A Gay School Officer.

In a letter to the teachers of Forsyth county, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, Prof. C. H. Mebane, swats in a rather lively fashion A. P. Davis, the county superintendent of Forsyth.

Mr. Davis, who was the fusion county examiner, under the old board, assumed the office again after the decision of the Supreme Court. He attempts to declare null the certificates issued by the school authorities acting under the school law of 1899, and for this Prof. Mebane calls him down. The superintendent's letter is as follows: "To the Teachers of Forsyth County:

"Dear teachers—I have received a clipping from a paper published in your county, in which Mr. A. P. Davis announces that he will hold an examination on December 15th, and that he states: 'That we will not endorse any certificate, but all must take the examination alike. Any teacher refusing to comply with this will forfeit his or her position, etc.'

"I wish to say to you that all teachers who have stood the examination under Mr. Walter O. Cox, up to the time of the decision of the Supreme Court, and have received certificates from said Cox in accordance with the general school law of 1899, said certificates are good for one year from the date of their issue.

"I have advised quite a number of you from time to time since July the first that certificates issued by Mr. Cox in accordance with the general school law are good for one year from the date of their issue, and I meant what I said then and mean it now.

"I propose to see that you are treated as ladies and gentlemen. It is a shame for any man or set of men to try to drive teachers about like so many cattle.

"If Mr. Davis will not endorse your vouchers, let him refuse to do so, but the legislature, which meets in June, can easily pass a special act and order the county treasurer to pay you. We also have a remedy in the courts to compel an official to do his duty.

"I write this as a matter of justice to you and also in response to numerous letters received from your county, which I have not been able to answer on account of press of official and other duties.

Cotton Crop, Still Dwindling.

Washington, Dec. 11.—The statistician of the Department of Agriculture reports 8,900,000 bales as the probable cotton production of the United States for 1899-1900. This estimate is based on a larger number of both general and special reports than has ever before been received by the Department in connection with a cotton crop. While weather conditions during the past 30 days have been more favorable to whatever picking remained to be done, so that the general condition of the crop is slightly better than one month ago, continued investigations leave absolutely no doubt that the crop is even smaller than was indicated in either of the statistician's previous reports.

The estimated productive area, in thousands of acres is as follows: Virginia 47; North Carolina 1,220; South Carolina 2,112; Georgia 3,288; Florida 149; Alabama 2,883; Mississippi 2,784; Louisiana 1,179; Texas 6,642; Arkansas 1,726; Tennessee 816; Oklahoma 199; Indian Territory 299; Missouri 77; total 23,522. This 5.6 per cent. less than last year. The estimated yield in pounds of lint cotton per acre is as follows: Virginia 120, North Carolina 193, South Carolina 165, Georgia 159, Florida 94, Alabama 176, Mississippi 209, Louisiana 238, Texas 185, Arkansas 193, Tennessee 166, Oklahoma 185, Indian Territory 225, Missouri 195.

On last Friday a spark from a passing engine ignited some cotton on the platform at Tillery, belonging to Mr. P. C. Gregory; and sixty six bales were damaged. The loss was considerable, but the cotton was not entirely lost.—Scotland Neck Commonwealth.

A Business View of The Cigarettes.

The most effective blow that has yet been directed against the cigarette evil, a blow more effective than all the State legislation that has heretofore been enacted, is the order which the officials of the South Carolina division of the Southern Railway have passed, as related in the press dispatches this morning. According to this order, all employes of the railroad company who smoke cigarettes must quit, or lose their jobs, and no person who smokes cigarettes will be taken into the employ of the company. At present, this order applies to only one division of the system, but it may be extended to others.

This action of the Southern Railway Company is the most deadly blow yet given the cigarette. It will have more effective results than could be hoped for by any State legislation for the reason that it makes war upon the cigarette from a business standpoint. Men who could not be prevented from drinking by any sort of legislation with which they might be confronted, have willingly and consistently chosen a life of sobriety when the question was presented to them as a matter of business. Only sober men can give a railroad good service; no railroad can afford to employ any other kind. Those employes who at one time thought differently have either reformed or are out of a job. The justness of this requirement of the railroad people for sober men to handle their trains has never been questioned—certainly not by the traveling public—but there may be some who will want to know what cigarette-smoking has to do with the question of efficiency. To these it will be sufficient to say that railroad officials hold a drinker and a cigarette-smoker in equal disfavor, whether rightly or wrongly is not the question in point. The very fact that a great railroad company has concluded that the safety and efficiency of its service will be promoted by the employment of men who do not smoke cigarettes puts the matter beyond argument, and will have a more far-reaching effect than any step yet taken in the suppression of the cigarette evil. Railroad employes will not be the only ones who will be put to thinking in consequence of this anti-cigarette order.—Charlotte Observer.

The depot at Milboro was burned Monday night. Quite a quantity of plaids from some factory were destroyed. How the fire originated is not known.

Sixteen years ago Saber Rouse, the daughter of a section foreman on the Union Pacific Railroad, was run over by a freight train on that line in Cherokee county, Kansas, and one of her legs was crushed below the knee. At that time she was two years old. She grew into womanhood without making any claim against the railroad company; but a few weeks ago, just before her eighteenth birthday, she was advised to bring suit for damages. A few days ago the company was notified that action had been commenced in the Court of Cherokee county for \$30,000.

There are 11,000,000 cows employed in the butter making business in this country. They produce an aggregate of 1,375,000,000 pounds, or about 18 pounds for each of us. This does not include the buterine, oleomargarine and other compositions in which the cows are not interested.—Wilmington Star.

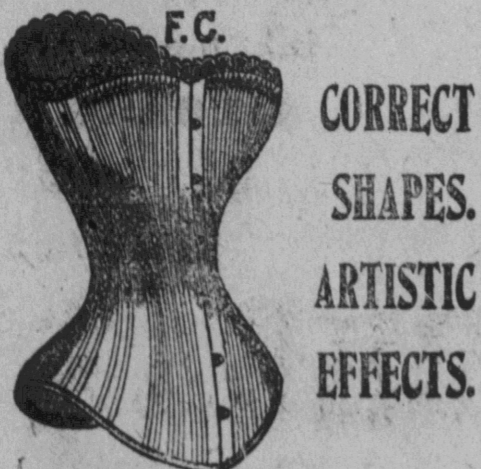
