Harry, Don't Come.

It strikes us painfully to see an official announcement in some of the State papers that Hon. Harry Skinner, of Greenville, Pitt county, late representative in Congress from this district, would canvass the same in opposition to the proposed Constitutional Amendment to the Constitution of North Carolina, which is to be submitted to the people of the State for approval or rejection at the August election.

Harry Skinner was relegated to private life in the election of '98. Since then he has been slowly recovering from the unnatural position to which his political associations had assigned him, and no one was more gratified than ourself that he was gradually reaching his normal place in the social scale of North Carolina's patriotic sons.

We know his heart was never in his political associations. No man knows better than Harry Skinner that the political condition in North Carolina that existed before the election of '98 could not have continued in eastern North Carolina without utter extinction to it as a civilized community. He saw it, and felt it, and we are sure regretted it, but his political environments and associations controlled him. He was handicapped by new friendships that wanted men whose past political records were clean, and whose associations were with men of character. He turned a listening ear to the whispers of foul politicians who had been unworthy to black his shoes. His contact with them was seen and he became suspected. His old friends gave him up, generally. And in an evil hour he fell into the arms of a foul combination of bad men, and became their leader and head. He advised them, eat with them out of the same spoon, was their chief speaker, held more promises unredeemed than any man among them; laughed at their coarse and vulgar jokes, licked the spittle from their dirty brogans. And then the great white man's struggle came and Harry Skinner fell from his high place among gentlemen, and was consigned to the tomb of the Capulets with bad men, carpet baggers, scalawags, buffaloes and negroes.

But with all his faults and misfortunes, his disappointments and deceptions, he yet has some elements of reform. He has done his old friends great wrong, he has out-

raged his good name in the past, he has fouled his bright and distinguished lineage that has been handed down to him through the generations.

But there are some traces left yet of his old friendships, and we would conjure him by them to stop in his parricidal course in trying to put back his old friends—the white men of the State—under the heels of ignorance and infamy.

At least, my old friend, don't come back on this side the sound, to help degrade the white people of this community. Or if you will thus disgrace yourself and the home of your nativity, come with averted face, covered with shame, and your furtive glance will meet no friends.—Elizabeth City Economist.

The Populist State Executive Committee met in Raleigh last week and decided to unite with the Republicans in opposition to the Constitutional amendment. 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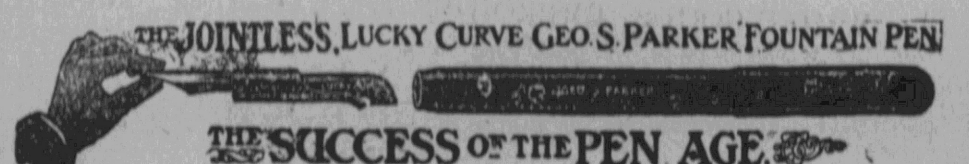
