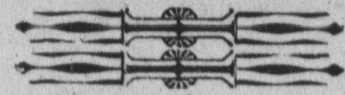

The University Magazine, of which Mr. W. S. Bernard, of Greenville, is editor in chief, is again making its appearance for the academic year. The number just out is a splendid one and a credit to the editors and the University.

A Fertilizer Trust is one of the latest combinations. This is organized with a special view to squeezing the Southern cotton raisers who are large yearly purchasers of guano and phosphates. The Atlanta Constitution advises the farmers to do without fertilizers until they shall have brought the Trusts to terms.

The detailed report of Dr. Lewis, State health officer, on the causes of typhoid fever at the State Normal college at Greensboro, is very lengthy and exhaustive, but is not positive in his statements regarding the causes of epidemic but the doctor seems to regard the epidemic as due to impure drinking water, which was contaminated by defective sewerage.

The cheekiest citizen on record is the Portland, Maine, man who went to Boston harbor where the Olympia was lying, sneaked on board, stole several articles belonging to Admiral Dewey, including a letter from the lady who is now Mrs. Dewey, and then boasted about his performance. And the authorities have done nothing about it. Perhaps Portland is proud of the only fellow who ever got ahead of Dewey.—Wilmington Star.

The story that there is a possible case of bubonic plague on a ship arrived at New York last week from Brazil is not welcome news. This country could not have a more dangerous or more unwelcome visitor. There is no ground for apprehension that the disease will get a foothold in America, but it is of so terrible a nature that the presence of even one case of it on our shores is enough to put people to thinking.—Charlotte Observer.

A Disgrace to the State.

The Superintendent of Public Instruction of North Carolina says that the average salary of white teachers in the State is, males, \$26.33 per month, females, \$23.65; of negro teachers, males, \$22.53, females, \$19.70. The average length of school terms is for whites a trifle over fourteen weeks and for negroes a little under thirteen weeks. This showing is a disgrace to North Carolina. A teacher who is not worth more than \$23.65 or \$26.33 a month should not be employed as a teacher. Those worth more should be paid more. The moulding, shaping and education of children are far too important matters to be paid for with such niggardly salaries.

North Carolina should pay its teachers salaries more commensurate with the importance of their work. It should get the best teachers, and pay them for being the best.—Asheville Citizen.

Something Wrong About Hofheimer's Assignment.

Norfolk, Dec. 4.—Hofheimer, Son & Co., formerly merchants in Norfolk, recently failed in New York for over \$400,000. In the deed of assignment Norfolk men were preferred. The Hamburger Tobacco Company, of Norfolk, is fighting the Hofheimers discharge in bankruptcy.
