INFERIOR SERVICE.

Passenger Coaches Should Be Better.

Sometimes ago THE REFLECTOR called the attention of the railroad authorities to the character of the passenger coaches which they use on this branch of their road, between Weldon and Kinston. Recently we took occasion to make a further observation of this matter, and the disparagement is so great that we cannot refrain from speaking about it again.

The coaches which are now in use on this important branch are really discreditable to the Coast Line system. The first-class coach is more or less repulsive to people who wish to have a feeling of comfort when they travel. The interior is very uninviting, the seats are badly worn and with holes in them in many places, and the woodwork is so battered and dingy that no amount of dusting and rubbing can make it look clean.

Going from this line to the main line one cannot help noticing the great contrast. Over there the second-class coach is far superior in every particular to the first-class coach on this branch. The coaches here are even inferior to those in use on the Rocky Mount-Plymouth branch. During the past week we traveled on both these branch lines and also on the main line and could not help noticing the difference in the appearance.

Judging alone from observation we believe that, locally speaking, the Weldon-Kinston branch brings as much revenue to the company as any other equal number of miles on its system, and it should be entitled to as good service. We took careful notice of this twice during the past week and there were as many local passengers from the stations between Greenville and Weldon as there were between Weldon and Fayetteville on the main line.

Greenville people would certainly appreciate better coaches being placed on this division, and we believe the people at other stations along the line, as well as all from elsewhere who travel over this road, would heartily join in this appreciation if the Coast Line officials place a better equipment on it.

Must Pay Tax or Can't Recover.

Following is one of the provisions of the machinery act passed by the last Legislature:

"If any person shall, with a view to evading the payment of taxes, fail or refuse to give in to the assessor any bonds, notes, claims or other evidences of debt which are subject to taxation under this act, the same shall not be recoverable by action at law or suit in equity before any of the courts of this State until they have been listed and the tax paid thereon."

Feet Froze Off.

Happenings in North Carolina.

The town of Spring Hope had a big fire Wednesday night.

Guilford county has purchased machinery necessary to macadamize the roads.

Raleigh keeps on finding new cases of smallpox. One colored man there who has the disease cannot be found by the authorities, his friends keeping him hid.

The date for the meeting of the Teachers Assembly at Morehead is June 13th to 18th. Prof. W. H. Ragsdale, of Greenville, is President of the Assembly.

The South's Needs.

The feature of the cotton market just at present is the lack of speculative activity. While there is a bearish feeling, there are no rampant bears—no bear leaders at any rate. The market is in a waiting mood, waiting to see what the new acreage is to be.

The South is much more deeply interested in the corn acreage, and hog crop than it is in the cotton acreage. In the rush of a backward season there is danger that the corn acreage will be decreased; and if it be, the hog outturn will also be hurt. North Carolina ought to produce corn and hogs enough to satisfy home consumption. If the farmers of the State will meet consumption in these two respects, no one will object to their cotton acreage, no matter how large it may be. A State that is full of corn, side meat, eggs, cows and greens is a State that can afford to ignore the current talk as to a great cotton acreage. But the trouble is North Carolina is not full of these needful articles. We need more acres in corn—more hogs, more cattle and particularly more hens. In some States the little brown hen is the most important and lucrative creature contained therein. It has been the salvation, it is claimed, of Kansas, as the cow has been of Iowa.—Goldsboro Argus.

Sheriffs Must Make Out Their Own Tax Receipts.

Advance copies of the machinery act passed by the last Legislature have been sent to every county for the information of the county officials. The "machinery act" is so called because it provides the machinery, or manner, of listing property and collecting taxes.

We are pleased to note that this machinery act omits a clause of the machinery acts passed by the three previous Legislatures, by which omission it is estimated that nearly \$10,000 will be saved the taxpayers of the State. This omitted clause was in these words.

"The board of county commissioners shall also cause the register of deeds to make out duplicates of the tax list, to be made in stub books with blank receipts for the use of the sheriff or tax collector."

This clause had never been in any machinery act until the Legislature of 1893 inserted it, and the Legislatures of 1895 and of 1897 also inserted it. Before 1893 the sheriff of every county did this work, or had it done at his own expense, but since then the register of each county has been paid for doing it. This (Chatham) county paid \$100 a year to the register for doing this work and we suppose other counties paid about the same.

The Record claims the credit of first calling attention to this useless expense, and before the Legislature met urged that it be omitted from its machinery act. And the week after the Legislature met this writer in person called it to the attention of Chairman Holman, of the finance committee, who promptly promised to omit it from his machinery act.—Chatham Record.

A Reminder of Old Times.

In former years there were in some sections of this country many who believed in witches and witchcraft. If evil befell any person or domestic animal in certain neighborhoods, the person or animal was believed to have been bewitched by some enemy. It was also believed that if the image of the witch whether a man or a woman, was carved upon a tree and shot with silver bullets the evil spell would be removed. This practice prevailed in the "Lucksburg" section of Sampson, near where Mr. J. R. McPhail now lives. A relic of it was discovered the other day when a party of hands found the image of a woman graven upon a cypress which they cut down. Imbedded in the tree several inches inside the bark were found several pieces of silver that had been shot there to break the spell of the witch. When the pieces of silver were arranged, they proved to have formed a dime of the mintage of 1850.—Clinton Democrat.

Hard on Tobacco Pinhookers.

A ruling has just been made by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue that has created consternation in the loose tobacco markets everywhere. His decision holds that a dealer, after receiving tobacco from a farmer is required to pack it in hogsheds, cases or bales before offering it for sale to another person. A large number of dealers in

North Carolina and Virginia markets buy exclusively from farmers at their barns, haul it to market, and sell it on warehouse floors. Oftener they buy after the tobacco is unloaded at the warehouse and resell without moving or rehandling the piles. Many thousands of pounds change hands this way daily, and the custom which has been in vogue for thirty years was stopped Monday by agents of the revenue department as illegal. It works great hardship, and Congressional representatives are being called upon to secure at least a modification of the harsh ruling, which is all in favor of the American Tobacco Company, for whose benefit, we suppose it was passed.—Ex.

White Man Teaching a Negro School in Duplin.

There seems to be some feeling in the neighborhood of Rose Hill, Duplin county, growing out of the teaching of a negro school by a white man and the public criticism made about the matter. The Democrat does not know anything of the antecedents of the teacher in question, whose name is Daland, but it assumes that he is a Northern man and a new comer to this section. He perhaps came with a head full of erroneous ideas about the South and the negro, as is not at all strange for a Northern man to do, and it emboldened to disregard custom and defy public sentiment. In teaching a negro school he has violated an unwritten law of the South, the penalty of which is social ostracism. This is a matter in which there is no suspension of judgment when a man, having had the impropriety of his conduct called to his attention, hardeneth his heart and stiffeneth his neck. Mr. Daland perhaps accepted the school for the pay that he receives for his service as a pedagogue. If he comes among us with a missionary spirit with a view of repealing a social law of the South which may appear unjust in his own eyes, his mission will be resented.

As a man who has set up to teach others, it is rather strange that Mr. Daland has not learned that when in Rome he must do as Rome does.—Clinton Democrat.

It has been in operation five years and has paid in dividends 70 per cent. before the last one. All the dividends put together, then make 100 per cent. This is a remarkable record and most encouraging to those who would like to invest money in such enterprises. It seems to us reasonable that Eastern Carolina ought to be able to do as good business in the cotton mill industry as any other part of the State. Tarboro is forging ahead for another mill and there is room for hundreds more before the business is overdone.—Scotland Neck Commonwealth.

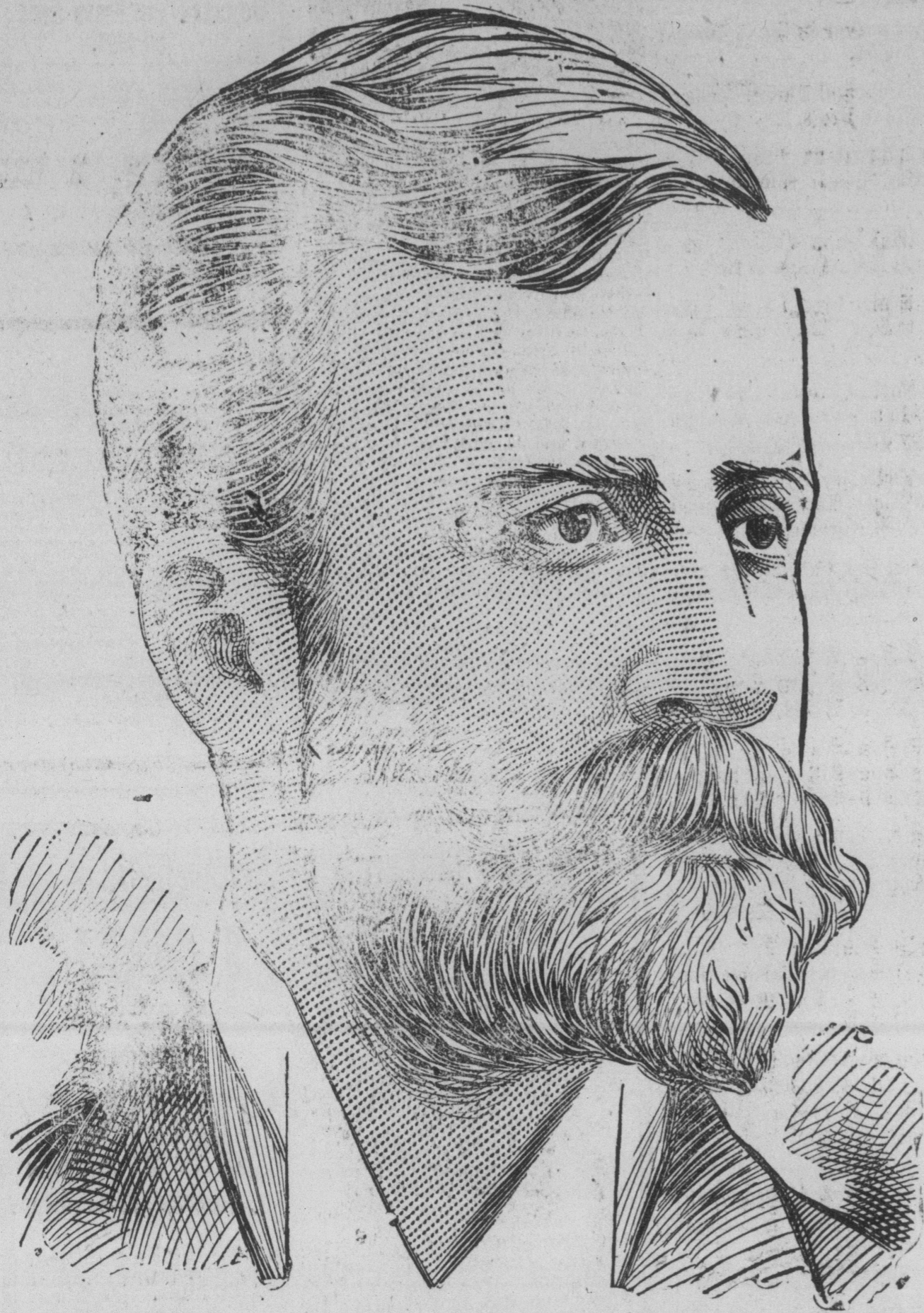
