History of the Spanish-American War," by Henry Watterson.

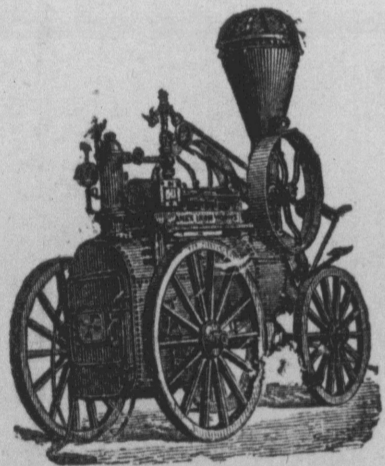

BETHEL, N. C. Nov. 2nd, 1898.
EDITOR REFLECTOR:
The White Government Union of Bethel township held its meeting last night in the town hall for the first time since its organization. The chairman of the Union, S. T. Carson, called the meeting to order. Committees on preparing the dinner for the picnic Tuesday were appointed. The next thing was to take the names of those who had not joined the Union but wished to join at this meeting. All the business of the Union was attended to properly. The next thing was speaking.

Col. N. M. Hammond, our townsman, introduced as our first speaker Hon. W. E. Fountain, of Tarboro, a man who has been chairman of the People's party of the state. Mr. Fountain made a speech of telling effect in the interests of white supremacy. His speech was direct from his heart. He made an earnest appeal to his Populist friends that they might see their error and come together in one solid mass and fight for white supremacy. His speech was made so plain that any person who knows right from wrong could not have misunderstood him. He was met with applause from the beginning of his speech to his close.

After Mr. Fountain had spoken there were cries for Dr. R. J. Grimes. He immediately took the stand and began speaking. The audience greeted him with applause after applause. Mr. Grimes, like Mr. Fountain, made a good speech and appealed to white men to stand together for white supremacy and the better interests of our grand old State. He made his illustrations as plain as day light, and any man if he had any reason in him at all could not have helped from submitting to what Dr. Grimes said.

Many of our Populist friends had their names put on the White Union roll. Everybody is aroused. Our crowd last night was estimated about 300. Many women were out showing their interest in this great cause. Look out for good news from old Bethel on the 8th.

The fusionists are beaten in every section of the State; let the victory while complete, be untainted with violence.

Col. Waddell Talks Business

Hon. Alfred M. Waddell addressed an opera house full of people at Wilmington Monday night, and his speech, which bears evidence of careful preparation, is printed in full in the Messenger. It is in the best style of this accomplished gentleman and orator, and according to the testimony of all the Wilmington papers, it moved the audience, mightily. "If," said he, "I thought the people of North Carolina would submit (I do not say consent) longer to the present condition of things, much less to the worse condition which would inevitably follow, I would be ashamed to acknowledge myself a citizen of the State, and would wish to shake her dust from my feet forever. It is precisely because I believe that they will not submit and ought not to submit to it that I am here tonight."

But here follows the gem of the speech: "I do not hesitate to say thus publicly that if a race conflict occurs in North Carolina the very first men that ought to be held to account are the white leaders of the negroes who will be chiefly responsible for it, and the work ought to begin at the top of the list. I scorn to leave any doubt as to whom I mean by this phrase I mean the Governor of the State who is the engineer of all the deviltry and meanness. I trust that no such duty will be thrust upon us, but if it is, I trust that it will be rigidly and fearlessly performed."

That's the stuff! That is the kind of talk that has been needed in North Carolina for a long time. Our quarrel is not so much with the negroes as with their pale faced allies and leaders. A. J. Russell, vile and venomous as he is, is not the only one--there are others, and they do not all acknowledge allegiance to Russell's party either.--Charlotte Observer

Hon. J. C. Buxton, of Winston, in a recent letter to the Washington Post relative to the condition of affairs in this State and the suggestion that troops be sent makes the following very forcible statement. It covers the ground as to the facts, and the determination of the white men to rule the State and the counties as well. Says Mr. Buxton:

"The registration laws of the State were arranged by the last fusion Legislature for the express purpose of inducing fraud, and all the excitement now existing in North Carolina has been brought about by the passage of these laws, which put it in the power of the Republican managers, with the registration books in their hands to add any number of illegal votes to the Republican column. The only speeches that have been made in Congress by Representative Linnay, from the district in which I live (the Eighth), have been upon elections as conducted in the Southern States, yet he is perfectly willing not to open his mouth in this canvass against the methods adopted by his party managers, by which, at least, 1,000 fraudulent votes will be cast for him in this coming election. The Democrats in the State are loyal to this government. They are as ready to fight for this government as they are in any section of our country, but loyalty to the government does not require of them that they should stand by and see their party robbed of victory by illegal imported negro voters. If

there is to be a riot it will grow out of this fact, and the very men who are appealing to the President for help are among the chief beneficiaries of the attempted crime. Senator Pritchard and Governor Russell realize that the Democrats are onto their game; truly believe they are whipped in the contest, and they are only laying the foundations for contests by which they will expect to throw out a sufficient number of Democratic precincts to give them the State and also the Democratic Congressmen, whom we fully expect to elect.

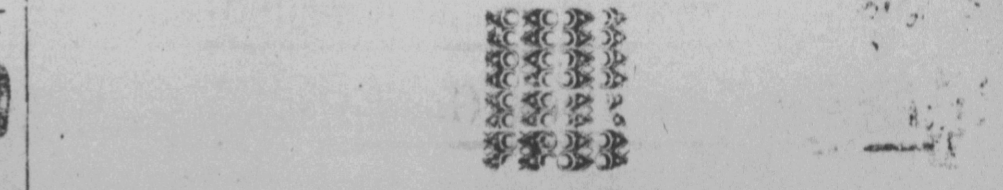

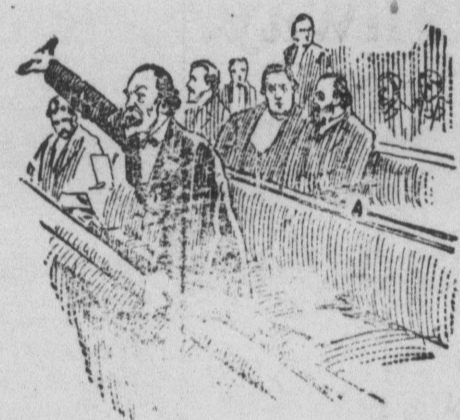
