USE OF PARIS GREENE.

The report seems to have become current, notwithstanding repeated denials to the contrary, that the use of Paris green on tobacco would damage it and that buyers would not take tobacco on which Paris green had been used. Paris green has been used on tobacco in the Northern and Western States for many years, and in many places in the bright tobacco section of the South and I have never yet known or heard of any deleterious effects to result from its use. Prof. Massey, a scientist whose opinion is probably worth more than any man's in the State, has unqualifiedly and urgently advised farmers to use Paris green, not only to destroy the horn worm but all other insects that infest the tobacco field, and I have given it as a result of his experiments that in order to get a fatal dose of arsenic from the use of the green on tobacco when it was properly applied one would have to swallow as much as seven pounds of tobacco at one time and that in the green state too. Now while there are many of us passionately fond of the weed there is no possible chance to get hurt from using tobacco on which Paris green has been applied.

The general direction for the use of Paris green is one heaping table spoon full to an ordinary size bucket of water. This should be constantly stirred in order to prevent the green from settling to the bottom of the bucket. There are many devices for applying it and all of them seem to do the work well. The dry powder gun is a splendid implement, as is also the tin squirt gun, while the common sprinkler is the most general in use, is the cheapest and after all may do the work well enough if used by a careful hand.

OVER THE COUNTRY.

The cruiser Philadelphia left Honolulu for San Francisco, Cal., on June 11.

John Youngman, a farmer at Hope, Ind., threw a club at his son Roy and killed the boy.

John Kennedy, a notorious train robber, has been sentenced at Macomb, Mo., to serve 17 years in the penitentiary.

At Pisino, Cal., a complete counterfeiting outfit has been seized by Government officials, and two counterfeiters have been arrested.

Jealousy over a woman led to a fight between Philip McDermott and George Waldvogel at New York, during which the latter was fatally stabbed.

John W. Gates, president of the American Steel and Wire Company, is announced as a candidate for the United States Senate from Illinois, to succeed Shelby M. Cullom.

Spain has appointed Luis Marin, former Consul at Baltimore, Md., as Consul General at Manila.

The War Department has contracted with Spedden & Co., of Baltimore, for a vessel, to cost \$26,000, for the Quartermaster's Department at Fort McHenry.

The New York city council adopted a resolution making July 3rd a holiday, in commemoration of the anniversary of the battle of Santiago.

STATE NEWS.

Happenings in North Carolina.

Monroe voted for electric lights and water works bonds Monday by a large majority.

Prof. E. E. Britton and his wife, of Wilson, have separated and are engaged in a suit over the custody of their children.

Colored people of Winston had an excursion to Durham on Tuesday. It was attended by the usual accompaniment of fights, and Jim Graves killed General Hawkins.

Carolina Beach has been selected as the place for holding the North Carolina Press Convention, July 12th and 13th. Secretary J. B. Sherrill says the indications point to a large attendance.

The negroes at James City, across the river from New Bern, are about to cause trouble again. Notwithstanding the court decided against them they refuse to either give up the property, move the houses or pay rent.

News comes from Aurora of another example of the fearful condition of the bridges in the county. A correspondent writes, "The bridge at this place is nearly impassible. The Rev. L. O. Wyche, while passing over it, had the misfortune to fall through the same, one panel breaking completely down. He and his horse came very near being drowned. Unless this bridge is speedily repaired, the county will have a damage suit on its hands."—Washington Messenger.

Taken in By Peddlers.

Town folks, speaking generally, affect superior wisdom over their rural brethren, and when the country people are taken in, as they often are, by the sharpers who infest the land like unto the flies in Egypt in time of the plague, the town folks smile in a superior way and pity them.

But they don't need to. The town folks are just as easily duped; in fact, considering the circumstances, they are more easily taken in than their country cousins.

Some weeks ago a smart young man made the rounds in Statesville taking orders for glazed earthenware—pots, pans, etc., which he said could be used for cooking on the stove or inside it. He called at residences only and the ladies were ready and liberal purchasers. He sold hundreds of dollars' worth of the stuff right here in town and last Friday and Saturday the goods were delivered by the wagon load and the money collected. We have heard of two instances in which the ware, which excited the admiration of the ladies, was set on the stove and burst open as soon as it got hot—and all the returns are not in.

But even if the ware is as good as represented, it was of course sold at least 50 per cent. higher than a regular dealer would have charged for it, and so an immense profit went into the hands of the agents, who are birds of passage and take in the towns as they come to them.

We do not want to be understood however, as intimating that the ladies—God bless 'em—are more easily duped than the men. They are not. Let a patent medicine fakir come along and propose to give a prize with each bottle of medicine, and the men will fall over each other to buy; or they will go to the circus and bet on the fakir's own game. Farming Pays.

In a recent interview with Mr. L. Banks Holt, the successful cotton manufacturer, of Graham, he said:

"I hear so many people claiming that the farmer has all the work to do, pays all the taxes and still gets nothing for his labor and products that I feel this statement can be challenged and, in fact, farming properly managed can be made to yield as big returns, investment considered, as any business I know of. I have had the personal supervision over my farm this year and made something over 9,000 bushels of wheat and oats, 130 tons of hay, and will make at least 1,500 bushels of corn, and as I said before, it beats my factory all to hollow. In addition to this, as you know, my poultry is a part of my farming operation, and I will raise this year more than 2,000 chickens, ducks and turkeys all of which are fed from my own farm products."

We believe Mr. Holt has uttered a truth that can be thoroughly demonstrated. When farming is run on business principles, and is conducted so as to take advantage of variety of crops possible to our climate, we believe on a given amount of capital, a good farmer can clear as much money as a majority of the manufactories, with the extra advantage of improving his farm at the same time.—Piedmont Exchange.

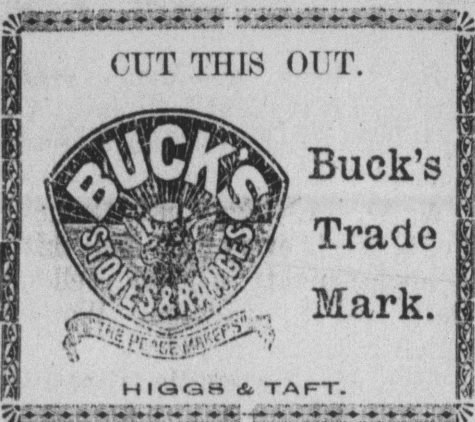

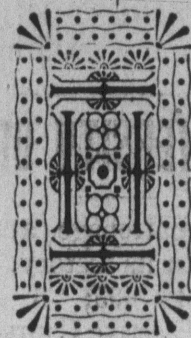

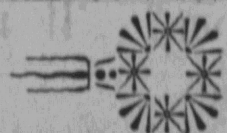
