Are their families to be deprived of the benefit of their insurance because of this? There is no reason or justice in such insurance methods. We have always believed that insurance companies should be compelled to pay the policies of suicides, because the policy-holder may become insane and commit suicide—indeed it is generally held that no sane man commits suicide—and in such event the beneficiaries of the policy should be protected. We have no interest in this matter but we hope the courts will compel Gov. Pattison's company to pay the Shuping insurance.—Statesville Landmark.
