Down on Judge Robinson.

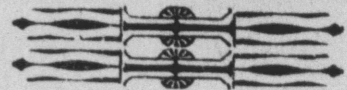

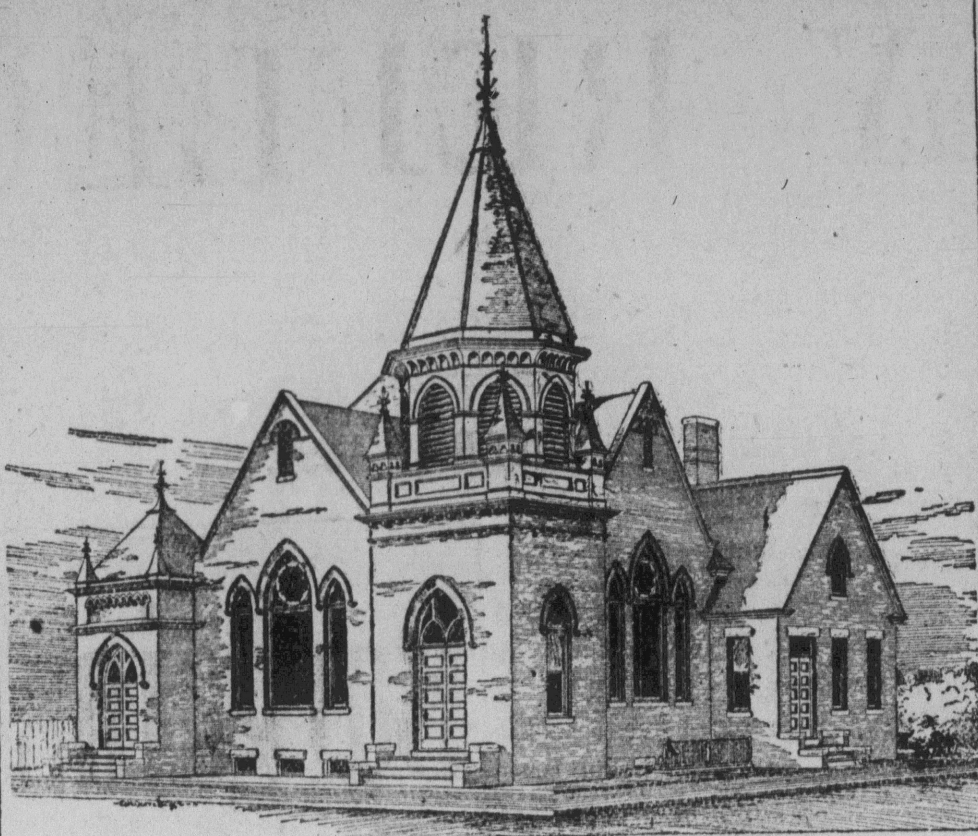
We would suggest to the yacht racers that if they set the date to run off the challenge sometime next March, or about the time the August storms are due, they may find enough wind to fill a sail.

Alarmed by the critical prospects in Ohio this fall, the Republican managers have resorted to the desperate methods usually adopted only in Presidential campaigns. During the past few days every federal office holder in Washington has received a circular from Treasurer Burdell of the Republican committee, urging that immediate and liberal contributions be made. Burdell is treasurer of the Republican finance committee of Ohio. He explains to the office holders that they need not fear violating the civil service law in collecting and sending money for this campaign, and his circular implies very clearly that Mark Hanna and the President will stand by all who take a hand in this work. The inference conveyed is almost equally clear that failure to contribute money will be to the disadvantage of the clerk receiving the notice.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 9, '99.
"There is a possibility that Admiral Dewey will be the republican candidate for President, next year, instead of President McKinley. A movement has been started by prominent republicans which has that object in view, under certain contingencies. Admiral Dewey has not been consulted and has nothing whatever to do with it. The men in this movement are not after honoring Admiral Dewey or turning Mr. McKinley down. They are after keeping the republican party in power for another Presidential term. They are afraid that Hannan and Algerism will handicap Mr. McKinley to such an extent that it will be impossible to re-elect him. Their idea is to get as many prominent party men as possible to agree that if after looking carefully over the ground, McKinley's re-election should be thought doubtful, they will nominate Dewey, with or without Mr. McKinley's consent. The success of this movement will depend largely upon the outcome of the next campaign against the Filipinos; if

the war over there isn't ended soon, Mr. McKinley will be still further handicapped.

Although he has more than once declared that he would not accept the nomination for Vice President, it has all along been believed in Washington, that Gov. Teddy was after that very nomination, and that Boss Platt, who is anxious to get him out of New York politics, was actively assisting him. The announcement that Roosevelt was to make a flying trip through Nebraska, speaking almost continually from the rear platform of his train, has added strength to that belief. Republicans who know the situations in Nebraska, are preparing a soft spot to fall on by saying that State pride in Col. Bryan may cause the state to go anti-republican. In view of Col. Bryan's enthusiastic reception in this State, the use of "may" is real considerate on the part of those who know that the republicans are practically certain of defeat in the state. In addition to Roosevelt, they are trying to get Mr. McKinley to go to Omaha while he is in the West, ostensibly to review the First Nebraska Volunteers, recently returned from the Philippines, but really to try to stir up a little republican enthusiasm.

That imperialism is costly will be shown by the estimates which will be submitted to Congress for appropriations necessary for the Army and Navy for the fiscal year beginning July 1st, 1900. Although all the estimates of the War Department are not complete, enough is known to make it certain that the aggregate amount that will be asked for the support of the army Navy for the coming session of Congress will reach, and probably exceed \$200,000,000, which will be about \$2.65 or \$2.70 per capita. War Department officials say the total amount will be considerably reduced, if the war in the Philippines is brought to a close, before the appropriations are made, but that is very doubtful, in a double sense. It is doubtful whether the war over there will be ended by that time, and doubtful, even if it should be, whether the American army on the islands can be materially reduced for a long time afterwards, if our present policy is to be continued. Every government which has tried to govern alien people by force has found it expensive, and there are no good reasons for believing that the experience of this country will differ in that respect from that of others.

Ancient Fashion Jargon.

The language of the fashion plate and the woman's paper is sufficiently appalling to the mere man even in these days of emancipated and, we may presume, more grammatical womanhood, but, according to an extract from a fashion journal of 1757, the jargon of over a century ago was even more astounding. This is how the paper described the dress of a certain Mile. D— at the opera:

She appeared in a dress of "stifled sighs," ornamented with "superfluous regrets," the bodice cut in a "perfect cendor" point and trimmed with "indiscreet complaints." Her hair was dressed in "sustained sentiments," with a headress of "sustained conquest," ornamented with several "fly-aways" and "downcast eye" ribbons, and her collar was "beggared on horseback" color.

No doubt all these marvelous terms conveyed some meaning to the fashionable woman of the days when French society danced on the edge of the volcano of 1789, but to their descendants of a hundred years later they have absolutely no meaning.—San Francisco Argonaut.

Red Tape in Russia.

Every time a Russian minister leaves town his colleagues are notified of the journey, besides the council of the empire, the cabinet of the emperor, the empire's controller and secretary, the sacred synod, the emperor's military secretary, the empress, the governors of Moscow, Varsovie, Kieff, etc., ad infinitum, to all appearance. When he returns, the same minute notification performance is gone through. So each ministerial departure from and return to St. Petersburg involves an issue of some 200 notices. There are 18 ministers, and taking three journeys as the average for each, we have at the end of the year a grand total of some 10,800 official papers.

Dangerous Counterfeit.

Washington, Oct. 7.—A new counterfeit \$10 silver certificate has been discovered by the secret service division of the treasury. It is of the series of 1891; check letter B; plate number indistinct, probably 74; J. Fount Tillman, register; Morgan, treasurer; portrait, Hendrick. It is a dangerous photo-mechanical production, printed on soft paper, probably made up from two sheets of Japanese. Green and red ink lines are used to imitate the silk fibre of the genuine. The face of the note has a grayish tinge, owing, no doubt, to the use of a poor quality of black ink. The color of the seal is a trifle too dark. The back of the note is more deceptive than the front. The imprint of the bureau of engraving and printing on the left end of the back is illegible.

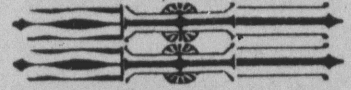

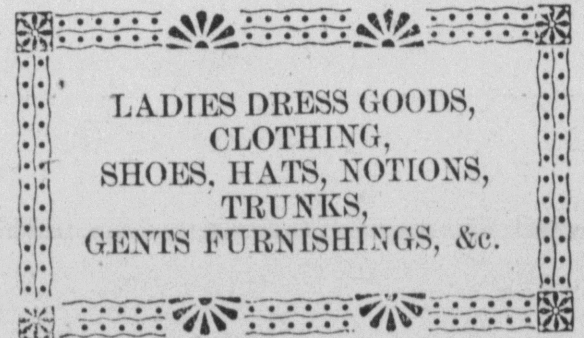

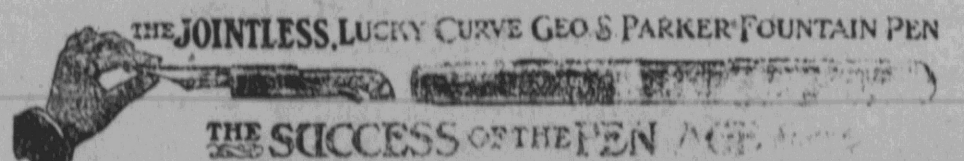
