Friends of David B. Hill, of New York, are announcing that he is to be a prominent candidate for the Presidency on Democratic ticket in 1904.

The New York Herald says that at a meeting of anarchists in New York, five hundred of them vociferously applauded the speaker when he threatened the life of President McKinley "should he attempt to interfere with full speech."

The legislative examining committee which has been going through the books of State Treasurer Worth, are after Governor Russell for spending so much money for "legal advice"—over \$21,500 having been paid to lawyers out of the treasury (fees during the last two years. Another matter that will be reported to the General Assembly is the payment of \$800 to Shell Fish Commissioner White by the Treasurer (by order of the Supreme Court) after the legislature had forbidden its payment.

Attorney General Douglas, who will recommend in his report the establishment of the much needed reformatory for young degenerates, is putting himself in communication with the Attorneys General of other States where such institutions exist, with a view to laying before the legislature desirable information as to their conduct workings and beneficial results. There is no longer a doubt of the creation of the reformatory if our lawmakers regard the desire and counsel of the people of this State—for nearly every one is in favor of it.

The Washington Gazette Messenger makes a timely suggestion, that the legislature make provision for the examination of women who have been the victims of vicious assault only in the presence of the judge, jury, and counsel interested and that all others be excluded. What would be better still would be the deposition of the woman, taken as depositions usually are. The present method, as our contemporary suggests, is not only cruel, but actually conducive to lynch law, the friends of the woman resorting to this as a means of relieving the victim of the ordeal of a public examination as well as a prompt and certain punishment of the offender. The importance of the amendment of the present law in the respect mentioned merits the attention of the general assembly.—Raleigh Post.

The Century's Last Christmas.

Making an appeal for a simpler Christmas, Edward Bok in the December Ladies' Home Journal, considers this Christmas—because it is the last of the century—a good time to change about and go back to the simpler Christmas of earlier days. A Large Increase in Valuations

Col. John W. Hinsdale, counsel for the Corporation Commission in the railroad tax assessment case, states that in his opinion the result of the case will be a very large increase in the valuation of all property. His Capacity Has Limits.

"Superintendent Henry K. Boyer, at the Philadelphia mint," says the Philadelphia Press, "has fourteen coining presses working overtime trying to keep up with the unusual demand for the glittering small coins. For two weeks he has kept his force working until 8 o'clock at night, and has been able to send away only 500,000 new pennies a day. From Washington and the West comes the despairing cry for more. It is almost a penny famine. There is a panic in the slot machine industry. From now until Christmas, by working the force until 10 o'clock at night, the Superintendent hopes to send away 800,000 pennies a day, and it is possible that he may break the record by reaching the million mark."

In the year 1901 there will be three eclipses—two of the sun and one of the moon. The first will be a total eclipse of the sun May 18, visible in Australia and South America; the second will be a partial eclipse of the moon, October 27th, visible in Alaska, at the beginning, and in the Philippine Islands, Asia and Eastern Europe, and the third will be an annular eclipse of the sun November 11th, visible throughout most of Europe, Asia, Africa and the Philippine Islands. None of the eclipses will be visible in the United States.
