McKINLEY AGAIN. Goes in with a Landslide.

He Carries 27 States and has 282 Electoral Votes with a Possibility of 305.

THE REFLECTOR gives the news of the election this morning just as it came by wire last night. While it is not the kind of news from the country at large that Democrats would love to read, they must accept the result and take it as it is. Below are the bulletins:

NEBRASKA.

Lincoln—The Associated Press bulletins at 7 o'clock the report at the Bryan house express the opinion that New York is lost to the Democratic ticket and that the general outlook upon the meagre returns received is not favorable. Mr. Bryan expressed no opinion.

New York Journal's Lincoln, Nebraska special says fusion managers assert that Bryan will have at least 8000 majority. Bryan's precinct went McKinley 208 Bryan 105.

Nebraska—50 Precincts in Omaha, McKinley 697 Bryan 628.

Lincoln—National Committee-man Dahl, who is very close to Mr. Bryan, says that while New York and Illinois are lost he does not by any means concede McKinley's election. He thinks other states will come to the rescue.

Lincoln—At 11 o'clock Mr. Bryan told the newspapers that he would have no statement to make before tomorrow.

NEW JERSEY.

Trenton—Incomplete returns from different parts of State indicate that New Jersey has been carried for McKinley by more than 50,000.

WEST VIRGINIA.

Parkersburg—Chairman Dawson of State Republican committee claims State for McKinley by 17,000 plurality.

OREGON.

Oregon central committee concedes the State to Republicans by 5,000 to 6,000. Indications are that it will reach 20,000.

TENNESSEE.

Nashville—Returns from Tennessee are unusually slow coming in but those in hand show Democratic gains. Davidson county, including Nashville, increases Bryan's majority over 20,000. The Democratic committee claim 8 out of 10 Congressmen, but the Republican committee claim that Democrats in seventh district will be defeated by independents backed by Republicans and that the eighth district is in doubt.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Boston—Thirty towns in Massachusetts give Bryan 3451, McKinley 7125, a net Democratic gain of 3400 votes.

Boston—Returns from portion of State shows that McKinley has carried Massachusetts by reduced majority that crane, Republican has been elected Governor and that the Republicans have elected at least nine out of thirteen Congressmen.

NORTH DAKOTA.

Fargo—Chairman State Republican Committee claims State for McKinley.

KENTUCKY.

Louisville—32 precincts in city of Louisville give McKinley 4,520, Bryan 2,673.

Courier Journal bulletin returns insist that McKinley will carry the State by 6,000. Democrats may elect two of the six Congressmen, Talbott and Denny.

The New York Journal Frankford, Ky. special best estimates on Kentucky indicates certain election of 8 Democratic congressmen out of 11. Bryan's plurality will likely reach 15,000.

Louisville, Ky.—Incomplete returns from 133 counties outside of Louisville gives Beckham for Governor 8,500 majority over Yerkes. Bryan is running a little ahead of Beckham in same counties.

MISSISSIPPI.

Jackson—The returns shown in reports so far are that the election was quiet and orderly. In Jackson 75 per cent. of the registered vote was polled, and indications are that the total vote polled will be 70,000.

CONNECTICUT.

Returns indicate that McKinley carries the State by 20,000.

MICHIGAN.

Detroit—President McKinley has carried Michigan beyond a doubt. Conservative estimates place his majority at 65,000. His majority in 1896 was 1,542, at 10 p. m. it is thought the Republicans have elected all their Congressman.

TEXAS.

Houston—Bryan's majority in the State will be over 150,000.

FLORIDA.

The Democrats carry the State by a large majority and elect a full Congressional delegation.

LOUISIANA.

This State returns solid Democratic delegation to Congress, Bryan carries state by 30,000.

DELAWARE.

The N. Y. Journal special says Delaware goes Republican 15,000 to 20,000.

RHODE ISLAND.

Rhode Island 27 districts out of 143 give McKinley 4548 Bryan 1880. The same districts in 1896 gave Bryan 1,000, McKinley 3,700. No returns yet from five cities.

MINNESOTA.

20 precincts in St. Paul McKinley 3238, Bryan 2018.

Republican plurality in State will largely exceed 60,000.

ARKANSAS.

Arkansas reports indicate light vote, returns coming in slowly. Democrats claim entire Congressional delegation elected.

Little Rock—The Democrats elect Congressmen.

MARYLAND.

Baltimore—Murray Vann Diver, Chairman the Democratic state Central Committee concedes Maryland to McKinley.

CALIFORNIA.

San Francisco—Up to 9 P. M. the returns from this city indicate that California has gone Republican by to 10 15,000.

NEVADA.

Reno—The election passed off quietly throughout Nevada present indications point to Bryans election by anywhere between 7500 to [CONTINUED ON SECOND PAGE]

SOUTH DAKOTA.

Estimates on returns so far received indicate Republican majority in the State of 20,000.

KANSAS.

The Populist chairman claims the State for Bryan by 10,000, while the Republican chairman claims it for McKinley by 20,000.

OHIO.

Columbus, Ohio—Reports from different parts of Ohio indicate largest vote ever cast, larger than expected with McKinley gaining in the rural districts and holding his own in the cities.

Canton—The President is beginning to receive congratulations on his re-election.

Congratulations executive mansion, Canton, Ohio, November 6th, the President's first congratulations from headquarters came from J. H. Manly at New York is as follows: "Praise God from whom all blessings flow." triumphant re-election is conceded by Democratic managers I tender my earnest congratulations. We are very happy at headquarters.

Canton—Executive mansion—Judge Day, who is with president says McKinley carries 27 states with 284 electoral votes.

Chas. Dick has given the following statement: Indications received up to this hour justify claiming that Ohio has given McKinley a plurality of from 75 to 80,000.

Canton—President McKinley received a tremendous ovation from his towns people at 12:30 and addressed them from his porch.

NEW YORK.

Oswego—Bryan carries Oswego by 444.

Schenectady—Edgar T. Brackett, Republican, is re-elected to Senate from the 28th district.

Auburn—This city complete gives McKinley 4,142, Bryan 2,808.

New York—Forty election districts out of 3,124 in New York State outside of Greater New York gives McKinley 8,699, Bryan 7,129. Same districts in 1896 gave McKinley 8,987, Bryan 6,192. Palmer 151.

New York Mail and Express claims the State of New York for McKinley and Roosevelt by at least 150,000.

The Journal says McKinley wins New York State by 150,000.

Borough of Richmond, New York, five election districts out of 40 McKinley 564, Bryan 717.

At 8 o'clock National committee-man estimates from the returns received at that hour that McKinley will carry New York State by 110,

000 majority. He concedes New York City to Croker by 15,000 and claims that all the States that went for McKinley in 1896 have been carried for him again, but some by small majorities.

New York—204 election districts out of 3124, districts in New York State outside of greater New York give Odell 45266, Stanchfield 42969, same districts in 1896 gave Roosevelt 37610, Vanwick 28805.

A bulletin says: New Jersey Republican by 30,000, Indiana Democratic by 15,000, Illinois Republican by 25,000. These estimates are based on about one twentieth or the full vote.

The Herald estimates McKinleys plurality in New York state at 175,000.

A Journal Boston special places McKinley's majority in Massachusetts at 90,000.

WISCONSIN.

The Republican State Central committee claim Wisconsin by 10,000.

Returns up to midnight indicate the State has gone for McKinley from 105,000 to 115,000.

MAINE.

Fifty towns in Maine gives McKinley 12402, Bryan 7611, scattering 511.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Returns from this State up to 9 o'clock show Bryan far ahead.

ILLINOIS.

Chicago—Ninety precincts out of 1,127 give McKinley 13,845, Bryan 13,369.

Chicago—From present indications McKinley's plurality in Illinois will be 175,000.

Chicago—Total vote of this city gives McKinley 180,972, Bryan 172,524, Woolly 3,335, Debs 5,022.

At 12:30 this morning National Committeeman Manly, Gibbs and Bliss, held a conference at the conclusion of which the following statement was given out: "On the returns received at Republican headquarters up to this hour the Republican National Committee claims to have elected McKinley and Roosevelt by an electoral vote of 284, with the possibility of 21 votes in addition, making a total of 305. These votes consist of the

13 in Kentucky and 8 in Nebraska Chicago—at midnight vice chairman Payne sent the following telegram to Colonel. Roosevelt: "The country is saved. We have beaten Pettigrew and captured Nebraska, Legislature and all."

NORTH CAROLINA.

Small's plurality for Congress in Hertford county is from 300 to 500.

Martin county gives Simmons from 1,000 to 1,200 majority and Small and Bryan about 800.

Beaufort county gives Bryan a majority of 500, Simmons. 500 to 750.

Wilmington—Bellamy is re-elected to Congress in the seventh district by overwhelming majority. Bryan's majority in the State will reach 25,000.

Martin complete returns shows a majority of 1204 for Simmons.

Raleigh—The election in North Carolina was very quiet. Returns indicate Bryan majority will not be less than 3000, seven Democrat in Congressmen elected with two in doubt.

Lenoir county gives Bryan and Kitchin about 1000 majority and Simmons 1200.

Greene county gives a straight Democratic majority of about 500 which is a gain of more than 100.

Washington county gives Simmons 425 majority and Small 400.

Small is re-elected to Congress from the first district by at least 4,000 majority.

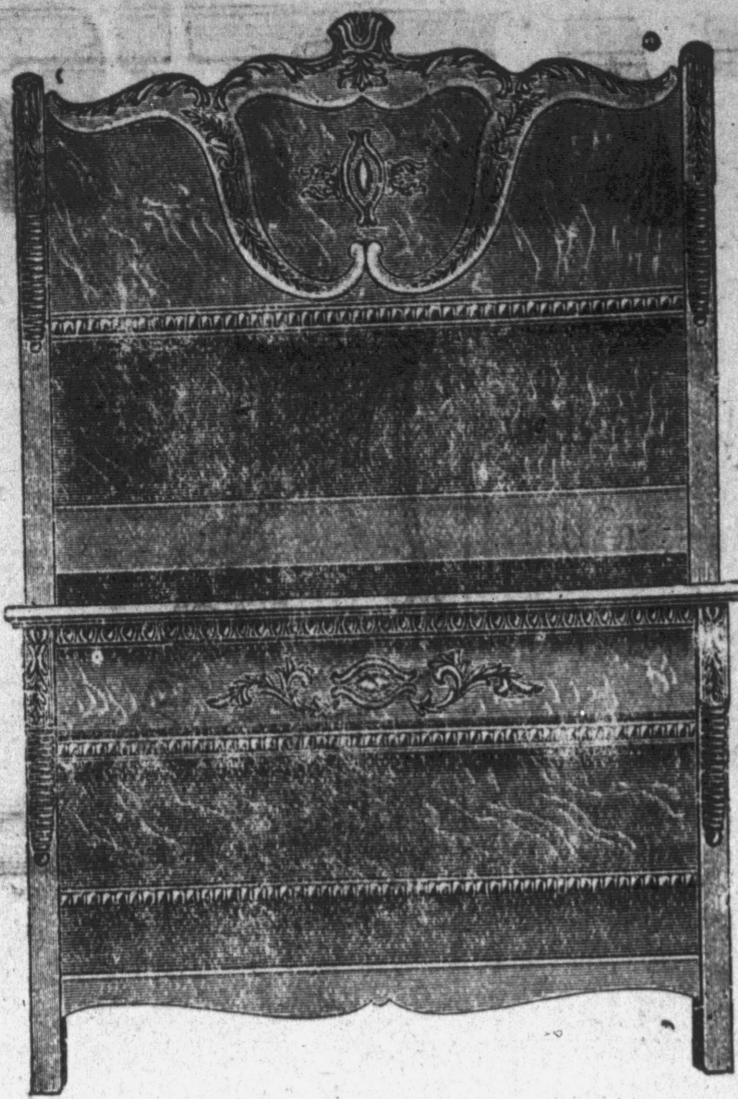

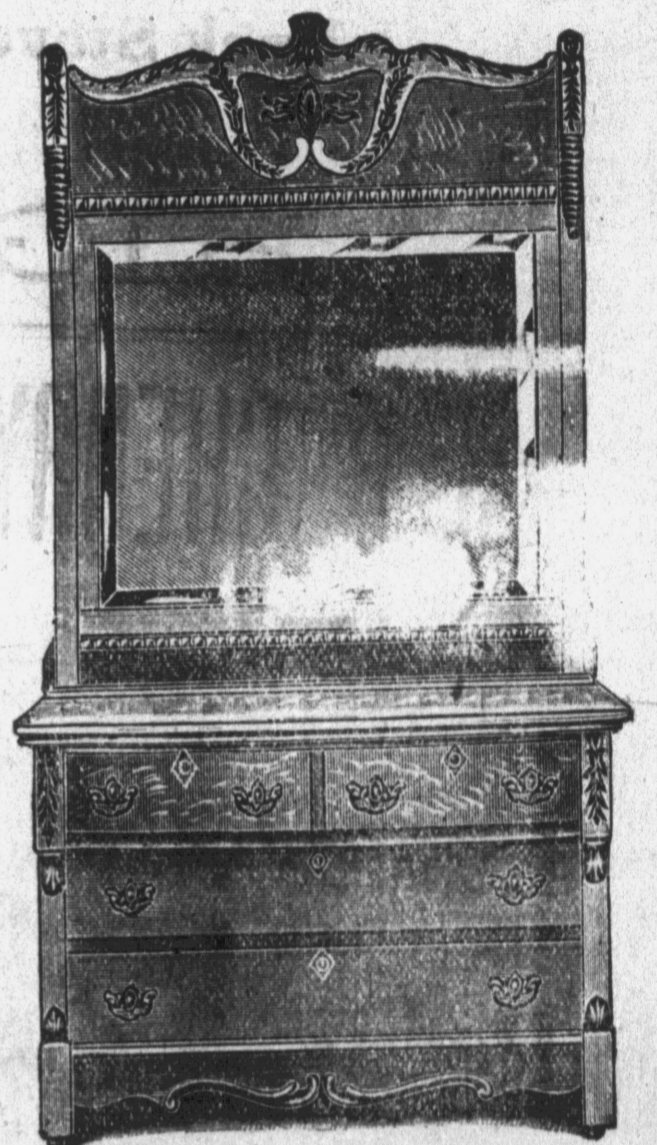
