Beaufort, N. C. June 14.—The following will appear in the Beaufort Herald tomorrow:

On Tuesday night about 11 o'clock a crowd of masked and armed men came to Beaufort by boat and immediately after landing at the oyster factory marched to the jail.

They called the jailer up and told him they had caught a prisoner and they wanted him to open the jail so they could put the prisoner in. The leader of the crowd read a paper purporting to be a commitment. The jailer let the crowd in and they rushed up stairs where the prisoner was chained to the floor by a chain some six feet long. They were armed with hand saws, picks, guns and pistols, and the chain was sawed in twain and the prisoner taken out of jail and carried to the boat.

A big storm was brewing, but nothing daunting, the crowd carried their prisoner away.

Where he is at this writing we are not prepared to say, but the supposition is that he is swinging to some tree in the woods.—Kinston Free Press.

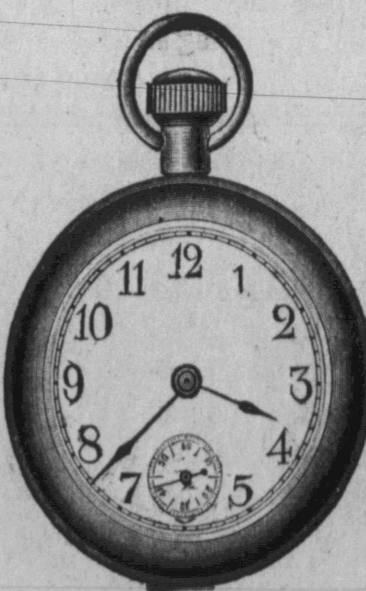

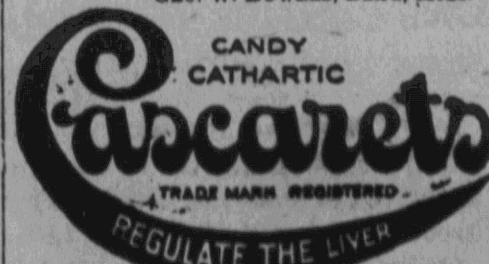
Just Imagine.

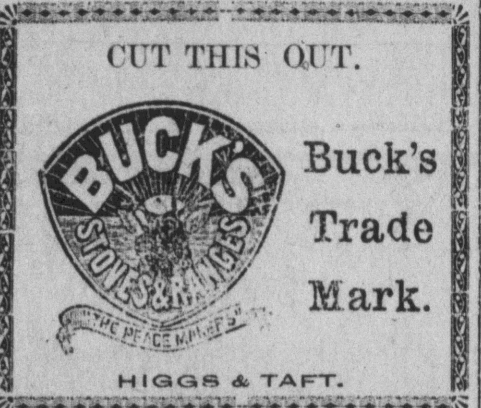
