Before Aguinaldo rebelled against us and while he was fighting Spain he was a patriot in the eyes of the Administration. Now he is a brigand.

After wobbling on the currency question for years, it is at last announced that McKinley has sufficiently stiffened his dorsal vertebrae to urge that some step be taken toward enacting a gold standard.

Mr. Baily, of Texas has declared that Mr. Bankhead is his choice for minority leader of the House of Representatives. Mr. Baily has been there himself and ought to know the kind of man needed to tackle the rampant majority.

Former Senator Call of Florida declares that his defeat was brought about by the money of the Standard Oil Company. Trusts in Florida, he says, are flourishing finely. Why not name Mark Hanna as a committee of one to become acquainted with this latest form of Republican monopoly fostering.

Our royally inclined President has become so sensitive relative to his doings that any criticism on the part of a poor government clerk brings down the Administration wrath to the point of dismissal. Noble E. Dawson, a clerk in the War Department, has been removed for criticising the President. Evidently free speech is restricted not only in Russia and in China, but in the United States as well.

The trusts are an issue that the Republicans do not care to have brought prominently to the front in next year's campaign. To show the extent to which these monopolies created to enrich the stockholders at the expense of the people at large, have been nourished under that great humbug, the protective tariff, should be the aim of every Democratic editor and speaker in next year's struggle. Mark Hanna to the contrary notwithstanding, there are trusts and very big ones at that.

The Charlotte Observer has adopted a new method of printing photographs—stands them on their heads.

Sixty traveling men met in Charlotte Wednesday night and organized an association to be known as the "Traveling Men's Union of America." The prime object of the association is to bring about concerted action to secure from the railroads a 5,000 mile interchangeable mileage book and an excess baggage allowance of 250 pounds.

With Cuba on the eve of revolution and the war in the Philippines still in progress, it would seem as though the benevolent intentions of the Republicans were misconstrued by our prospective foster children. That the interference to drive Spain from the western hemisphere was right, no thinking man doubts, and had the President possessed sufficient courage and candor to state his intentions relative to the islands, there would have been no trouble either in Cuba or in the Philippines, but the vacillating policy of a weak man brought untold bloodshed in the Orient and probable trouble in Cuba, since the former low mutterings of discontent in the Pearl of the Antilles, have now assumed proportions that penetrate even to the jelly fish incumbent of the White House. Cuba and the Philippines must be free or there will be year's of discord.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 1, 99.

"Speaker Henderson promises to be just as much of an autocrat as Thomas B. Reed, if one can judge from present indications. If anything, he is more dictatorial than the man from Maine ever dreamed of being." That is not a democratic opinion, but one uttered by a prominent republican member of the House, whose name cannot be used, because he spoke in confidence to a personal friend. It indicates, however, that things are not turning out in accordance with the numerous prophecies of reform that were to be inaugurated when Mr. Henderson became Speaker.

Much regret is felt in Washington over the announcement that the health of Hon. W. L. Wilson who was the last democratic chairman of the House committee on Ways and Means, and Postmaster General during the last Cleveland administration, was in a precarious condition. Mr. Wilson, who has since his retirement from public life been President of the Washington and Lee University, at Lexington Va., has been ordered to Arizona, for the winter, by his physician.

It is but just that we should say that Admiral Dewey has done two things which have lowered him very much in our estimation. The acceptance of the house tendered him in Washington is one of the things. No well-bred and self-respecting man in the land can think as much of him for the doing of it. If he had declined the offer save as a gift for a home for unfortunate mariners and those dependent upon them in their poverty he would have added to rather than diminished his lustre. He is no pauper who has the income of a salary of over thirteen thousand dollars a year. The other thing that worked a downfall in the thermometer of those to whom this Republic is a precious legacy as a protector of civil and religious liberty, is his marrying a Roman Catholic woman. Mormonism and Roman Catholicism are logically contrary and contradictory to the life of our government.—Rev. P. R. Law, in Lambertson Robesonian.

Snow Hill Railroad.

We had the pleasure of a conversation with Mr. Chas. Abernethy this week, who is here attending court. Mr. Abernethy is the attorney for the A. & N. C. railroad, and while we cannot at this time state anything officially, we gather from what Mr. Abernethy said that it was the intention of the president and directors to begin work soon constructing the long talked of expected branch road to Snow Hill. We also hear that there is a standard gauge being built out from Tarboro heading towards Snow Hill, a force of from 150 to 200 being hard at work, and the grading is finished up to twelve miles from Tarboro.—Greene County Standard.
