By Ward, to permit graduates holding diplomas to teach from State Normal Schools to teach in public free schools for two years without examination by county boards of education, etc: Committee on Education.

By Broughton, to incorporate the North Carolina Trust Company, with headquarters in Raleigh.

SMALLPOX IN GREENE.

Many Cases And Badly Neglected.

There has been a dreadful outbreak of smallpox in the Speights Bridge section of Greene county. Notice of the probable existence of the disease there was sent to Dr. D. T. Tayloe, of Washington, who is one of the inspectors for the State, and he went Sunday to investigate. On his way back he stopped Sunday night in Greenville. In conversation with Mayor Moye, Dr. Tayloe said he found fourteen well developed cases of the disease, and could no doubt have found many more if he had had time to carry the investigation further. The cases he did examine were enough to verify the existence of the disease, and he gave such instruction as was needed for preventing its spread. Dr. Tayloe said the disease in that section had been badly neglected.

A BILL

To be Entitled An Act to Prevent Live Stock From Running at Large in Certain Portions of Pitt County and to Consolidate and Enlarge the Stock Law Territory of Said County.

(CONTINUED FROM SATURDAY.)

Sec. 3. That for the purpose of defraying the expenses of erecting said fences and gates around said territory and maintaining and keeping the same in good repairs and condition; the board of county commissioners of Pitt county are authorized and are hereby directed to annually levy and collect an assessment upon all real estate lying in said territory, not exceeding 20 cents on every \$100, valuation thereof. The said taxes shall be levied and collected at the same time in the same manner and under the same provisions of law as now or hereafter may exist, for the levy and collection of State and county taxes, and when so collected shall be paid to the county treasurer, who shall keep the same separate and apart from all other funds in his hands and pay the same out upon an order of the board of county commissioners.

Sec. 4. Whenever it shall be necessary to make any contract for the erecting or maintenance of any part of the fence around said territory or the gates attached to the same, the same shall be made by the Fence Commissioners, and all claims for said work shall be approved by them and when audited by the board of county commissioners, shall be paid by the county treasurer out of the funds in his hands for that purpose.

Sec. 5. If the owner of any lands shall object to the building of any fence herein provided for, a right of way for said fence, not exceeding 20 feet in width, shall be condemned for that purpose upon the application of any person or persons to any Justice of the Peace in Pitt county, which Justice of the Peace, shall at once proceed to summon two disinterested free holders, who shall together with himself, proceed to lay off and condemn such land for fencing, after giving the owners of same, or giving to thier agents two days notice. They shall then assess such damages as they think proper and just.

Sec. 6. That the fence commissioners herein before provided for shall meet annually in the town of Greenville on the first Monday in January. They may hold special meetings at other times and places when so called by the chairman, and he shall call such meetings whenever requested to do so by two or more members of the commission. For their attendance to all meetings they shall receive as a compensation the sum of two dollars per day.

Sec. 7. That no person shall be guilty of any violations of the laws concerning the running of stock at large in said territory until the fence around the same shall be constructed.

Sec. 8. That all laws in conflict with this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 9. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

OUR RALEIGH LETTER

Progress of the Impeachment Proceedings—Vote on Thursday—New Judicial Districts—Congressional Apportionment—No Labor Legislation—Newsy Notes.

Special Correspondent of Reflector.

RALEIGH N. C., Feb. 11, 1901. The Judiciary Committee of the House has voted for the impeachment of Justice Furches and Douglas, and the resolution has been made the special order in the House for Thursday of this week. The vote was 22 to 10 with two present not voting.

It is necessary, of course for the House to adopt the resolution before further steps can be taken. Will it do it? That seems to be a question. It is conceded that the step is generally disapproved by the people at large, the newspapers of the State being largely against it. But some strong party leaders—chiefly from the east—are determined in their advocacy of the measure.

NEW JUDICIAL DISTRICTS
 The Legislature decided to abolish the two criminal courts and to create four additional Supreme Court districts, making sixteen in all. The bill, drawn up on Saturday by the special committee, will be passed by the Senate this week. It passed the House Saturday. The new law is to go into effect July 1st, and each judge is required to hold 35 weeks of court annually.

CRAIG LAW AMENDED
 The word "insurance" has been stricken from the Craig law where ever it occurred, and so insurance companies are no longer required to "domesticate." The Commissioner of Insurance is given power to revoke the license of any company seeking to transfer a case from the State to Federal courts. Only five votes in the House were cast against the law and the Senate passed the bill by a practically unanimous vote. A half dozen or more of the largest and strongest life companies in the world will now return to business in this State and add thereby a revenue of some \$15,000 annually, which the State has been deprived of for the last two years.

RURAL FREE DELIVERY.
 The rural free mail delivery has proved a great success in Wake county and elsewhere, and other counties should adopt it. The postmaster at Raleigh furnishes the following suggestive facts in this connection.

In January there were handled 11,939 pieces, or nearly 1,900 more than in January, 1900. The increase month by month is constant. He says he soon expected to see the aggregate reach 15,000 pieces a month. Wonderfully great is the

increase in the newspaper subscribers. Nothing can more promote reading and reading is what rural North Carolina needs.

THE NEW CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICTS.

Next Wednesday afternoon and night the joint committee on Congressional apportionment will give the first hearing to those other than members of the Legislature. After that the committee will confine the discussion and work to themselves. Ten districts are to be laid off, as we gain one Congressman under the new apportionment bill passed by Congress. There are several "plans" already formulated. One of these gives only one district to the Republicans, while another is claimed to make all ten of the districts Democratic. The committee will have much difficulty in preparing a bill that will satisfy all.

AMENDMENT TO FERTILIZER LAW.

A matter of special interest to farmers are the amendments proposed to the law regulating the sale of fertilizers, etc., as prepared by the special committee of the Board of Agriculture. The bill thus prepared leaves the tax on commercial fertilizers at 20 cents per ton, and provides that untagged fertilizers shall be treated like whiskey is by the United States when seized; that is, sold without a case in the courts. The present law requires 8 per cent. phosphoric acid and declares that fertilizer without this is illegal. The bill proposes half a dozen different formulas, as eastern soils do not need phosphoric acid and for years fertilizers really illegal have been used there. In the matter of fertilizers not up to guarantee, the bill provides for a rebate of double the deficiency. It also provides that all fertilizers in which there is leather, hoof, meal and hair shall be confiscated and no pay can be collected for it from buyers.

Below is the way one of the bills introduced in the Legislature provides for redistricting the State so as to make ten congressional districts.

First, Beaufort, Bertie, Camden, Carteret, Chowan, Currituck, Dare, Gates, Hertford, Hyde, Northampton, Pamlico, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Tyrrell, and Washington.

Second, Edgecombe, Green, Halifax, Lenoir, Martin, Pitt, Wayne, and Wilson.

Third, Brunswick, Bladen, Columbus, Craven, Duplin, Jones, New Hanover, Onslow, Sampson and Pender.

Fourth, Franklin, Granville, Johnston, Nash Vance, Wake and Warren.

Fifth, Alamance, Caswell, Chatham, Durham, Guilford, Orange, Person and Rockingham.

Sixth, Anson, Cumberland, Harnett, Monticello, Moore, Randolph, Richmond, Roberson and Scotland.

Seventh, Cabarrus, Davie, Davidson, Mecklenburg, Rowan, Stanly and Union.

Eighth, Alleghany, Ashe, Forsyth, Mitchel, Stokes, Surry, Wilkes, Watauga, Yadkin and Yancey.

Ninth, Alexander, Catawba, Burke, Caldwell, Cleveland, Gaston, Iredell, Lincoln and Rutherford.

Tenth, Buncombe, Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Haywood, Henderson, Jackson, McDowell, Madison, Polk, Swain, Macon and Transylvania.

Too Much Anti-Negro Legislation.

"That no negro or person of negro descent, to the third generation inclusive, shall be eligible to apply to the Supreme Court of North Carolina for a license to practice law in this State, and that the Supreme Court of North Carolina shall not examine any applicant who is a negro or person descendant from a negro to the third generation inclusive."

The above is from a bill introduced in the House, which proposes an amendment to the section in the Code, relative to those who seek license to practice law in this State.

Just why it is necessary to introduce such a measure, it is impossible to say, certainly there are no grounds why the negro should be thus discriminated against if he should seek the law as a profession.

Why not introduce and pass bills which shall bar the negro from entering any profession, or any mercantile trade, and shall make it mandatory upon him to raise only cotton?

With the Jim Crow law in active operation, and the disfranchisement act yet to be put into real effect, the negro in North Carolina has had enough of legislation in North Carolina.

It must not be forgotten that the negro is in North Carolina, a resident and citizen, and as such is entitled to consideration and respect under the law besides decent treatment under ordinary and every day rules of life.

There is too much of the sentiment "that now we have got the nigger going let's keep him moving," which is finding expression in various ways, the above bill under this head.

The colored citizen of North Carolina is entitled to a rest from this kind of petty persecution. He is doing nothing to warrant such legislation being made against them. —New Bern Journal.
