### STATE NEWS.

#### Happenings in North Carolina

John Perry, a white man, died in Durham Saturday morning, having drank himself to death.—Kinston Free Press.

Congressman elect Will Kitchin, Democrat, has been informed that his election from the Fifth district, will be contested.

The N. C. A. & M. College football team was defeated by the University of South Carolina at Columbia, S. C., Saturday, 12 to 0.

Mr. Henry Pence, of the Salisbury cotton mill, has a natural curiosity—a piece of slate that was blasted out of the bottom of a well in Stanley county recently. It has a forest scene on it and looks very much like a photograph. Several of these views were found when the slate was split open. How they came there no one can tell.—Salisbury Star.

#### A Great Battle in South China.

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 11.—News was received by the steamship Victoria concerning the rebellion in South China. The Traids have broken out in Kwang Si and Marshal Su, commander-in-chief of the imperial forces, is asking for 3,000 men to suppress them. The British have dispatched infantry and artillery to guard the Kow Loon frontier. When the torpedo boat destroyer Handy was landing men, she encountered a force of rebels and threw shells among them as they advanced on San Chuan, routing them and killing forty.

A force of Kwang Si rebels marching to join the Kwan Sing rebels met and defeated the imperial troops near Kuanging and captured 30. Great preparations for the building, mine laying and drilling of troops were going on in the affected provinces.

A battle was fought at Tsan Tsou, on the Shan Tung-Chi Li border, October 17, between imperial troops and Boxers. General Yuan's troops numbered 8,000 and the Boxers 12,000. Two thousand men were left to guard Tsang Chou and General Mel, in charge of the imperial troops, gave battle outside. The battle lasted all day and resulted in the defeat of the Boxers with great loss. Their leader, Chen, refused to retreat, and when the fight was lost fought with 300 desperadoes in a ravine until all of them were killed. His head was taken and hung on the walls of the city. Six thousand rebels were killed.

Consul Goodnow, of Shanghai, has made a summary of Boxer outrages, showing that 83 American and British missionaries were murdered and 170 other missionaries in Shan Si and Chi Li are missing.

The population of the State of Massachusetts as officially announced by the Census Bureau is 2,805,346, as against 2,435,943 in 1890. This is an increase of 566,403, or 25.2 per cent.

#### Imprisoned by Bank Robbers.

About midnight last night Dr. G. H. Albright, a leading physician of this place, was called out to see a patient. On his return home, while crossing the public square in front of John A. Black's bank, four men rushed out and, covering him with their pistols, ordered him to throw up his hands. He was then taken to the corner of the building and carefully guarded and told that if he looked at any of them he would be killed. Confederates were inside the bank proceeding to blow open the vault. After hearing several dynamite explosions the doctor heard one of the men in the building say:

"Bring him in."  
This was done, and he was thrust into the vault and the door closed, one of the men remarking:  
"Have a seat, doc."

Dr. Albright remained in the vault till 6 o'clock this morning, the opening hour. The time door of the safe was blown to pieces, but the side door was not opened. There was about \$5,500 in the vault, all of which was accounted for but \$300, which the robbers succeeded in obtaining.

The Cumberland Valley Bank was also entered, but no damage done. The bank had a large safe, which it is supposed the burglars were afraid to tackle.—Barboursville, Ky., Dispatch. 9th.

The Wilmington Star states the truth forcefully in the following:

Some of the gentlemen who helped to defeat the Democratic party four years ago and again last Tuesday by voting for McKinley, or by refusing to vote for Bryan, have come to the front to tell how the party can be organized. ## WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 12th.

Democratic Senator and Representatives who have been in Washington since the election have not been disposed to talk for publication on the result, not because they are discouraged or then—they consider the future of the democratic party in either doubt or danger, but on the general principle that it is always good policy for the defeated party to let the other fellows do the talking for awhile, just as they will have to do the legislating and administrating of the country for awhile. For the same reason they think the talk about re-organizing the democratic party, which has been indulged in to a limited extent since the election, premature at this time. The best policy for the democrats to adopt for a while is to keep a careful watch on the republicans, show up every blunder they make, and do a whole lot of thinking. It will be two years before there is another congressional election, and until then, the democrats will have no opportunity to get control of any branch of the National Government. The gentlemen who are talking about holding conventions, etc. for a re-organization of the party at this time, are doubtless perfectly honest and wholly unselfish in their wishes for the future welfare of the party, but if they persist they will surely be suspected by many of being more anxious to get the party reins in their hands than of really helping the party. Party reorganizations, so far as leaders and principles are concerned, are things which generally take care of themselves, as has been demonstrated more than once in the history of the democratic party, and doubtless will be again. Party upheavals which are genuine, usually start from the bottom, the rank and file of any party know how to change leaders when they consider it desirable or necessary to do so.

Secretary Root has gone to Cuba and for two reasons his going has caused much gossip in Washington, where it is believed to be connected with matters of importance relating to the future of Cuba. The first of these reasons is that the Cuban Constitutional Convention is now in session in Havana, and the second is that this is considered the unhealthy season in Cuba. Mr. Root's health has not been robust since he had that operation performed on him a month or two ago, and he would hardly have chosen this season for his visit to Cuba, unless his going was important.

Just \$100,000 more of good

American money will be invested in the Philippines if the Senate ratifies the treaty signed by Secretary Hay and the Spanish Minister, which binds this country to pay Spain that amount for three small islands located just outside of the boundaries set by the treaty which ceded the Philippine island to the U. S.

The orders sent to Gen. MacArthur, from Washington to take the field in person in the new campaign that is to be waged against the Philippine insurgents as soon as the rainy season ends over there show that the administration takes no serious stock in the statement constantly made during the campaign that the recollection of Mr. McKinley would be followed by the collapse of the revolution. That was good enough talk for campaign purpose, but now orders are to fight it to a finish. In ordering General MacArthur to take the field in person, Gen. Otis, who was so generally criticized for not doing so, is indirectly given a side swipe.

Gossip has mortgaged several Cabinet portfolios in the second McKinley administration. As told in Washington, these stories make Mr. W. W. Gibbs, of Philadelphia, who helped Hanna squeeze the rich men and corporations of that town, just as St. John Wanamaker did previous to his entrance of the Harrison Cabinet, the holder of one of these mortgages, and some go so far as to say, that Mr. Gibbs is to become Secretary or the Treasury. If he does, it will be an awful throw down for Secretary Gage, who had understood that he was to remain at the head of the treasury, or he would not have fathered those freak interviews given out during the campaign to alarm the business interests of the country.

It is now practically admitted by republicans that the talk previous to the election of a repeal of the war taxes was nothing more than a campaign bluff. A call for the ways and Means Committee of the House to meet on the 20th inst, has been issued. The bill the committee will prepare will merely revise the war taxes some campaign obligations are to be paid that way and will not repeal all of them. The republicans know very well that with the total appropriated by the last session of Congress of \$974,000,000 and the probability that a larger sum will be appropriated by the coming session. All or nearly all of the money produced by the war taxes will be needed. The bill prepared by the committee will probably reduce the war taxes in the interests of favored classes, something like \$15,000,000 or \$20,000,000 a year, but the bulk of those taxes will have to be paid by the people for an indefinite period.

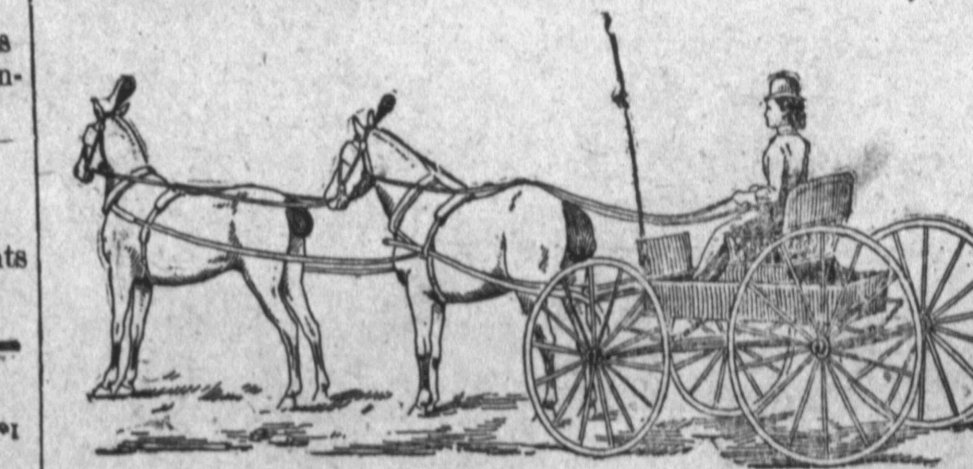

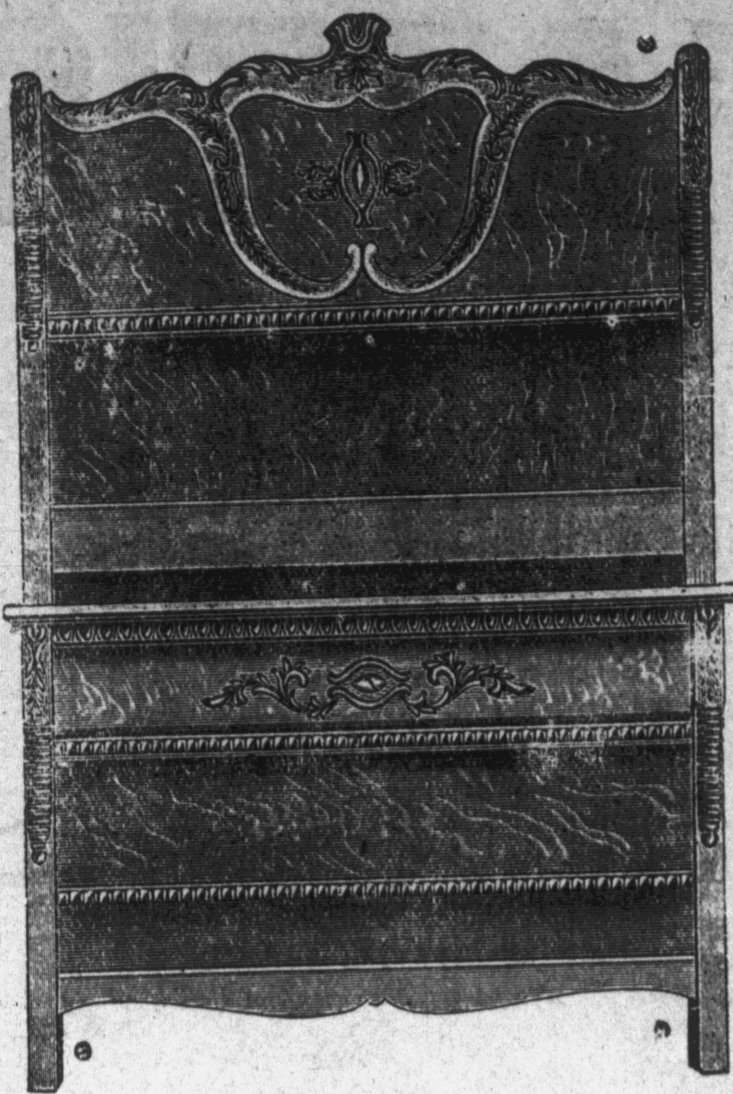
