The city papers of Tuesday did not have much in them except the Presidents message, and there was mighty little worth talking about in that.

It dont look like just the right thing for Democratic papers to be meddling in a Republican Presidents affairs and suggesting who he ought to put in his Cabinet.

How nearly the "open door" in China has been closed by the disturbances there is shown in the the Statistical Bureau's statement of exports to China for October last \$576,005, as against \$1,324,314 for the corresponding month of 1899. The falling off in this trade during ten months of the current calendar year amounted to \$2,196,144—no inconsiderable item in an export traffic reaching about \$15,000,000 annually. On the other hand, Japan, Australia, British India and the Philippine Island have vastly increased their imports of American commodities, and our export traffic in this quarter for the current year will probably exceed \$100,000,000, or thrice the volume of American exports to the same countries five years ago. In this field of international traffic, indeed, American enterprise has made more rapid strides and achieved greater triumphs than any of its competitors among trading nations.—Philadelphia Record.
