STATE NEWS.

Happenings in North Carolina.

Two couples of Goldsboro young people left that city Sunday morning to spend the day at Seven Springs. They took advantage of the absence from home and the old folks and had a double marriage at the springs.

We are informed that a pointer dog in Falling Creek township, last week, killed 70 half-grown turkeys for Mr. B. F. Fields. This is dog-hard luck. It would be better for the country if there were fewer dogs.—Kinston Free Press.

J. Tilman Howard, a white prisoner, was carried from Wilmington to the New Hanover county workhouse Thursday, chained to a negro convict. The act has created great indignation among the white citizens, and a number of them have sent a petition to the county commissioners, asking that the officials responsible for the offence be dismissed.

The Cotton Acreage.

Washington, June 10.—The consolidated returns of the different crop report agencies made up to June 1, to the Agricultural Department, indicate a reduction of about 8 per cent. in the acreage planted in the cotton States, as compared with last year. Reports from several of the cotton States are more or less conflicting, and the Department will issue no quantitative estimate of the acreage until it is more definitely ascertainable. That there has been a substantial reduction of acreage, however, admits of no doubt. Not only was the acreage originally planted less than that of last year, but there has been some plowing up of the land on which the seed, of the generally poor quality of which there are hundreds of complaints, had failed to germinate.

The indicated decrease in the principal States is as follows: North Carolina and Tennessee, 11 per cent.; South Carolina and Alabama, 7; Georgia, Louisiana and Arkansas, 10; Texas 9; Mississippi, 2; Indian Territory, 4; Oklahoma, 15.

The average condition on June 1 was 85.7; against 89 on June 1, 1898, and 88.1, the mean of the June averages for the past fifteen years. The condition in the principal States is as follows: Texas, 90; Georgia, 88; North Carolina, 87; South Carolina and Alabama, 86; Tennessee, 85; Indian Territory, 84; Louisiana and Oklahoma, 81; Arkansas, 80 and Mississippi 78.

Notice to Teachers.

The County Superintendent will hold an examination in Greenville the second Thursday in July to examine all applicants for life certificates. The questions are prepared by the State Board of Examiners and the papers are graded by the same. I am requested by the State Superintendent to notify the young people of this county that there will be no examination for Peabody scholarships this year. There were eight vacancies, but Dr. Payne, the President has nominated persons for all these places.

I am advised to say that on and after the regular examination in July, all teachers will be examined on Civil Government.

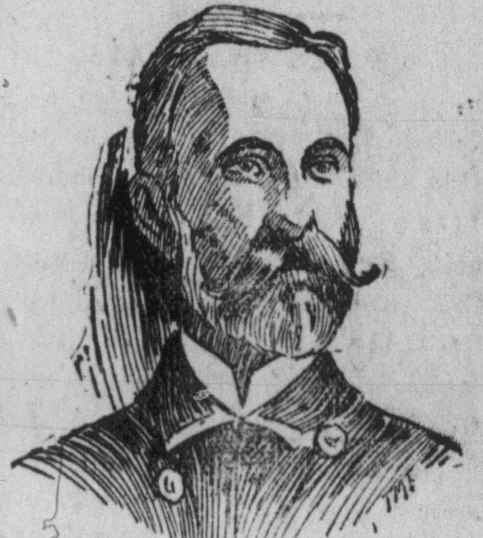

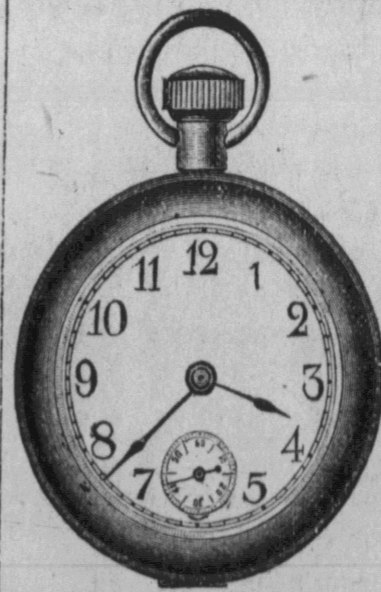

Raleigh is winning rank with the most progressive cities of the South. An election was held there Monday on the question of issuing \$150,000 in bonds for streets and schools. Out of a total registered vote of 1,916 there were 1,594 cast in favor of the bonds and only 50 against. Thus it can be seen that the population of Raleigh was almost unanimously in favor of the improvements contemplated, and such a vote means much for the city.

A FARM THAT PAYS.

That a man can make no money farming is a cry constantly heard. It is no doubt true that a great many men do not make any, and it is probably no fault of theirs, but it is equally true that others do make money and without any trouble.

For instance, C. P. Vanstory seems to be doing very well and has been for a number of years. He owns a farm of ninety five acres, part of which is within the corporate limits of the city, the race track being a part of the tract.

Mr. Vanstory has been cultivating it several years and has no trouble in making it pay.

This year he has 50 acres in grass and grass it is—tall, thick, heavy and of the very best quality. What it pays him is illustrated in this way: Before he bought this farm his hay bill each year was about \$4,200. With his farm he raises more than enough to do him and his stables are larger now than formerly. This year he has enough old hay to last two months.

Yesterday morning he put a new mower at work on the grass and it does most beautiful work, cutting not only close to the ground, but laying it out nicely so that it dries quickly. His man cut on average about 14 acres a day with two mules. One man the old way can average about three-quarters of an acre a day. The machine costs perhaps \$40 or \$50.

But Mr. Vanstory also has 40 acres in oats and they are very nice, besides a lot of peas, and his little farm is one of the best paying institutions in the country.

He could have sold it the other day for \$150 an acre had he agreed to let the crop go with it.—Greensboro Record.

Europe is sending emigrants to this country at the rate of half a million a year. The year 1882 was the banner year, when nearly eight hundred thousand emigrants entered the United States. The figures decreased till 1886, when over three hundred thousand emigrants came here. In 1887 there were almost half a million, and in 1888 more than half a million. There was a falling off till 1898, when the figures reached only a little more than a quarter of a million. The foregoing was for the whole United States. The fiscal year begins July 1 and ends June 30. Probably two hundred and forty thousand will land here during the fiscal year nearly ended. This will be eleven thousand more than landed in the whole country last year.

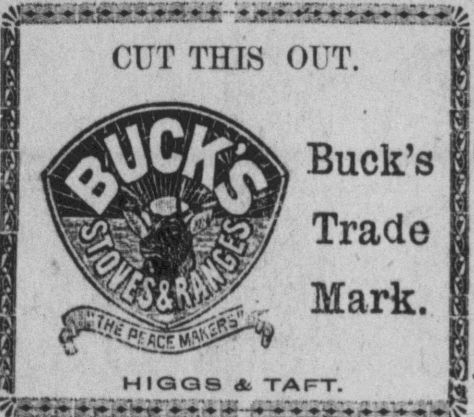
