### MORMON CUSTOMS.

Observations By One in Their Midst.

OAKLEY, N. C. Dec. 18, 1899.

EDITOR REFLECTOR:

As I have recently noticed a spirit of inquiry existing in many of the leading journals of the country, concerning the theory and practice of Mormonism, I will write a few facts that have come under my observation.

I stayed in the town of Mount Carmel, Utah, about three months in 1881. It contained about five hundred inhabitants, all of whom were members of the Mormon church.

Their church services are opened by the Bishop, who then calls a preacher from the congregation of which every male member is a Mormon Elder. At the close of the services the seats are removed and the Bishop opens a dance with prayer. Then all join in an old fashion dance after the "fiddle," which is continued until the congregation is exhausted. The succeeding services are all the same.

One of their missions to this country is to obtain the names of our dead and send them to Utah, in order that some one may be baptized for them, and thereby enable them to have life, wives, and husbands in eternity. The names of dead women here are taken and sealed to living Mormons, that they may have husbands in the next world, where they insist there is more multiplying than in this.

They marry by revelation. If a member makes known to the church

that it is revealed to him that he must wed a certain woman, they make preparation to have the ceremony performed regardless of the wishes of the woman. She is taken to the baptismal font in the temple, where the priest washes her in clean water and anoints her with oil, praying that she may be faithful in bringing forth Saints for Zion. Then they are pronounced man and wife through all eternity.

One chief point of their doctrine is the laying on of hands and anointing with oil for the healing of the sick. They also claim to raise the dead.

There is a tithing house belonging to every church, where all members have to store something for its support.

My authority is Bishop Jolley, whose house I made my home while in Utah. He was a relative of mine and we were very intimate. Bishop Jolley had three wives. For instance he stayed with wife number one during the day, at night with wife number two, and third night with wife number three, being careful to get home before day dawned each time. The next night was spent with wife number one and so on. The Bishop was considered one of the leading spirits of the Mormon church. There no woman is too poor to have a sewing machine and cook stove.

They take great interest in education, and keep their children at school all the time, being careful to employ none but Mormon teachers. They are strict enemies of all other denominations, and pass resolutions in their conference not to employ any gentile (a person from another state) to do any work for them. As a people, they oppose all public improvement and do not wish unbelievers to settle in their midst. The men do the work. Wheat, Irish potatoes, and cattle are the products, on which the people subsist. About sixty years ago in what was known as the Mountain Meadow Massacre, the Mormons murdered about seventy five Gentiles, that were on an emigrant train passing through Utah on their way to California. John D. Lee, was their leader in the massacre. After capturing the train, he kept them prisoners for weeks and weeks. Finally he turned the train towards home ambushed and slayed all but the children. These he kept and reared in the Mormon faith. During this time he was in close communication with Brigham Young, the chief.

This act was concealed for thirty years, when it finally became known. Lee was a fugitive from justice for a long time staying in

mountain caves and being secreted by Mormons. Eventually he was captured, court martialed, and shot. These are facts, I have seen his name in caves in Utah, where I was informed he caryed it in the sand stone while he was in hiding. I have also visited the site of the massacre.

I left a wife and six children in North Carolina and of course did not partake of their ways. I am sixty years old and belonged to the third Confederate Infantry in the civil war. I served four years. My Colonel was Marmaduke from Missouri. I give as reference to my standing as a citizen, Sheriff of Pitt county, G. M. Morning, Clerk of Superior court, D. C. Moore, Ex-Gov. T. J. Jarvis, or any leading citizen of Pitt county.
