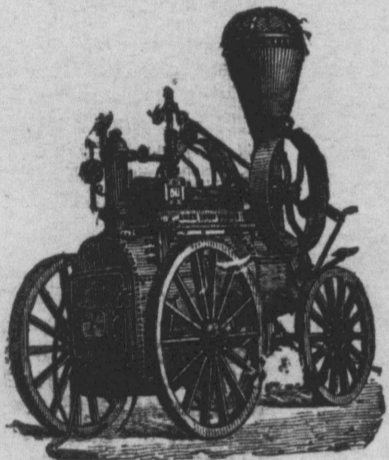

Spain Concedes Guam to the United States

Paris, October 24.—The adjournment of the joint commission was until 4 o'clock in the afternoon of Wednesday next. Guam, in the Ladrone islands, has been chosen by the Americans for the United States, under the terms of the protocol and its cession has been confirmed by the Spanish commission. Details of minor importance alone remain to be decided upon in connection with the cession of Porto Rico, the formal transfer of which is practically accomplished. The chief matter considered at today's session was the American reply to Spain's revised and renewed propositions for the last meetings, and the indications are that the Cuban question will be disposed of this week. But no details have been given out by either side regarding Spain's presentment of Friday last, or the American answer to be same submitted today.

Train Without Guidance

Binghamton, Oct. 25.—The Erie express ran from here to Susquehara without guidance, the engineer lying dead in the cab with the top of his head crushed. The fireman forced an entrance to the cab, being alarmed by the terrific speed of the train, and stopped the engine. The train is the fast express from Buffalo to New York and had over 200 passengers aboard. The engineer's name is Kingsley. The mail hanger struck his head.

We find the following news items in this morning's papers:

"It is learned that the national Republican committee has applied \$20,000 to aid the fusion campaign fund in North Carolina."

If any one doubts this news let him come to Fayetteville and hear the tale of yesterday's political barter and sale.

There were two factions of the Republican party in Cumberland bitterly opposed to each other, in fact sworn enemies to the death. Every effort had been made to reconcile them, but without success. A. E. Holton, State chairman, arrived in town yesterday, meets the factions separately, in the morning, calls them together in the afternoon, and in a twinkling the thing is done—fusion is as complete between the negroes as it is a few minutes later between the negroes and the Populists.

How much money did it take to fix these negro bosses? A considerable amount, certainly.

Day before yesterday this mongrel crowd had three tickets in the field, to day there is only one—the fusion ticket.—Fayetteville Observer.

Aginaldo's Trouble with the Insurgents.

Manila, P. I., October 24.—General Pio del Pilar, who is looked upon as being the foremost rival of Aginaldo for the leadership of the Philippine insurgents, has been summoned to Malolos, the insurgent headquarters and arrested. The charge against him is disregarding Aginaldo's authority and attempting to defy the Americans. Aginaldo has tried to remove several of the insurgent officers who are uneducated and unfitted for their positions, but he has been compelled to reinstate them. Aginaldo is desirous of going to Paris for the purpose of appearing before the peace commissioners, but jealousies existing between the insurgent leaders has prevented him from doing so.

The Fusionists have been heralding it all over the State and county that a Democratic Board of Commissioners for the town of Greenville had as far back as 1878 appointed one William Henryhan, colored, as a policeman of the town, and in the "Great Speech" of Cy Thompson, which they have broadcasted over the community, this statement is made as a reason why no one should vote the Democratic ticket at this election. Many of the statements contained in Thompson's speech have been proven to be utterly false and he has been pilloried in public estimation as a falsifier.

This statement concerning William Henryhan is as equally false as some others contained in said speech. An examination of the minutes of the Board of Commissioners on page 75, show that at a meeting of the Commissioners on the 9th day of August, 1878, the following members were present, viz: H. E. Nelson, Mayor, Commissioners J. D. Cobb, T. R. Cherry, J. T. Williams, W. A. Quinerly and Redmond Caesar, colored, and the following entry was made upon the minutes of that meeting:

"The Board proceeded to go into an election of town officers which resulted in the election of Arthur Dennis as Chief of Police and W. H. Henryhan as Assistant Police, and further that Arthur Dennis shall receive for such service rendered the sum of fifteen dollars per month and fees, and William Henryhan shall receive twelve dollars and fifty cents per month and fees."

Now every one in this community knows that the Mayor and every Commissioner on the above mentioned Board were at that time Republicans of the straightest sect—and were then or had been Republican officials in the county. The Republicanism of these men no one dares to question. But now that they are all dead the Fusionist gang begin to lie upon them by calling them Democrats. Such statements are calculated to make a horse laugh and the people of this community who know the facts are horrified at such bold face lying.

As an evidence of the disgust of the people of Greenville at the election of Arthur Dennis (a penitentiary convict) as Chief of Police and William Henryhan (a colored, Republican runner) as Assistant Policeman, at the very next election they refused to elect a Mayor and Board of Commissioners, the result of which was that during the next twelve months the town was without either a Mayor, Board of Commissioners, Police or other officials, and it is said by those who are conversant with affairs at that time that it was one of the best and happiest periods in the town's history.

"D—n the Principles"

A few days ago Mr. Robert Dalby, candidate for the senate, was asked by a gentleman: "What became of the great principles of the Populist party, as they are so widely different from those of the Republicans?"

Candidate Dalby warmly replied, "D—n the principles, all we want to do is to get in." He certainly spoke the truth, as this is the general sentiment of the office-seeking Populist.

Mr. Duncanson, one of the Populist board of county commissioners, making a speech some time ago in a Populist primary, urged the importance of Populist fusion with the party which would give most offices. This shows the true Populists of the county what the so-called leaders are after. They want to lead them into the negro party for the mere spoils of office.
