High Street Presbyterian church, at the corner of Court and High streets, Newark, N. J., is now in the midst of the old church organ. The bell was exhibited by its manufacturers in the Crystal Palace exhibition in this city and got an award for

sweetness of tone. Recently the trustees decided to swap off the old organ in part payment for a more modern instrument. On Sunday evening, when James Tyler, the colored sexton, seized the rope to ring the bell, it broke in bonds at the first swing and went crashing down through the tower floors and plumped into the center of the organ. The bell, which weighs 1,505 pounds was not hurt, but the organ is a wreck. The instrument which is to replace the old organ is under way and the church will not go without music for any great length of time, but it is doubtful if there will be much salvage upon the old organ. The bell will be put back with new bolts to replace those which gave way.—N. Y. Sun.

Col. Harry Skinner says that the removal of 376 third regiment negroes from his district will greatly help him. The colonel, you know, hates a negro, and the negroes hate him. He is the Republican-Populist fusion candidate for congress in this district, and the colored folks say he cannot get to congress by their votes. The middle of the road Populists who voted for him two years ago say that he has gone over to the Republican party and has traded their party off to the Republican bosses, and that he can't go to congress by their vote. The Democrats are to vote for Small. So it appears that Skinner is leading a forlorn hope!—M. C. Pilot.

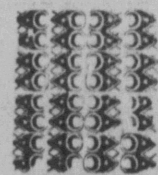

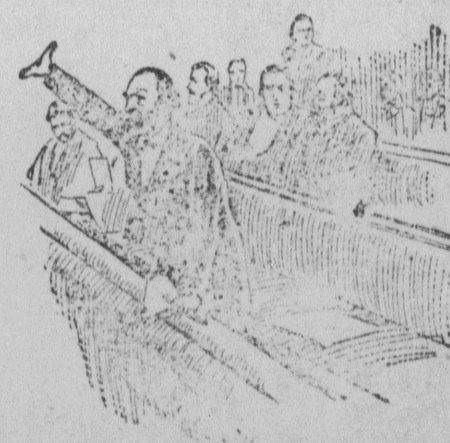
