Slight Increase in the Docket.

For the past week Mayor Moyer has had more business in his court than for a few weeks previous. The following cases have been before him and disposed of:

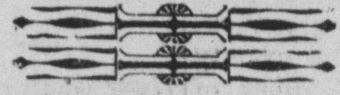

It is said that the President's message contained 30,000 words. We will believe the statement, as it is too much trouble to count them. But if there is anything in which McKinley excels it is in words. He has what a bright editorial writer once described as a fluency of words and a paucity of ideas.

Secretary Long now proposes to honor Sampson and ignore Schley by a vote of Congress thanking the Commander-in-Chief of the North Atlantic Squadron for the victory at Santiago. Perhaps this will be as easy a way as any for disposing of the controversy. Burial in the Congressional Record would indeed be a melancholy termination of the matter.

The Administration with characteristic cowardice hopes that Aguinaldo will escape from the Philippines as his capture would embarrass the President. So much for the principle involved in the Philippine struggle, of which the Administration leaders have practiced so extensively. If Aguinaldo will leave the island free for McKinley and Otis to dominate, it is all those worthies desire.

Secretary Hay's son goes to Pretoria as Consul, at one of the most critical periods in the relation between this country and the South African Dutch Republic. Inasmuch as the man is twenty-four years of age, he may have been expected to have acquired a large amount of diplomatic experience which will stand him well in hand in his new job. Being a son of his father, however, he may be expected to dodge all the rough places and hang on to the soft snaps.

During the thirty-seven years he never was known to be off a single day on account of sickness, and never received holidays. He is now bordering on four score years, and resigned his appointment the other day on account of failing health. His youngest daughter has been appointed in his place.

The Secretary of the Treasury estimates the expenditures for the next fiscal year ending June 30, 1901, at \$631,081,994. This is an enormous sum; but nearly one-half of it will be for military and naval purposes. He asks an appropriation of \$145,000,000 for account of pensions, and \$76,416,225 for public works.

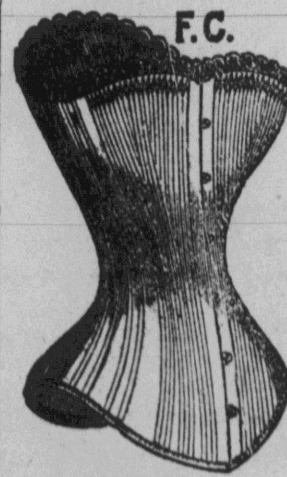
