### TOWN MATTERS.

#### Proceedings of Board of Alder- men.

The Board of Aldermen held  
their regular monthly meeting  
Thursday night, but did not have  
much business to attend to. Five  
of the members were present.

The Treasurer reported \$255.28  
on hand.

The different standing commit-  
tees reported matters in their re-  
spective departments in fair con-  
dition.

The report of J. T. Smith, Chief  
of Police, showed a total of \$47.73  
collected in fines and costs during  
the month, and E. B. Dudley as-  
sistant Police \$5.37.

The report of C. D. Rountree,  
Tax Collector, showed total col-  
lections for the month as follows:  
for dog taxes \$9, licenses taxes \$96,  
market rents \$49.15, general taxes  
\$384.04.

The Tax Collector was ordered  
to collect tobacco dealer's license  
tax from all pinhookers operating  
on the tobacco market.

The petition of H. B. Harris to  
be released from boarding house  
license tax was rejected.

Some bills of cost amounting to  
\$21.17 held by the Superior Court  
Clerk in cases against the town  
were ordered paid.

The policemen were authorized  
to provide themselves with uni-  
forms at a cost not exceeding \$24  
each, the town to reimburse them  
by adding \$3 per month each to  
their salaries until the uniforms  
are paid for or as long as they are  
in the service of the town as police-  
men.

Accounts were allowed and  
ordered paid amounting to \$269.47.

#### A Baby Born With a Set of Teeth

The two weeks old baby of Mr.  
and Mrs. Jay Coon is a fine little  
personage and is far ahead of most  
babies for its age. The child had  
been fretful and would not be paci-  
fied, and all efforts to quiet the  
little one proved of no avail until  
the Rev. Mr. McGhee, who was  
making a pastoral visit, discovered  
that the child had a set of upper  
teeth. This is a very uncom-  
mon occurrence. The child is  
otherwise healthy.—Mooreville  
Enterprise.

#### The Deception Exposed.

During the last campaign Re-  
publicans declared that the adop-  
tion of the amendment would en-  
danger the franchise of uneducated  
white men. In his speech here,  
last Saturday, Judge Ewart, Re-  
publican, took occasion to say he  
did not believe a single white man  
in North Carolina would be dis-  
franchised by the amendment.  
Judge Ewart's declaration affords  
evidence of the deception practiced  
by Republican speakers in the  
August campaign.—Winston Sen-  
tinel.

as he would be if attending a sim-  
ple ward meeting to select dele-  
gates or nominate a county candi-  
date. The primary is only a guide

#### Eight Distinct Earthquake Shocks in Jacksonville, Fla.

Jacksonville, Fla., Oct. 31.—  
Eight distinct earthquake shocks  
were felt in Jacksonville today.

The first shock was at 11.10  
o'clock A. M., and shook some of  
the large buildings in the city.  
Hundreds of people believed that  
heavy ordnance was being fired in  
or near the city.

At 11.25 another shock, equally  
as severe, was felt and they con-  
tinued at fifteen minutes intervals  
until 12.30 o'clock.

At 4.04 o'clock this afternoon  
the seventh shock of the day was  
felt more severely than any of the  
preceding, followed four minutes  
later by a report and shock the  
severest of the day. The last dis-  
turbance made the window-panes  
rattle in several sections of the  
city.

The local weather bureau officials  
realized the nature of the shock at  
the first and kept the time. Di-  
rector Mitchell stated it as his  
opinion that the vibrations passed  
from south to north. There was  
no disturbance in the water notice-  
able and the shocks were not  
severe enough to cause and dam-  
age.

Very cold weather is predicted to begin about the 8th of November. The candidates who get left on the 6th will be feeling that it is mighty cold for them about that time.

Every Democrat should be at the polls next Tuesday and see that Bryan and Small get the full vote of the party. This is far more important than who they vote for for Senator.

The great contest between the friends of the people and their opponents is now near its close. The year 1900 will be memorable, not only as the end of the century, but because of the tremendous political conflict that has stirred the people from Maine to California. On one side are massed the supporters of good government, the people who sustain the constitution the opponents of trusts, the opponents of imperialism, the opponents of militarism: On the other side are those who apologize for the truth, who sympathize with those large capitalist who band themselves together in the unholy purpose to control trade, who advocate holding in subjection millions of people in distant countries as our subjects, and who approve of an enormous arm as the only means to conquer those foreign people and subjugate them.

One party led by Bryan, represents the constitution of our country, the spirit of liberty, and the safe principles of free government. The other party under McKinley, is dominated by those influences that lead to conquest, to tyranny, to imperialism, to an expensive government, to the establishment of trusts and the destruction of individual rights.

The fall elections show that the people at the North are dissatisfied with the Republican party, and with its objects and purposes. If the change, proved by the elections in Maine and New Hampshire, extend to the other States, Bryan will be elected by a tidal wave; but we cannot rely on that. We must give him the electoral vote of North Carolina. His hope of success depends on our vote. And while the people of the North are aroused, our people appear to be very quiet. It is feared that many Bryan men, believing that the State is safe for him will remain at home on election day. If many Bryan men stay away from the polls Bryan will lose the

State, and McKinley will carry North Carolina.

We appeal, therefore, to every Bryan man to do his utmost towards averting that danger. We appeal to every Bryan man to go to polls on election day, and not only go himself, but to see that every other Bryan man in his neighborhood goes to the election and votes. Victory is within our reach; let us not lose it by neglect. Let us devote one day to getting out a full vote, to securing every vote we can for Bryan and good government. Then if we are defeated we cannot blame ourselves.

They can help, and she can seek with much greater hope of success if the goal in view be something definite."

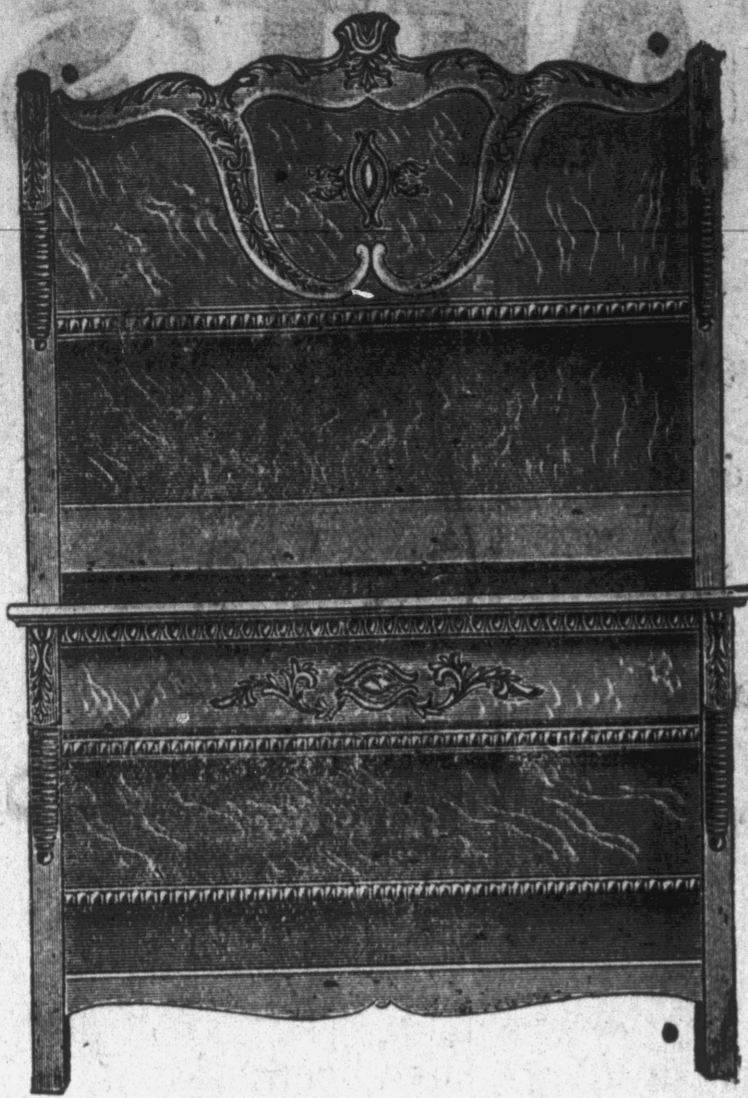

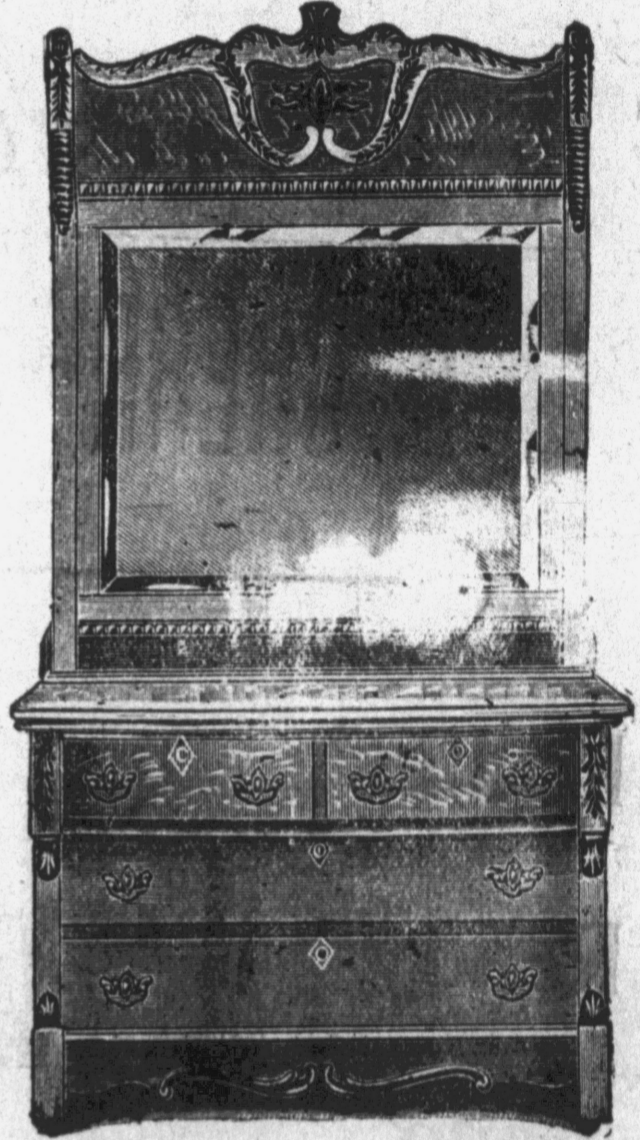

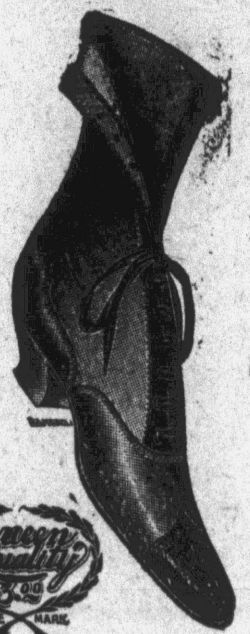
