Some men came through with a very large bear yesterday evening which was quite a rarity and a crowd soon gathered to see the show.

The wind and hail Thursday evening did lots of damage between here and Ayden. Besides the damage to crops the wind blew a large oak down on Mr. David McGlohon's kitchen crushing it to the ground and breaking stove, dishes and everything else.

Yesterday Steven Moore, colored, who lives 10 or 15 miles east of here, stole a bushel of meal out of the mill-house and sold it to Harrington & Barber. As soon as it was found out W. B. Wingate got out a warrant and Constable House went after him. When brought before J. R. Johnson he plead guilty and was bound over to court. This is not the first time they have missed corn out of the mill-house, but guess this man will not take any more.

DOWN THE COUNTRY.—The A. G. Co. Mfg. Co. sent a big wagon load of Tobacco Flues down the country yesterday and it is going to act like wild fire. Why? Because when the people see that these are made of first class material, that the work is first class, that the set is fastened securely together making it impossible for it to come apart at any time, and that they charge no more for making one style of flue than another, but always sell by the pound; when they see all this orders are going to come in with a rush.

The Election Case.

The trial of those citizens charged with interfering with the election and intimidating voters at Parkers X Roads precincts continued all day Friday before the U. S. Commissioner, and was resumed again this morning. Friday eight witnesses were examined, seven of them Populists and one negro, none of them, save one, testified that any of the crowd in any way intimidated anybody or prevented a vote being cast, but that everybody voted who desired to do so.

Assistant District Attorney Spiers came this morning to help conduct the case for the prosecution. The case dragged along slowly through the second day with no indication of the end being yet in sight.

Drunkness Not an Excuse.

It is so very common for people to get drunk and commit crime and then plead drunkenness in extenuation of the offense, that a recent decision of the Supreme Court on this subject is of more than usual interest. Last August Avery Kale killed young Geo. Travis in Catawba county, and at the time of the killing Kale was drunk or at least under the influence of liquor. He was arrested, tried and convicted of murder, and his case appealed to the Supreme Court. In a recent opinion in this case the court says:

"Upon trial of an indictment for murder, shown to have been committed while the prisoner was drunk, the judge below properly refused to instruct the jury that if 'they believe from the evidence that the prisoner had been drinking to excess during the week in which the homicide had occurred, and that at the time of committing it he was really intoxicated, and if by reason of these facts they should believe that the killing was the rash act of a drunken man rather than the vicious act of a sober man, then the prisoner would be guilty of murder in the first degree.' Such instruction would leave out of view the consideration whether the prisoner had made himself drunk for the purpose of executing a premeditated, wicked intent to kill, or whether he availed himself of a drunken condition to execute a premeditated resolution to do the act.

Voluntary drunkenness is never an excuse for a crime (State vs. Keath, 83 N. C., 526); and if one voluntarily becomes drunk and kills, without justification, it is murder. State vs. Wilson 104 N. C., 868.

The test of one's accountability when drunk is his ability to distinguish right from wrong, and where one in a drunken state kills with a deadly weapon the law implies malice, which is not repelled by drunkenness, and the burden of disproving malice is upon the accused.

Where the murder is premeditated, its degree is not reduced by drunkenness. State vs. McDaniel, 115 N. C., 807."

This decision is not new law but it is so often the case that drunkenness is made an excuse for crime; and so often the case that men who are too cowardly to commit crime when sober get drunk for the special purpose of doing something mean, that public attention needs to be directed to the recent decision of our highest court on this question.—Statesville Landmark.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.
Washington, D. C., May 19th, '99

If the scheme of the Reed chairmen of the most important committee of the last House to keep their places under the new organization of the House is a success, the next Speaker will find that he is merely at the head of the old Reed legislative machine. The argument put forth by these schemers is little short of ridiculous. If accepted it would mean that every man at the head of an important committee had a right to stay there as long as he could get elected and his party could control the House. Such a plan would be unjust to the Speaker, who would be little more than a figurehead, if he could not control the make-up of the committees, and equally unjust to the members who wish to better their committee positions. The Reed machine says that all the old chairmen who were re-elected should be given the same places, and points to fourteen vacant chairmanships, owing to retirement of the old chairmen, as the only ones that the new Speaker should put new men into; also that none of the members of important committees should be displaced. That would give the new Speaker fourteen chairmanships, only four of which are important—Accounts, Banking and Currency, Coinage, and Printing—to distribute among his supporters, and 57 vacancies to fill on eighteen of the important committees. It is said that these holdovers intend to form a combine to prevent the election of any candidate who will not agree to their plans.

Representative De Vries, who will have the honor of being the only democrat from California in the next House, is in Washington. He says the Governor is going to appoint Burns to the Senate, with the understanding that he is to be seated at the same time Quay gets in, and that the appointment will give the State to the democrats.

General Joe Wheeler returned to Washington this week, but not upon any order from the War Department. He has no immediate expectations of being ordered to Philippines, because the administration is too busy hoping that the fighting is over to be thinking or ordering officers to go there.

Representative Gaines, of Tennessee, is in Washington on business. Speaking of the political outlook he said: "The democrats have only to stand firm, re-nominate Bryan make some additions to the Chicago platform, and they will sweep the country in 1900. Bryan's re-nomination is assured, for he is just as much admired in the strongholds of the party as he was in '96. The next platform will declare for free silver, but will also declare against expansion, militarism, and the trusts, which threaten the destruction of the nation. What makes the prospect all the brighter for the democracy is the term and divided state of the republicans. When Congress meets and the majority tries to enact ironclad gold-standard legislation, it will find out the true sentiment of the country on the financial question."

Kentucky republicans were perfectly willing to have the gold democrats vote with them to carry that state, but they are not willing to have the gold democrats rewarded with Federal offices, and they have through Senator Debee, filed a vigorous protest with the administration against Senator Lindsay, of Kentucky, being allowed to name

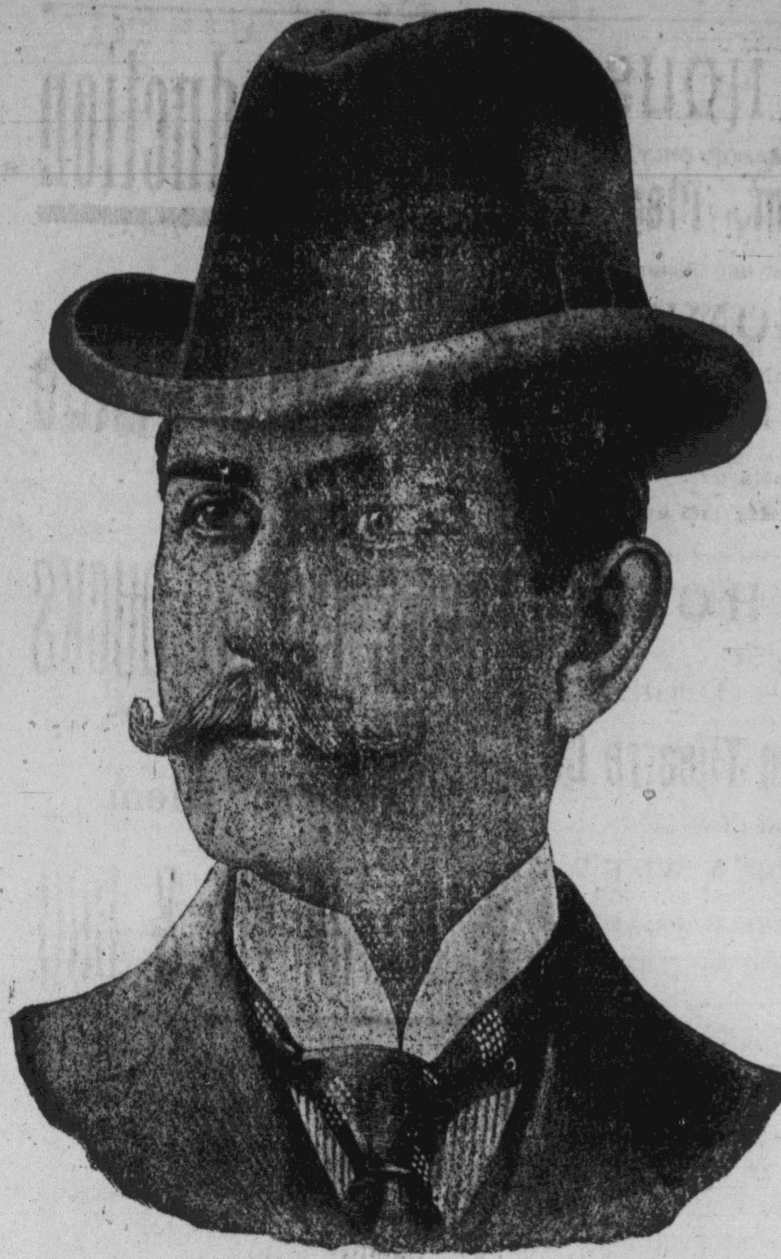

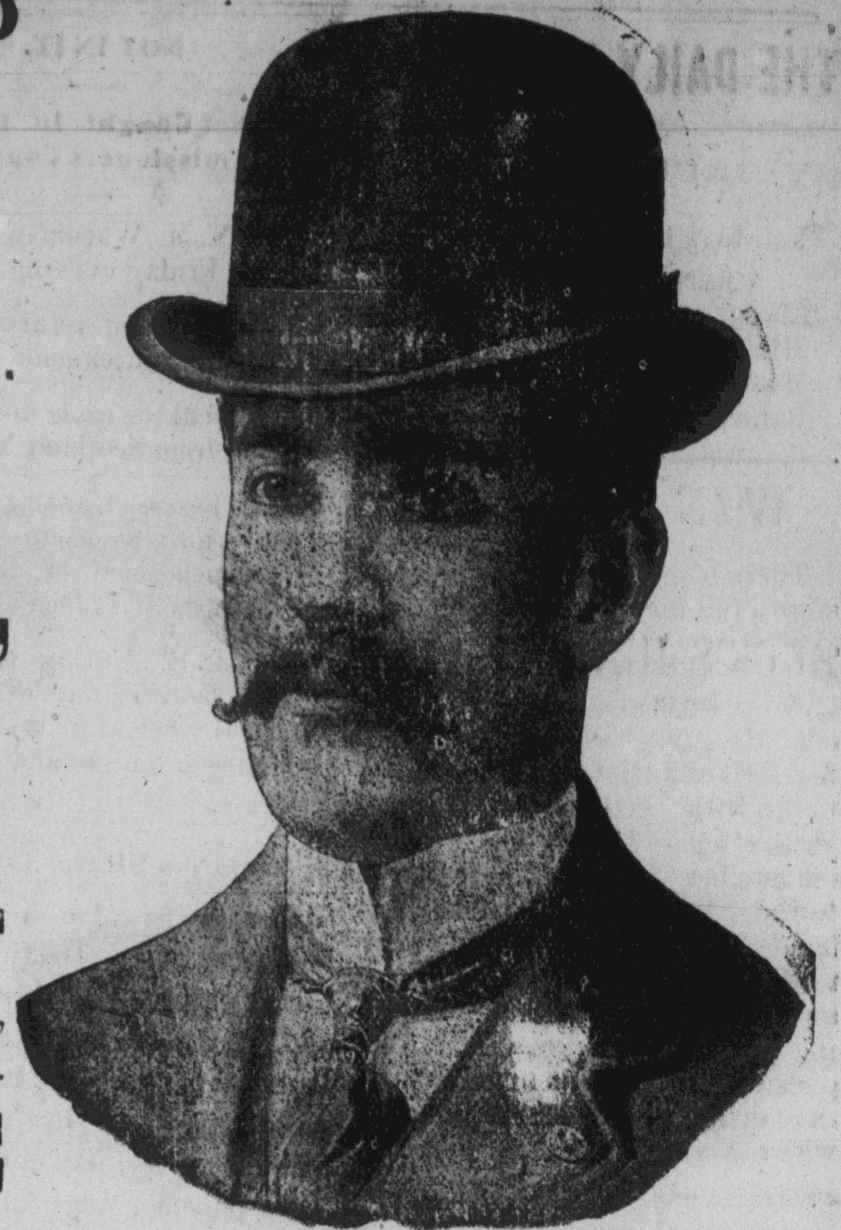

SUGAR OF MILK.

A Nutrient and Generally Much Used in Drugs.

Of the great variety of drugs and chemicals which play an important part in the commerce of the world little is known by the general public. The importation into the United States of balsams, barks, beans, flowers, gums, herbs and leaves gathered from every part of the globe adds up in value annually to nearly \$30,000,000, while the exports of similar products from this country have now reached a total of about \$10,000,000. But of the hundreds of different names on the list with which the importer and wholesale drug dealer are familiar there are scores which are almost perfect strangers to the lay mind. Along with alcohol, borax, opium, quinine and other well known drugs will be found cantharides, cocculus indicus, crystallose, lycopodium, meligan, catch, huchin, chicle and others of equally enigmatical character.

In this latter class might almost be mentioned sugar of milk, which occupies one of the most important positions in the drug transactions of the present day. The title of the drug would imply common knowledge, though, as a matter of fact, few understand its important uses. Time was when every ounce of this drug was imported from Europe. Today, thanks to American enterprise, it is manufactured in the United States on such an extensive scale that not only is the enormous domestic demand supplied by the homemade product, but large quantities are annually exported. When it was imported, the wholesale price was 80 cents a pound. Now it has declined to 8 cents.

History says that sugar of milk was first prepared in 1619, although not introduced into medicine until 1698. It is used almost entirely by pill manufacturers on account of its neutral, filling properties. It is absolutely neutral, inodorous and with a slightly sweet taste. As a vehicle for all manner of pulverized medicines it is perfect. Acids and drugs of all kinds with which it may be mixed do not have any effect upon it nor it upon them, and in the human stomach it is most easily disposed of.

It is manufactured from the whey of cow's milk, and is really a byproduct of milk. The process is one of evaporation and recrystallization. Switzerland once had a monopoly of its manufacture. Now Illinois leads the world, while a large factory has been started in New York state, which gives promise of producing as much as its western predecessor. Such has been the success of the American industry that the product is shipped even to Switzerland, where it is able to compete satisfactorily with the European makers.

In crystal form it resembles rock candy, being white in color. The growing demand for it has been caused by the development of a great number of pills and tablets, which are prepared in the form of pills and tablets for the purpose of relieving the human system of the various ailments which afflict it.

The oldest and best recipe is said by a French medical journal to be that of a man tonic for which a queen is credited. The ingredients are that dogs' paws and asses' heads be boiled with sugar.

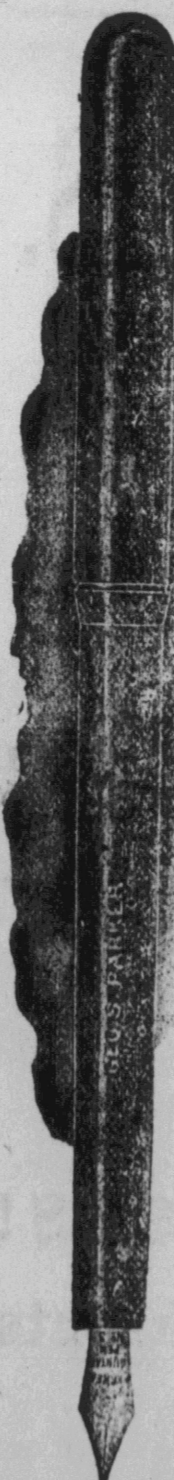
