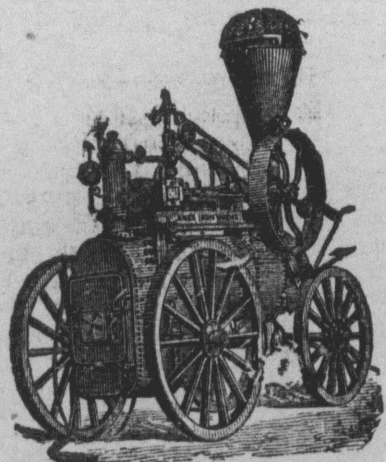

FARMVILLE RALLY

Another Big Day for Pitt County

It is according to Holy Writ that the last shall be first. Farmville was the last place in Pitt county to have a big Democratic campaign rally and barbecue, on Friday, and to say that it was a huge success is putting it mildly. It showed what can be done when the right people take hold of a thing.

The day was beautiful and the people turned out in large numbers, 2,000 being a conservative estimate for the crowd. It was nearly 12 o'clock when the cavalcade that went out to meet the speakers returned and paraded around the town to the stand. The procession was in charge of chief marshal W. M. Lang and his assistants, J. R. Davis, J. T. Smith, Jr., and G. H. Burnett. The procession was headed by a brass band and there was also a string band further down the line. In the column were 140 horseback riders and numbers of bugles, carriages and wagons filled with ladies, and there were flags and floats everywhere.

Ex-Senators W. R. Williams and A. A. Forbes made speeches before dinner, and the county candidates, Hon. F. A. Woodard, of Wilson, and L. I. Moore, candidate for Solicitor spoke after dinner. L. C. Barrett was master of ceremonies at the stand, W. F. Harding dividing the honors with him in introducing the speakers and presenting bouquets.

The dinner was a sumptuous one and was served excellently and in perfect order. Everybody had all they could wish for and there was an abundance left over.

READY FOR BUSINESS.

White Men Not Going to be Cheated Out of the Election.

There was a large and enthusiastic meeting of white men in the Court House, Friday night, which was presided over by that veteran Democrat, Dr. C. J. O'Hagan.

A. L. Blow, chairman of the county executive committee, made some remarks relative to frauds that are being attempted by the fusionists, and said that the meeting should take determined steps to check these frauds and prevent our being cheated out of the victory which has already been as good as won. He suggested that a committee be appointed to confer with the executive committee in formulating the best plan of action. The committee was appointed.

Maj. H. Harding introduced the following resolution, which he said needed no preface of whereas as the people already understood the situation:

Resolved, Is. That it is the determination of this assemblage of white men of Pitt county that there shall be a fair election on Tuesday next, and that we will not be robbed of the victory which we have already won.

2nd. That all attempts by the fusionists to cheat or defraud in the said election shall be dealt with as the offense deserves, and that we will hold responsible the perpetrators of such wrongs, as well as the advisors and leaders, and that we will not be deterred from this our purpose by either Executive proclamation or by the threats of Federal bayonets.

J. C. Koye offered the following to be added to the resolution:

That we will not only have a free ballot and a fair count, but we all as a committee of one, will see that each and every voter, irrespectively of race, color or past party affiliations, shall be allowed to cast one ballot if he chooses for White Supremacy, without intimidation or fear of future consequences.

The entire resolution was unanimously adopted amid a roar of enthusiasm.

Brief, stirring speeches were made by A. G. Cox, J. D. Cox, O. L. Joyner, Dr. C. O'H. Laughinghouse, D. C. Moore and Dr. C. J. O'Hagan.

It was truly an enthusiastic meeting in which the determination was shown that there shall be a free ballot and fair count on Tuesday. And that means the election of the entire Democratic ticket.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From our regular Correspondent,

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 4, 98.

The threatening attitude of the Spanish Commissioners at Paris, may not have been intentionally brought about by the administration for effect upon the Congressional election, but it has a suspicious look, and there are not a few persons who think that the wording of the written demand for the Philippine islands, handed to the Spanish Commissioners by our Commissioners, was purposefully made exasperating, so that the Spaniards would get up a few howls and threaten to withdraw from the peace negotiations. There is another thing that may have something to do with the Spanish howling. They had been given to understand, unofficially, that our Commissioners would agree to sugar coat the Philippine pill by agreeing that this government should pay \$40,000,000 of Spanish bonds, issued as a charge upon the Philippines, but as soon as that was published over here the protests were so numerous and vigorous that Mr. McKinley ordered the bond deal erased from the programme, and a promise to pay back what Spain had actually spent for the betterment of the Philippines—an indefinite sum—substituted therefor.

many Republican office holders gone from Washington to vote in a Congressional election, and not for many years has so much compulsion been used to make Republican voters in the government department go home. Very few Democratic government employees have succeeded in getting leave of absence to go home to vote, and the most of those who did get leave, vote in States that are so certainly Democratic that their votes will make no difference. Democrats who have votes in those districts or States who applied for leave to go home, were told that their services could not be dispensed with, owing to important business in their respective offices.

How officials regard Roosevelt's chances to be elected Governor of New York may be judged by the fact that they are talking about making him Ambassador to England, as a balm for his defeat, and to get him out of the country.

Gen. Greely, Chief Signal officer of the army, is very particular in all his public utterances to speak in high terms of Secretary Alger, and other officials who had anything to do with the direction of the war, but in a speech to a church club he let the cat out of the bag by saying that one of the principal reasons why the Signal Corps operated so successfully during the war with Spain was that it had a ship of its own, chartered in the name of a private individual, and not subject to control of the army or navy.

They are repeating in army and navy circles about how General Shafter tried to bluff Lieut. W. H. Stayton, commanding United States Ship Aliene, who had charge of the assignment of positions for anchorage, for sanitary inspection, to the troopships which brought Shafter's men from Santiago to Montauk. When the ship which brought Gen. Shafter was sighted off Montauk Point, Lieut. Stayton put out in his boat and ordered her to heave to. The only reply he got was an order to get out of the way or be sunk. Lieut. Stayton then ordered the Captain to stop or he would fire a shot through his ship. That's where Shafter made his bluff. "I am Gen. Shafter, and I am not going to stop for anybody," he yelled, and then asked, "Who are you, anyway?" "I am Lieutenant Stayton, of the Navy," replied that officer, "and am directed by the Secretary of the Navy to see that no vessel lands passengers without having been certified by the health authorities, and I order you to heave to, under penalty of a shot." Shafter then retired leaving the Captain of the ship to apologize, and to ask Lieut. Stayton where he should anchor pending the medical inspection.

It is evident to everybody that the bureau chiefs of the Navy Department are not friendly to Lieut. Jobson. He was ordered to tell a bear, composed of these chiefs, the present status of the wrecking work that is being done upon the sunken warships of Cervera, and to present his recommendations as to what should be done. Hobson made a long statement, showing what had been done and expressing confidence that if he was allowed to have his way he could save three more of those vessels—the Colon, the Vizcaya and Mercedes—and the Collier Merrimac, sunk by him. Incidentally he recommended that the contract under which a private wrecking company is being paid \$800 a day be annulled and all the work done by the govern-

ment. Hobson also said that he was disposed, if the department refused to furnish the money to continue the work of trying to save these vessels, to appeal to the people for contributions for that purpose. The board will recommend that none of Hobson's recommendations be adopted; that work on the Vizcaya and Colon be abandoned and that the Merrimac be dynamited instead of raised. In addition to this turn down, Hobson has been told that it will be considered "insubordination" if he attempts to do anything contrary to the recommendations of the board of chiefs. To show how real experts regard Hobson's assertion that the Colon and Vizcaya can be saved it may be mentioned that a Swedish wrecking company, the largest in the world, has offered to undertake the raising of both ships, this government not to pay a cent unless they are raised.

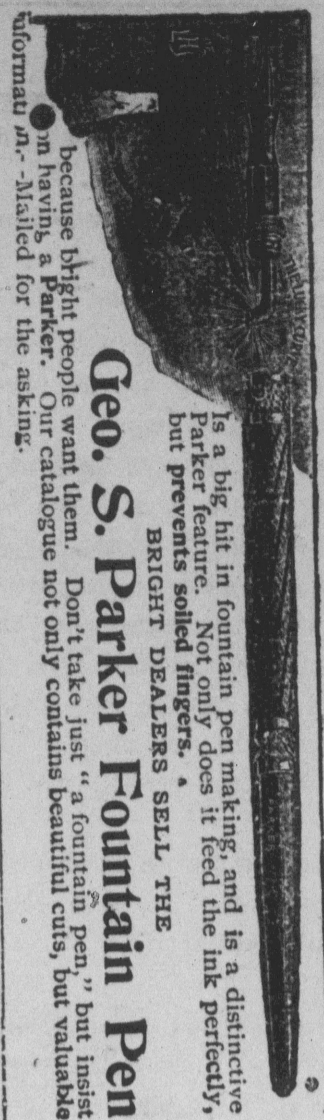

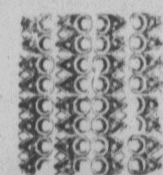

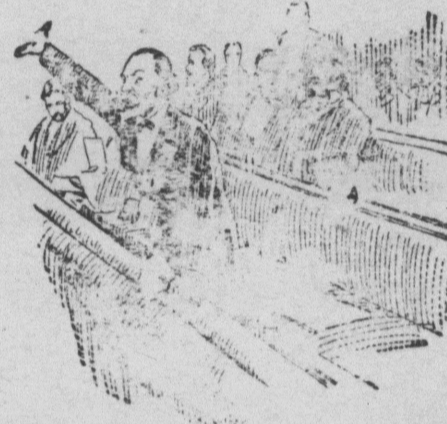
