GOOD ENOUGH NEWS.

DEMOCRACY SWEEPS EVERYTHING.

Amendment and Ticket Get 60,000 Majority.

White Supremacy Reigns and Butlerism Forever Buried.

North Carolina never did at grander day's work than on yesterday. From all over the State comes the glad news of the glorious victory and the heart of every true white man rejoices. Butler and his black and tan fusion crowd are relegated to oblivion and White supremacy floats from every banner.

The bulletins that follow tell the result. We give them in the order received.

Raleigh, 2.—Fair weather prevailed over the State and advices received up to seven o'clock are few but no disturbance reported. All reports quiet and orderly vote. Indications are that the largest majority ever shown in North Carolina will be given the entire Democratic ticket. And the amendment is claimed to be running side by side with the State ticket. Populists and Republicans are conceding the election of the Democratic ticket in many of their expected strong holds as not only many Populists but a large number of negroes are reported to have voted the Democratic ticket and even for the amendment. Democrats are resting on their oars and waiting only to know how large the majority will be.

Wake county gives Democratic majority of at least 1500. About fifteen negroes voted for the amendment.

Raleigh, 2.—Franklinton county reports Democratic majority of 100 for State ticket and amendment. Franklin county will give from 700 to 1000 majority.

Washington 2.—Town gives 620 majority for Amendment and all State and county Democratic candidates. Two precincts in county heard from give 178 majority for Amendment and Democratic candidates

Columbia 2.—Everything Democratic. Amendment leads all.

Tyrrell county goes for the Amendment one hundred majority and some to Democratic Legislative and State tickets. Whole Democratic county ticket elected.

Plymouth 2.—Washington county gives Democratic majorities from 250 to 300.

Williamston 2.—Every precinct in Martin county gives Democratic majority, average majority in county for white supremacy 800.

Returns from all precincts in Martin give one thousand and eighty-three Legislative. Balance one thousand.

Vance county gives Democratic majority of 400 to 500.

Chowan county reports entire Democratic ticket elected.

Indications from seven precincts in Anson county up to four o'clock show that entire Democratic and amendment safe by 1200 to 1500 majority, a gain of over 700 votes since last election.

Rowan county reports probable result of 1600 majority for State ticket 1300 for amendment.

Wayne county goes Democratic two thousand.

Person county estimate from 350 to 500 majority.

Washington county amendment five hundred majority. Legislative Democratic ticket three to four hundred majority.

Edgecombe county Democratic majority estimated over 3000 for whole ticket.

Granville county Democratic, Legislature, county and amendment.

Brunswick county about evenly divided for amendment and against Democratic ticket. Figures not obtainable yet.

Conservative estimates of New Hanover gives Aycock and the amendment three thousand majority. Before the last election there were 3,000 negro voters, this time only two negroes voted.

Burke county gives Democratic

majority on Legislative ticket. In Morganton township Democratic gain of 250 over last election.

Newbern gives large majority for Aycock and the amendment.

Martin county reports 800 Democratic majority.

Lenoir county claims a majority of 900 for State and amendment.

Orange county reports 250 Democratic majority for county and 200 for Legislature and amendment.

Beaufort county advices indicate Democratic majority for whole ticket but figures not yet obtainable.

Johnston county claims two thousand to twenty-five hundred majority for whole Democratic ticket and amendment.

Six precincts in Anson county gives amendment 1200 majority.

Seven townships in Bertie county give one thousand majority for amendment and Democratic State ticket. Claim that three townships will increase this.

Thirteen out of fourteen precincts in New Hanover give entire Democratic ticket and amendment three thousand majority. Prominent Republicans voted the amendment ticket.

Wilks county will elect Green, Democrat, for representative, balance ticket Republican by decreased majority.

Estimated majority for the amendment and Democratic ticket in Mecklenburg county 3,500.

Pasquotank county gives amendment and State Democratic ticket 200 majority.

Twelve out of twenty-one precincts in Beaufort county show majority of about 1200 for amendment and 1000 for State ticket. This will be increased to probably 1500 or more.

Harnett county gives 400 Democratic majority.

New Hanover complete returns Democratic majority 2969, same for amendment, only one vote against.

Brunswick 200 Democratic and for amendment.

Pasquotank county claims to have gone Democratic on entire ticket.

Republicans concede Bertie county to the Democrats by five hundred.

Perquimons reports safe for amendment but give no advice as to State.

Richmond county reports 1,500 majority for amendment and entire Democratic ticket.

Catawba county claims three hundred Democratic majority.

In Davidson county both sides claim county. Republicans claim four hundred. Democrats between 300 and 600. Amendment will run a little behind the State ticket.

Northampton county reports probable election of full Democratic ticket.

Iredell county for amendment 600, State ticket Democratic by 800 majority.

Raleigh, 2, 10:30.—Semi-official returns from 18 counties in the State indicate an increase of fifty per cent. over the Charlotte Observer's forecast. If this ratio is maintained the majority for the Democratic State ticket and amendment will exceed 60,000.

Good Farming in Catawba.

Mr. Forney Wilson, who has year bought Mr. Geo. A. Warlick's farm on the Lincolnton road, three miles south of Newton, is a farmer who is making money fast at farming. He has just had 1,000 bushels of wheat threshed on his new place and the only money paid out in raising the crop was \$45 for fertilizer. He has saved 50 bushels of this crop for seed and sold balance for \$700. He will also raise \$300 worth of cotton on the place and enough corn, potatoes and other crops to support his family. He and his children do all the work, and he does not pay out a cent except for fertilizer. On his old place he will also have about 300 bushels of wheat and a good lot of cotton.—Newton Enterprise.

Mr. S. M. Thomas, a farmer of Scotland county, tells the Charlotte Observer that an insect has made its appearance on the cotton in the Scotland section—a small red spider, active and destructive in its work. These insects settle under the bottom of a leaf and eat it entirely up, and the plant stops growing, being dead to all purposes.

Public education is claiming the attention of the people of North Carolina now as perhaps never before. All over the State the subject has been vigorously discussed during the present campaign, and the people are thinking more about it. There is general belief that the passing of the amendment will wonderfully quicken the interest and both races will be greatly benefitted by it.—Scotland Neck Commonwealth.

The exposure by the police of a series of thefts by a band of little boys of Raleigh calls for serious and practical thought on the part of the Christian people of the whole State. We need a Reformatory, and we are going to have one. Would it not be a great plan for all Christian people to unite in the support of one and relieve the State of the obligation?—Biblical Recorder.

Governor Beckham, of Kentucky, has decided to call an extra session of the Legislature at some date between August 15th and September 1st to amend the Goebel election law.

Too Frequent Elections.

For six years the Commonwealth has been convinced that our elections in North Carolina are too frequent. And more than once on the very eve of an important election we have written our opinion on the subject.

Again we write on the eve of the greatest and most significant contest our people have engaged in for a generation; and we declare once more that our elections are too frequent. There are many good reasons for such a position, and any one can find them if he will but think a little.

Once in every two years we have the renewal of strife, bitterness and ill-feeling, which are engendered by a hot political contest; and before these feelings are forgotten and quiet is restored another campaign opens and the strife is all renewed.

The farmers of the State, the business men and the professional men scarcely have time to turn their minds to their vocation before they are called upon to take a stand again on this side or that.

Besides the bad feeling that such frequent contests engender, there is incalculable expense attached to it.

To be sure, no white man or patriot in North Carolina can for a moment begrudge a single day or hour or week or month that has been spent in this present campaign in the interest of the Amendment; for the blessings that will come to the State through the Amendment will repay for all the expenses of time and money.

But we speak of elections generally. They are so frequent that nothing seems settled for even a year's time. Let us have our elections not oftener than once in four years. With such a change there would come a peaceful result to the State that would greatly aid the people in the pursuits which mean fortunes for some and bread for all.

We write before we know the result of to-day's election; but we plead for elections to be less frequent.

The Abuse of Immigrants.

Many weeks ago an investigation was made into the charges of gross abuses of immigrants arriving at Ellis Island. It has leaked out that the inspectors had collected evidence that immigrants had been robbed in many ways, that they were compelled to suffer indignities and violence, and that the outrages committed upon women were indescribable. Every effort is said to have been made by the Government to hush up the scandal because of its possible effects on the elections. It has even been intimated that, in order to prevent publicity, the brutes who were guilty of criminal assaults and robbery are to be retained until after the polls have been closed.

It is from an English source that we have received confirmation of these charges. A reputable London journal sent a representative over as a steerage passenger to learn the truth about the matter. He describes Ellis Island as a prison "where immigrants are beaten and abused worse than cattle by the dirtiest ruffians in New York." The correspondent gives specific information, with names; and, following the information that has leaked out of the Treasury Department, his statements can hardly be open to doubt. If it be true that a foul-mouthed Bowery tough, in authority on the island, drags feeble old men along by their beards and kicks immigrants in the head with his heavy boots the Administration cannot hope to escape a public scandal.—Philadelphia Record.

To one who can but vaguely comprehend figures the statement that the exports of our country in the fiscal year 1899-1900 amounted to \$1,394,479,000, being an excess over imports on \$544,765,000, conveys at least an impressive notion of the tremendous international interests of our country. And when he perceives that our excess of exports for four years exceeds that of all the ballance of our history, he will understand how magnificent has been the commercial expansion of our country. In view of these figures we well may begin to provide ample means to uphold our rights in the great world. We are no longer sufficient to ourselves. We make more than we can consume. We must have markets. We must have open doors. It is progress or death. We need not only strategic positions, not only a great navy; but we need a stronger diplomatic and consular service, since this department of government has everything to do with our international relations and our foreign commerce. And we ought to have a great fleet of merchant vessels.—Biblical Recorder.

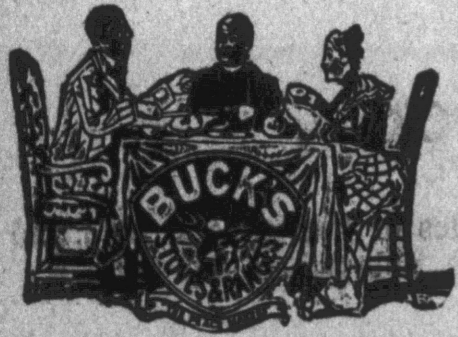
