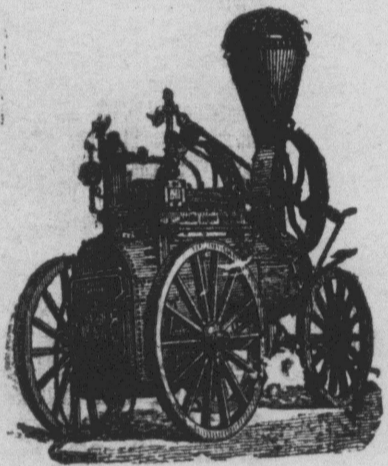

[Durham, N. C., Oct. 25th, 1898.
 Hon. F. M. Simmons, Chairman,
 Raleigh, N. C.:

Dear Sir: Your invitation tendering to me the honor of presiding over the "White Man's Convention" at Goldsboro, on the 28th inst., has been received, and under the circumstances, I accept the same with pleasure.

Up to the present time I have not taken any active part in this campaign, and my intention was to refrain from doing so, until I read today's dispatches from Washington to the effect that the President and his Cabinet are being importuned by men in high official position to send Federal soldiers in North Carolina to interfere with our local affairs, and to uphold by the aid of Federal bayonets those who would perpetuate, if they could, the present disgraceful condition of our local State government.

The time was, thirty years ago, at the end of the Civil War, when such things had to be tolerated, but no true hearted Southern man, who lived through the Reconstruction period, can wish to see a repetition of those dark and stormy days, when civil law was dominated by military strength to uphold partisan local government.

It is high time now for all true North Carolinians to arouse themselves from their lethargy, and come together as one man, with one mind, determined that our Anglo Saxon civilization shall be preserved.

The true white men of North Carolina, who love our State, should come together regardless of past party affiliations, and go the polls on the 8th day of November, with the fixed resolution that the present condition of public affairs in our State shall be changed, so that men whose chief business in life has been demonstrated to be that of trading on party fealty as the means of getting for themselves personal gain, shall be driven from power and place, and that those who succeed them shall be worthy and competent to guide the future destiny of our good old State.

They Did Not Speak

Last Saturday morning members of the White Men's Club heard that some white man was billed to speak to the colored people here that day. They said the colored people might speak among themselves unmolested, but no white man should come here and incense the negroes by stirring them up with any more political speeches. Feeling is already high and it was deemed unwise to have any excitement stirred up by the white men.

It was thought that a man named Wood was coming on the morning train: so when it pulled in at the depot and stopped at 10.30 a string of determined white men lined up alongside the train saying if any white man got off here to speak to the negroes he must get back and go on.

No one got off for that purpose. About 1 o'clock two men from the Caladonia State farm, steward O'Berry and guard Brown, came to town. They were asked if they came to speak to the colored people. They said they had not. Some words passed between them and one or two men on the street; but attention was soon diverted from them by a carriage rolling down Main street carrying four men. The carriage stopped near Hotel Lawrence. A. A. White, an active local Populist, stepped from the carriage, and before the other three had time to step out they were asked if they came here to speak to the negroes. They replied that such was their intention. They were told that they could not do it, and to move on. They immediately drove on towards the depot, took a circle around two squares, drove out of town, and departed over the very road which they had traveled in when coming into town fifteen minutes before.

The names of the men were given as Wood, Pope and Higgs from the Northampton State farm. Scotland Neck Commonwealth.

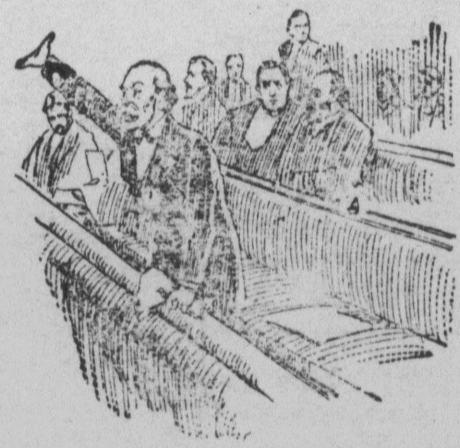
