HIGHWAY ROBBERY.

Mr. Robert Hester Waylaid, Shot and Robbed.

Mr. Robert Hester, a farmer who lives near Rocky Mount, went to that town Wednesday to sell a load of tobacco. About one o'clock he started home, and on the way was held up by two young negroes, 18 or 20 years old. They demanded his money, and upon being refused shot him three times and robbed him. Parties passing that way later found Mr. Hester in the road and took him home. The negroes were pursued and late in the evening were captured at Battleboro. They were taken back to Rocky Mount and carried in the presence of Mr. Hester who readily identified them.

That night the negroes were given a preliminary trial and were held under a thousand dollar bond, which they were unable to give. A lynching being feared they were sent at once to Raleigh and are now in Wake county jail.

Mr. Hester was formerly a resident tobacco buyer on the Greenville market and has many friends here. We are glad to learn that there is probability of his recovery from the wounds.

An Aged Horse.

Norman Dunnigan, who lives six miles north of Durham, has perhaps one of the oldest horses in the county. It is so far as we have any record at this writing. This horse is 33 years of age, and his teeth have worn down to the gums to such an extent that he is unable to masticate his food. For several years Mr. Dunnigan has been feeding him on soaked corn. It is unable to eat this now, and his diet is meal. Mr. Dunnigan says he is going to take good care of the horse for what he has been and will nurse him and feed him as long as he lives, and wants him to die a natural death.—Durham Sun.

J. BRYAN GRIMES FOR SECRETARY OF STATE.

The State Democratic Executive Committee have called an early nominative convention for the campaign and election of 1900, and already names are being suggested for candidates to fill the offices.

It has been sometime since Pitt county was represented on the State ticket. Whenever this county has furnished a State officer in the past he has made a record that was creditable both to his county and to the State. We have men now who are equally competent to fill with honor any position that is within the gift of the State, and one of these men should be on the ticket next year. It is due Pitt county to have a representative on the next State ticket, and THE REFLECTOR is indeed gratified that the name of our countyman, J. Bryan Grimes, is being mentioned as the man who should have the nomination for Secretary of State. Not only Pitt county but the entire first Congressional district will be solid for him, and we believe almost every section of the State will take equal pleasure in honoring him.

Mr. Grimes is in every way qualified to fill the position with the highest credit. His fitness can nowhere be disputed, and aside from this he is a farmer, thoroughly identified with all that tends to uplift and advance agricultural interests. While we have no fight to make against professional men, we know it is true that there are thousands of people in North Carolina who would prefer not having a ticket composed entirely of that class. The farmers should have at least one representative on the ticket and they could not be better represented than in Mr. Grimes.

VIRGINIA'S CARELESSNESS.

The Eastern Shore Has Become a Breeding Ground of Smallpox.

Much indignation is expressed at the carelessness of the authorities at Portsmouth and other towns in eastern Virginia with regard to the small pox. It was a fact well known that last year the disease was imported into this State from Virginia and in fact from the whole eastern shore seems to have become more or less of a breeding ground for the disease, the local authorities usually denying strenuously that there is any such thing as small pox about and the newspapers carefully suppressing all reference to it. Last year when Norfolk and Portsmouth were rotten with the disease—the number of cases is not obtainable as there seems to have been no record kept by the authorities—nothing appeared in the papers of those towns about the epidemic; at Newport News the chairman of the county board of health, who had a robust case of small pox when the United States official appeared, declared that there was not a case of the disease in that vicinity and refused to move until threatened with a quarantine against the county. In other words the attitude of eastern shore Virginia was to call it the elephant itch and then pass it on to as many of the neighbors as possible.

This year the same happy method of stamping out the disease has begun, and already this State has been infected. There are dozens of cases, but no attempt to compel vaccination or to prevent the spread of the disease. If this course is persisted in pressure will be brought to bear on the authorities of this State to declare a State quarantine against Norfolk, Portsmouth, and the whole infected region. The town authorities of Monroe, N. C., have already quarantined against Portsmouth, which was especially liberal last year in helping the epidemic along.

In this State the disease has appeared at Pomona, where about 40 cases are reported; at Salisbury, where 30 cases are reported to exist, though no recent report of the number has been made to the president of the State board of health; in Chatham county where it is of a rather severe form, and sporadic cases at other points.

Dr. Lewis, president of the State board of health, said yesterday that unless vigorous measures are adopted, especially compulsory vaccination in the towns where the disease has appeared, he apprehended more trouble from small pox this winter than the State had last year.

As has been pointed out so often, quarantining is practically useless in attempts to stamp out small pox, vaccination being the only efficient preventative. Nevertheless towns that are free from the disease may find the quarantine useful by enforcing it against all towns that have small pox and refuse to adopt a compulsory vaccination ordinance.—Raleigh News and Observer.

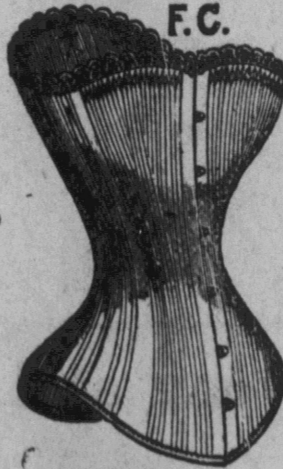
