### In The World of Labor.

The copper-mining industry of New South Wales promises to assume gigantic proportions in the near future.

The clothiers of Lawrence, Mass., will join the closing movement and grant the Wednesday half-holiday to their clerks.

The Phoenix Iron Works Company, of Hartford, Conn., has granted an increase of 25 cents per day to about sixty moulders.

A successful firm of tea merchants in London is composed entirely of women. The blenders, tasters and packers are also women.

About five acres of land in Astoria, N. Y., fronting on the East River, have been sold to capitalists, who will establish a big steel plant there.

In 1880 Germany imported eggs to the value of \$3,500,000. In 1898 the amount was nearly trebled. Russia provided 90 per cent. of them.

In nearly every street in Japanese cities is a public oven, where, for a small fee, housewives may have the dinners and suppers cooked for them.

St. Paul lathers' new scale: Face lathing, 2 1/2 cents per yard; cross back lathing, 5 cents per yard; up and down back lathing, 2 1/2 cents per yard.

The captain is nearly seventy-five years old.

### ROUND LAP COTTON BALES.

To Satisfy The Demand The Entire Crop Will Eventually Be So Baled.

For once the cotton planter has an ally among the great corporations. For years the cotton tie ring, the bagging combine and the compress people have all lived off the cotton grower. There was no way to fight them and so they grew rich on their enormous profits which the farmers had to pay. Now the American Cotton Company with its Roundlap bale is in the field and it is so revolutionizing the cotton handling business that many of the old expenses are necessarily wiped out. The farmers must inevitably get a large share of this saving, but the old compress people and the bagging and tie trust are raising a great commotion against the American Cotton Company as though they had always been the friends of the farmer. Unfortunately for them they never played the friendly act before and now the farmers doubt the sincerity of their repentance.

The Roundlap bale is the trade mark name given by the American Cotton Company to its round bale to distinguish it from all other bales. The cotton mills of New England and of Europe are eager buyers of this bale because as compared with all other bales it has many advantages covered by broad patents, which greatly lessen the cost of manufacture to the mill. This Roundlap bale eliminates two or three processes in manufacturing and as the cotton mills of the world are willing to pay more for this cotton than any other, it naturally follows that to secure the highest prices all southern cotton must in time be put up in this Roundlap form. Mr. Wm. C. Lovering, one of the most distinguished cotton mill men of New England says:—"I do not hesitate to say that the time is coming when the cotton manufacturers all over the world will insist that their cotton shall be delivered to them in the form of a Roundlap bale."

### Funeral Instead of Wedding.

He drank a quantity of the liquid and in a few minutes after died in terrible agony. An examination revealed the fact that the supposed was a compound of alcohol and aconite.

### Divers 1,600 Feet Under Water.

This is an age of New inventions and the newest is a medical apparatus for deep sea diving. The inventor is M. Patec del Pazzo, of Venice. The bell is of cast iron and sphere shaped, and is covered with oil cloth three inches thick. It is thus well equipped to resist the enormous water pressure.

The diving globe is constructed to work at a depth of about 1,600 feet—that is, more than a quarter of a mile. At this great depth there is very little light, but provision is made for that.

The men inside the diving bell are permitted to see their surroundings clearly by a powerful electric light placed over a strong lens, through which they look. The light, of course, is worked from the inside.

The tools of the trust pretend to fight what they are pleased to term "criminal trusts." There are no othersoit. All are organized to destroy competition and make a monopoly, and every one is an outlaw. They would be punished if they did not have a mortgage on the government officials—News and Observer.

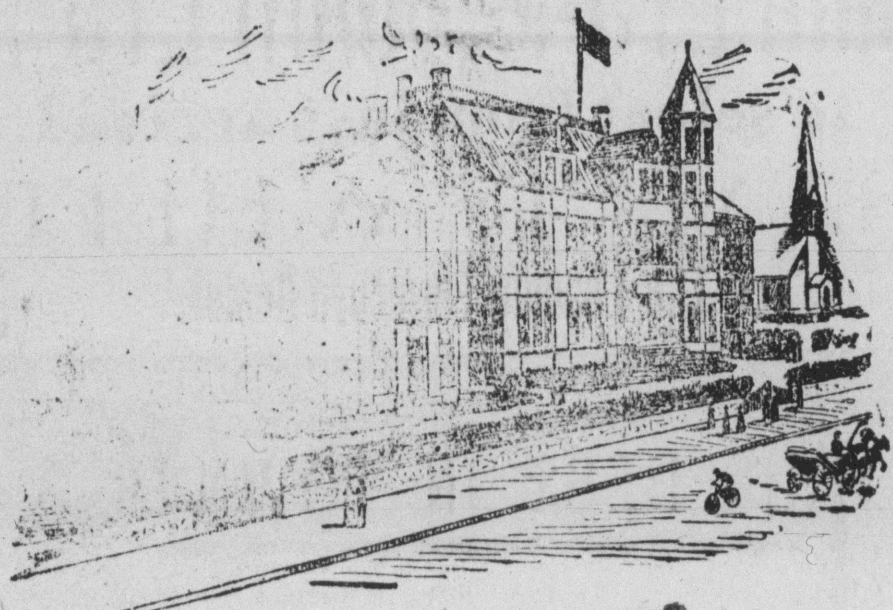

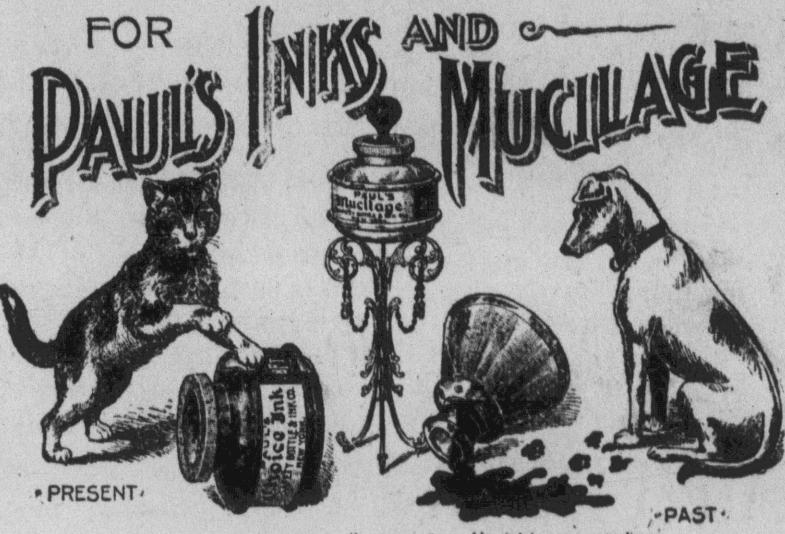

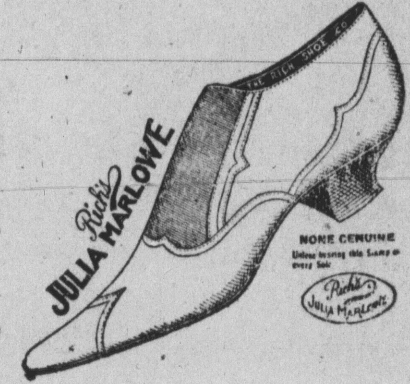
