"People are surprised to see me at the Waldorf," he said with a laugh. "What is a fat chump like me to do? I like to eat the good things they serve here, and I can pay for them. Why shouldn't I stop here?"

"It was the only kind of speech I could make on the subject," he said, "and I don't see what the whole row is about. I did only what I would do in case of a fire. It wouldn't make a particle of difference to me where the fire was or to whom the house belonged. I'd holler 'Fire!'"

"Some of the newspapers have done me an injustice. They have presented the affair in a light which makes it appear as if I was laughing at Tammany. That is wrong. The only time when I laughed was when I was a printer's devil and my stomach was empty. Then I laughed because laughter will take the wrinkles out of your heart and sometimes even fill your stomach for you.

"I like the Tammany boys. As to Mr. Croker, why he is a particular friend of mine. He is the noblest, the most straightforward and the cleanest public man I have ever met. He is setting for the young men of our great country an example of purity and spotless integrity as a public man."

He said that Bryan was sure to be renominated for President, and when asked what the Democratic convention would do with the Tammany delegation, he said:

"We will admit them and let them prance around, and then let them sit down and pout."

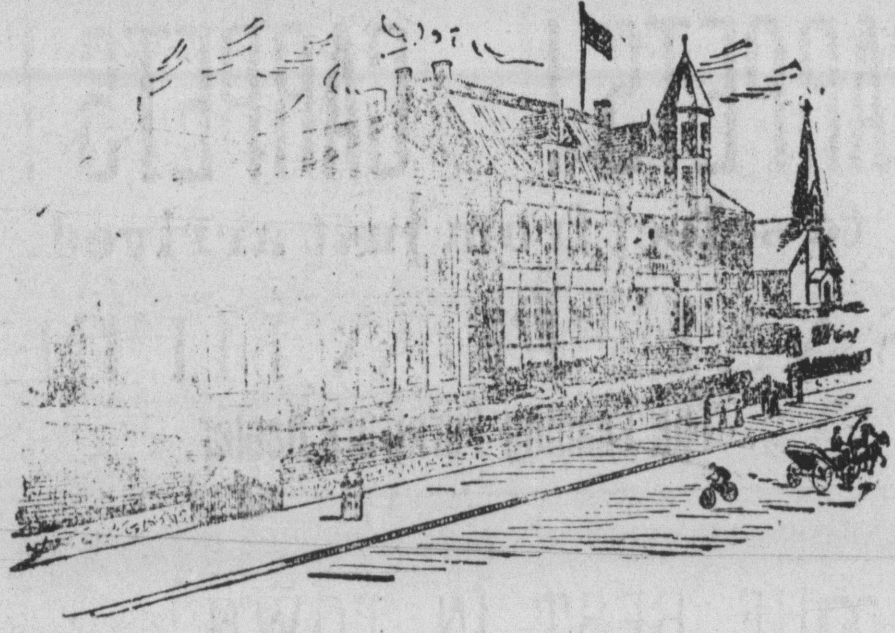
