MAYOR J. G. MOYE.

Change of Town Administration.

This morning the former Board of Councilmen of the town, A. L. Blow, W. L. Brown, W. H. Long, R. A. Tyson, Demsey Ruffin and Sifax Fleming, held their final meeting to turn over the affairs of the town to the incoming administration.

The following Aldermen took the oath of office before ex-Mayor Ola Forbes:

- 1st Ward—E. M. McGowan.
- 2nd Ward—J. L. Wooten, J. B. White.
- 3rd Ward—B. E. Parham, H. A. White.
- 4th Ward—W. R. Parker, J. N. Hart.
- 5th Ward—N. H. Whitfield.

Alderman J. L. Wooten was chosen President of the Board and declared the body ready to proceed to the election of officers.

The following were elected in the order named, each being chosen unanimously by acclamation:

- Clerk—D. J. Whichard.
- Mayor—J. G. Moye.
- Treasurer—J. B. White.
- Tax Collector—C. D. Rountree.
- Chief Police—W. B. James.
- Assistant Police—W. H. Smith.
- Night Police—W. P. Symonds.
- Lamp Lighter—Henry Duff.
- Teamster—Peter Bagley.

While a committee was gone to inform Mr. Moye of his election as Mayor, Prof. W. H. Ragsdale, who had been first chosen by the caucus for that office, stated to the Board his reasons for declining to accept, that it would have required his neglecting his work as a teacher to give the office the attention it demanded. He congratulated them upon the selection of Mr. Moye.

When the committee returned with the Mayor-elect he was sworn in by ex-Mayor Ola Forbes, who made a very neat little speech in turning over the office, which he had filled for three terms, to his successor. Mayor Moye accepted the honor very gracefully and entered at once upon the duties of the office. He is going to make an excellent Mayor, too.

In the election of Mayor, Alderman Whitfield also placed the name of Mr. Forbes in nomination, but at Mr. Forbes' request his name was withdrawn, so that the election of Mayor Moye might be unanimous.

The policemen were then qualified by Mayor Moye, who gave them an appropriate charge in entering upon their official duties.

The license tax upon retail liquor dealers was made \$125 a year and licenses for six months were ordered issued to F. S. Maultsby, Maultsby & Jolly, E. J. Pollard & Co., L. Hooker & Co., O. Hooker, E. M. Cheek, Joe Forbes and W. B. Burnett.

The application of W. B. Burnett to sell liquor at his present place of business near the Planters' Warehouse was refused.

The tax for license to sell malt liquors was placed at \$25 a year and a license was granted to Ed. H. Shelburn.

The tax on pool and billiard tables was placed at \$10 each and a license to run three tables was granted Briley & Harrington.

The Board then adjourned until Monday night.

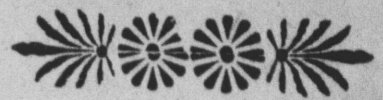

The following from the Plymouth Beacon sounds very much like it might have been written for Greenville. At least the spirit the Beacon complains of in Plymouth also exists to such an extent in Greenville that the article is equally applicable here. It says:

"We regret to acknowledge that there is a spirit of rivalry existing in the business circles of this town that is both unpleasant and unprofitable. There are cases where rivalry among business men has done the town good but that was where one man has tried to do more for public institutions than his neighbor, in this way, the town gets the benefit of what is not a proper spirit, but in our case it is not thus. Here we find that if a movement is started for the upbuilding of a public enterprise there at once arises a spirit of opposition.

With such circumstances existing nothing can prosper, and while the individuals are satisfying their own personal and selfish ends they are blocking the wheels of progress. For the good of the town we most earnestly appeal to all our citizens to lay aside personal differences and forget self when it comes to public matters where the prosperity of the town is at stake. Remember, that what benefits your town benefits all the people and what benefits your neighbor benefits you."

A touching scene was enacted in our sister town, Washington, on Thursday. It was the occasion of the return of the old battle scarred flag of the 40th N. C. Reg't., that was captured by a Michigan regiment during the civil war and has since been in the possession of people of that State. A Mr. Swayze, of Michigan, accompanied by his daughter, came to Washington to return the flag, and the occasion of its presentation to survivors of the 40th Reg't. was attended by appropriate and impressive ceremony.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.
 Washington, D. C., June 30, '99
 One of the first acts of Mr. McKinley after his return to Washington was to order the persecution of Admiral Schley, by the Sampson clique in the Navy Department, stopped. He did not do so because of any love he had for Schley, but because of statements publicly made by Maryland republicans that they intended to hold the administration responsible for the Navy Department's treatment of Schley. That frightened Mr. McKinley, who is by no means as confident of his re-election as some other republicans profess to be. And, in addition to ordering a let up on Schley, Mr. McKinley sent for ex-Postmaster General Gary and asked him to help keep Maryland in line. Unless Marylanders who ought to know are off in their judgment, nothing will prevent Maryland returning to its old place in the democratic column.

In his anxiety to remain in the Cabinet, notwithstanding his deal with Gov. Pingree, who everybody knows is not an admirer either of Mr. McKinley or of his administration, Secretary Alger is getting foxey. In order to jolly Mr. McKinley, he publicly said that his deal with Pingree was solely for the purpose of obtaining the Senatorship and was not binding on either for any other purpose; that he was a McKinley man from start to finish and was prepared to prove it at any time that it might become necessary, by breaking with Pingree, if he should show any disposition to antagonize Mr. McKinley in Michigan. How much of this Mr. McKinley swallows nobody knows, but it is certain that Alger has undertaken a difficult role. It is known that Senators McMillan and Burrows are hard fighters and that they will demand that Alger be put out of the Cabinet, and their demand will be backed by many republicans whom Mr. McKinley will not care to offend. Besides, it is believed that Pingree is only using Alger to try to get even with Senator McMillan and considered by no means certain that he would allow Alger to go to the Senate even if he succeeded in controlling the Michigan Legislature.

Nothing could more surely prove the deception practiced by the administration concerning the situation in the Philippines than the order issued this week to all the regular recruiting officers to enlist as many volunteers as may present themselves for service in the Philippines, and the official announcement that Gen. Otis is to have an army of 40,000 men by the end of the rainy season. In order to keep the appointment of all the officers in the hands of the administration, no organizations are to be enlisted. The men are to enlist as individuals and the regiments to be formed will be United States Volunteers. Although the announcement was made at the same time that all the officers for these regiments would be chosen from the volunteers who have seen service in the Philippines, it is a safe bet that they will not be. Ex-Congressman Campbell, of Ill., who is now in Washington, tells his friends that he has been promised the colonelcy of one regiment, and he hasn't seen any service in the Philippines; and there will be others.

"Making a virtue of necessity," said a Senator, "is what I call the announcement of Thurston, of Nebraska, that he would retire from the Senate at the end of his term. Knowing that neither he nor any other republican has any show to be elected to the Senate by the Nebraska legislature, Thurston concluded to save some of the big wad of corporation money he has by not entering the field as a candidate. His talk about being tired of holding office was merely a little grandstand play."

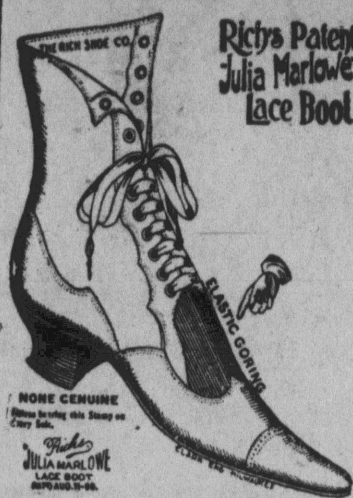
