## TOBACCO JOTTINGS AND LOCAL NOTES.

There is an unusual complaint from all sections of the cut worm playing havoc with tobacco plants.

The acreage will not be as large this year as it was intended. Numbers of farmers have cut down their crop on account of the scarcity of plants.

If farmers would use paris green more generally on their plant beds and growing crops they would make heavier and better tobacco at considerably less expense.

I note with considerable amusement that an enthusiastic tobacco man who knows all about the weed, hailing from one of the way down east markets, has succeeded in getting himself interviewed by one of the State papers. Of the interview it can be truly said he has certainly succeeded in informing the readers of that paper a good deal of what they don't know about tobacco and land adapted to its culture. He hastens to throw his evidently heavy intellectual avoirdupoise squarely agin the golden belt and declares the land down east as far superior to anything up here.

We have numbers of small farmers, in Pitt, Greene and Lenoir counties that have never rushed at the public print to force their knowledge of tobacco culture gushingly upon an innocently ignorant and credulous public that could modestly tell this fellow something about tobacco land that would really be worth something, and if he again sees proper to relieve himself of his burden of misinformation I would suggest that he spend a short while among the people who live in the finest tobacco growing section that has yet been found in all the vast tobacco lands of the South, namely, Pitt and its adjoining counties.

Mr. W. H. Allen a Pitt county boy who is superintending the management of several tobacco farms in Cumberland county has written the Fayetteville Observer, a strong, sensible, clear and logical letter on tobacco culture. He frankly says, no man can lay down any fixed rules by which to be governed in growing and curing tobacco, that it requires practical experience backed by judgment and industry.

The following paragraph is taken from his letter which relates to this market and it contains some plain truths:

Having been born and reared near the greatest tobacco market in Eastern North Carolina and having personally witnessed its upgrowth and progress from its infancy to the present, I am prepared to speak with some degree of accuracy as to what a tobacco market has done for Greenville. It has been about eight years since the first warehouse was built in the town. At that time Greenville contained about 2,500 inhabitants. It was an old, dull, dilapidated-looking place, consisting mostly of wooden buildings. The merchants had plenty of time to go fishing and hunting or to walk over and take a social chat with their neighbors for hours. The dudes and society sought other places to exhibit their handsome figures and to participate in the social events of the day, and the countryman prowled the streets in the summer time hunting the dime he had lost three years before, and looked as though

his good old friend "Towser" had died. The place was not at all inviting, and its charms for the ambitious young man of business qualifications and enterprise were few. But some of the progressive, live and public spirited farmers who were the first to plant tobacco in the county, being placed at a disadvantage and inconvenience in shipping their tobacco, were determined to build a home market, and, in spite of the protest and obstructions of all the old "fogyism" in the town and their limited financial condition, and in the face of "doubting Thomases," they have built a market in this short time that last year sold nearly nine million pounds of tobacco which averaged 9c. per pound for everything—scrap and all. This statement can be verified by the secretary of the board of trade.

For months during the last tobacco season from six to ten thousand dollars were paid out daily to the farmers for tobacco, besides from three to five thousand dollars were paid out weekly to laborers to work this tobacco after it had been marketed, by the buyers and warehouse managers.

## Whitecappers in Georgia.

Griffin, Ga., May 23.—Three colored employes of the Kincaid Manufacturing Company, were severely flogged by whitecaps last night, according to the story of the victims. It is not possible to verify the story from other sources, but the men show the marks of rough usage. They say that about midnight a large body of masked men came to their houses, called them out, took them to the woods and flogged them with leather buggy traces. One hundred lashes, it is claimed, was given the victims.

During the flogging, the leader of the whitecaps told the negroes that they had been ordered to leave town and they had neglected to obey the order, hence the whipping. The men say they never received such orders, but they will go before the end of 24 hours, the limit of grace named by the whitecappers. Officers of the law are trying to run down the story and arrest the whitecaps.

## Found a Pot of Gold.

Richmond, May 23.—J. D. Pollard, a farmer at Aurelian Springs, N. C., yesterday plowed up a small iron pot containing gold coins. The pot was heavy and the iron was much corroded. Pollard declined to tell the amount of money he secured, but said he danced and sang and cried for joy. He exhibited two of the pieces at Weldon yesterday, one dated 1714 and the other 1773. They were foreign coins and probably worth many times their face value as curiosities. Pollard had frequently plowed over the lot before. It is said he secured \$4,000, but he denies that he got so much.

#### Names of Litigants.

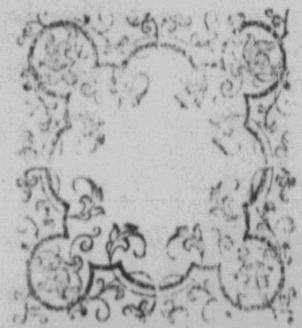

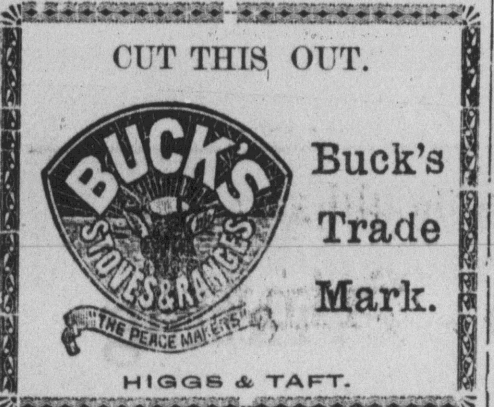
